- -- Comment regarding just right scope: I'm able to administer dobutamine, atropine and metoprolol for cardiac stress tests. I'm able to be nursery nurse in delivery and administer the vaccinations, and Vit K for newborns. I'm able to run a ventilator and set up patients on Bipap and CPAP. I can stay challenged and learn new things all the time. Nursing balked very heavily at our being able to do the cardiac meds.
- -- Comments regarding too narrow a scope: -- As a respiratory therapist, often what we can do, and what we are allowed to do, are two different things. It would be nicer to have more freedom in practice per regulations than we have now, and could weed out nonprofessionals and companies that hire nonprofessionals to do our job, usually just to increase profits. -- Well, I don't find that our bylaws are simplistic enough to follow. I feel that we are a well-versed, well-educated and definitely equally educated as RN's; however, because they are a larger demographic, they have more pull, etc....even in our area of expertise.
- -- Our profession comes under fire by other boards for their own purposes not for the safety and ability of a particular profession. The Board of Nursing is great at limiting other professions through legislation for the safety of their own, not for the safety and care of the patients.
