2015-16 WPIC work plan

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Introduction

This is the work plan for the Water Policy Interim Committee (WPIC) for the 2015-2016 interim. This document contains:

- Staff for the WPIC.
- An explanation of how the WPIC plans its work.
- A description of possible study topics and work plan tasks.
- An interim time line.

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How the WPIC Plans its Work

The WPIC was created in 2009 to study water policy. During the legislative interim, the WPIC may focus on the study topics assigned to it as well as any water policy issue. In 2015, the Montana Legislature expanded and focused WPIC duties to include oversight of issues "where the primary concern is the quality or quantity of water."

The WPIC establishes a work plan at the beginning of the interim. This is a draft of the work plan. The draft work plan and the accompanying matrix are decision-making tools to help the committee set priorities and decide how and where to spend the WPIC's limited time and resources.

The primary constraints limiting the agenda for the interim are the number of issues that can be effectively addressed within the available time and the resources of the committee and staff. However, the work plan is constructed with enough flexibility to accommodate relevant topics as the committee sees fit.

The adopted work plan is a road map for the 2015-2016 interim. Staff develops detailed draft work plans and timetables for each task. A draft time line, which illustrates the overall schedule that these work plans will fit into once the meeting schedule and work plan are finalized, is presented at the end of this document.

Work Plan Topics

Assigned Study Resolution

The 2015 Legislature passed Senate Joint Resolution No. 2 directing an appropriate interim committee to evaluate local, state, and federal permits for waterway projects and to determine if Montana has jurisdiction to regulate activities covered by the federal Section 404 permit required by the federal Clean Water Act. On May 18, the Legislative Council assigned this study to the WPIC. A copy of this resolution is included in your packet. The committee may determine the scale and extent of this study in the accompanying Work Plan Decision Matrix.

Statutory duties

The 2015 Legislature delegated certain new oversight duties to the WPIC. Following the passage of Senate Bill 82, the WPIC shall perform administrative rule review, draft legislation review, program evaluation (see following), and monitoring functions of these executive branch programs (5-5-231, MCA):

- Water Resources Division (Department of Natural Resources and Conservation)
- Public Water and Subdivisions Bureau (Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ))
- Water Protection Bureau (DEQ)
- Water Quality Planning Bureau (DEQ)

Broad WPIC duties are cited in 85-2-105, MCA. These include:

- Advise the Legislature on the adequacy of Montana's water policy.
- Advise the Legislature on important state, regional, national, and international developments that affect Montana's water resources.
- Oversee policies and activities of executive branch agencies and other state institutions that affect Montana's water resources.
- Assist with interagency coordination related to water resources.
- Communicate with the public about water policy and water resources.

Other, more-specific statutory duties of the WPIC include:

- 75-5-313, MCA, requires the DEQ to provide a summary of the status of the base numeric nutrient standards, the nutrient standards variances, and implementation of those standards and variances, including estimated economic impacts to the WPIC.
- 75-5-703, MCA, requires the DEQ to present a biennial report on progress toward developing TMDLs for impaired and threatened water bodies.
- 85-1-203, MCA, requires the DNRC to consult with the WPIC on developing, revising, or carrying out duties of the State Water Plan.
- 85-1-501, MCA, requires the DNRC to submit a biennial update the Energy and Telecommunications Interim Committee and the WPIC on studies of economic and environmental feasibility of constructing and operating a small-scale hydroelectric power generating facility on a state water project.

- 85-1-621, MCA, requires the DNRC to submit a biennial report to the WPIC that describes the status of the Renewable Resource Grant and Loan Program financed with funds from the Resource Indemnity Trust.
- 85-2-281, MCA, requires the Water Court and the DNRC to quarterly report to the WPIC on the progress of the adjudication of claimed water rights until 2028.
- 85-2-350, MCA, requires Clark Fork River Task Force to report to the WPIC annually.
- 85-2-436, MCA, requires the FWP to submit a biennial report to the WPIC of all appropriation rights changed to an instream flow purpose in the previous two years.
- 85-20-1401, MCA, requires the DNRC to provide a periodic report to the EQC related to the U.S. Forest Service reserved water rights compact and state water reservation applications. (This report will also be submitted to the WPIC.)
- 85-2-427, MCA, requires the DNRC to report annually on the temporary leases of appropriation rights.
- SB330 requires the DNRC to summarize its reviews of state water reservations.
- Senate Bill 82 allows a project sponsor to appear before the WPIC to discuss an agency's environmental review of the project, if that environmental review is primarily concerned with the quality or quantity of water.

Program evaluation

The evaluation of programs administered by the agencies for which the WPIC has oversight is required by law (5-5-231, MCA). As discussed previously, the executive branch programs under WPIC oversight are:

- Water Resources Division (Department of Natural Resources and Conservation)
- Public Water and Subdivisions Bureau (Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ))
- Water Protection Bureau (DEQ)
- Water Quality Planning Bureau (DEQ)

These bureaus each contain smaller programs, each of which is explained in the attached spreadsheet. Also attached is a flow chart for each agency that includes the breakdown of each agency.

What - if anything - the WPIC evaluates depends entirely on the staff resources and Council time the committee devotes to each evaluation. The accompanying Work Plan Decision Matrix shows tasks that could be included in a minimum, medium, and full program review and a range of estimated staff time necessary to complete the evaluation of each program. This could be a review of an entire bureau or a smaller, single section of that bureau.

State law also gives the WPIC broad authority to “determine which water policy issues it examines (5-5-231, MCA).” The intent of this planning process is to not to limit the WPIC scope, but to give the WPIC a picture of the variety of programs available for statutory program evaluation and to allow for an in-depth and contextual review of a program, including applicable laws, rules, funding, and implementation.

Member Suggestions

Water issues may come before the WPIC in a number of ways, including legislation, committee member suggestions, and the work of entities that deal with water issues. These issues may come up prior to or during the interim.

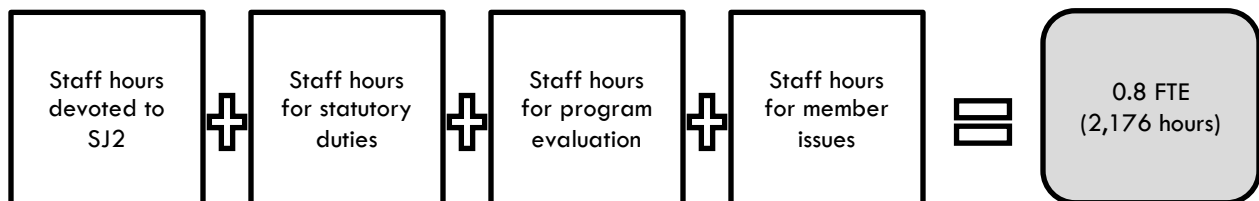
Committee member suggestions drive much of the WPIC's work. Committee member suggestions submitted to staff (as of May 11, 2015) include:

- LIDAR remote sensing technology
- Water quality conditions purer than “natural”
- Future role of the Montana Water Court
- Regulatory implications of “waters of the U.S.” definition
- Exempt groundwater wells
- Water marketing and water banking
- Development of DEQ water quality standards

These committee member suggestions may be covered by as little as a meeting presentation. The committee may determine other topics warrant more attention and study and may elect to assign the workload options for these topics, as demonstrated in the work plan decision matrix. The committee may also choose not to cover certain member issues.

Resource Allocation

There is approximately **0.8 FTE** of staff time available to conduct the work identified by the WPIC. These priorities – and the amount of staff hours devoted to a specific topic – are determined by the committee using the Work Plan Decision Matrix, which accompanies this document. Please bear in mind the basic equation:
