Department Head: Ben Thomas, Director (appointed by governor with Senate approval)

## FTE / Main Administrative Divisions:

- 114.42 full-time equivalent positions (down 1.32 from FY 2016-2017)
- Central Services Division, funded with a mix of costs assessed to the other two divisions plus indirect cost reimbursement from federal grants, administrative assessment for state special and proprietary revenue accounts the division supports, and some general fund.
- Agricultural Sciences Division, primarily funded (86%) with state special revenue (from fees assessed for regulation or registration), with some general fund and some federal special revenue (including for noxious weed mitigation).
- Agricultural Development Division, funded 81% with state special revenue, 10% proprietary, plus some federal special revenue

## Description and Responsibilities:

- Department constitutionally required for protecting, enhancing, and developing all agriculture. (Article XII, Section 1)
- Licenses and regulates produce/commodity dealers and commodity warehouses, including use of bonds and claims against bonds.
- Provides inspectors and graders for agricultural products.
- Maintains a testing laboratory for certifying grade or protein of grains.
- Licenses facilities that condition agricultural seed and assesses fees on certain sales.
- Registers and regulates apiaries.
- Licenses, inspects, regulates:
  - plant nurseries;
  - commercial feed; and
  - pet foods.
- Oversees and provides management help to control pests and weeds.

- Licenses commercial pesticide applicators and dealers.
- Regulates fertilizers and licenses distributors.
- Shares with the Department of Environmental Quality a duty to inspect and regulate hazardous waste pesticide and pesticide container recycling.
- Retains appraisers for losses insured by Board of Hail Insurance.
- May inspect produce under Montana Produce Act.
- Collects and publishes statistics on ag products' and allied interests' production/marketing.
- Assists and promotes the organization of farmers' institutes, societies, and the holding of fairs, livestock shows, or other ag exhibits.
- Helps devise and maintain distribution systems.
- May maintain a market news service and act as a clearinghouse for producers and consumers.

A partially concurred response for the recommendation to adopt rules regarding industrial hemp production related to adoption of rules after changes in federal law.

### Agency Bills Passed During 2017 Session:

- HB 82 Updates vertebrate pest management laws, revises list of vertebrate pests. Repeals vertebrate pest management advisory council. Effective 10/1/2017.
- **HB 91** Revises food safety laws. Allows the Department of Agriculture to adopt by reference through rule regulations adopted federally under the Food Safety Modernization Act. Effective 10/1/2017.
- **HB 126** Generally revises the Montana Pesticides Act. Effective 5/3/2017 except for the repeal of a liability section, which is effective 10/1/2019.
- **HB 130** Revises commercial feed inspection fees and reporting requirements and incorporates term "supplier." Effective 10/1/2017.
- HB 131 Revises reports and fees for produce, seed, feed, and fertilizer. Effective 5/7/2017.
- **SB 55** Revises nursery licensing, fees, inspections, and penalties. Clarifies license and certain nursery laws apply to landscape service engaged in nursery services. Sets license fees based on gross annual sales of nursery stock; landscape services have separate fee. Effective 5/19/2017.

# Bills Passed During 2017 Session Impacting the Department of Agriculture:

• SB 155 - Prohibits local government regulation of agricultural or vegetable seeds. Effective 5/22/2017.

Agency Bills That Failed During 2017 Session: None

## Economic Affairs Interim Committee Areas of Interest

• Sunset on June 30, 2019, of the Growth through Agriculture funding program, which has provided \$1 in matching funds to every \$1 invested through grants up to about \$50,000. Loans are available up to about \$100,000. In 2017 the Growth through Agriculture program funded 21 projects ranging from \$2,500 to a Bigfork company to purchase labeling for cherry juice bottles to \$40,000 for equipment for a meat

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processing plant in Forsyth. Information on grants is available here.

• Budget cuts specified in SB 261 include a 50% general fund reduction to the department's agricultural marketing programs, resulting in a reduction of one employee position and a refocusing of work to areas funded by state or federal special funds.

# **Budgets**

The budgets below show the FY2018 and FY2019 budget (first table) approved by the 2017 Legislature and the proposed budget with 10% general fund reductions and revisions if the governor orders general fund cuts under 17-7-140, MCA. The proposed cuts would shift some personnel services costs from the general fund to state special revenues in the Central Services Division, the State Grain Lab, and the feed testing and monitoring program for bovine spongiform encephalopathy (also known as mad cow disease). The BSE program is in the Ag Sciences Division. Grants to mitigate the impact of noxious weeds also could be reduced.
