

23 Veteran Integrated Service Networks (VISN)

- America's largest integrated health care system - 9 million served each year
- 1,245 health care facilities
 - 170 medical centers
 - 1,065 outpatient sites of care of varying complexity (VHA outpatient clinics)
- Montana in VISN 19





VA Health Care System

- Basic Eligibility Criteria
 - Active military service for 24 months (some variations)
 - Reserve/National Guard called to federal active duty for certain amount of time
 - Discharged/released "other than dishonorable"
- Enrollment Process
 - Application
 - Veteran is assigned to a Priority Group
 - If veteran has a service-connected disability, receives a disability rating
- VA health care is NOT an insurance program



Within VISN 19 VA Montana Health Care System/Providers

- Fort Harrison medical center
- 12 community-based outpatient clinics (CBOCs)
- 4 vet centers
- 2 telehealth sites
- 1 nursing home in Miles City (closing)
- 1 sleep disorder clinic
- Providers approved through Vet Choice Program





VA Benefit Programs

- Pensions
- Disability compensation
- Education & Training, and VetSuccess on Campus program
- Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment
- Home loans and mortgage delinquency assistance
- Life insurance
- Programs for special groups
 - Elderly, homeless, incarcerated, minority, former POW, etc.
- Services, such as:
 - Transition assistance (when leaving the military service)
 - Beneficiary counseling
 - Career counseling
 - Fiduciary services / financial management
 - Independent living, evaluation and home modification

VA Grant Programs

- Specially Adapted Housing Assistance Technology (research)
- Transportation of Veterans in Highly Rural Areas
 - to state veterans service agencies & Veteran Services Organizations
- Supportive Services for Veterans Families
 - to private non-profit for very low-income veterans' families
- Homeless Providers Grant and Per Diem (community)
- Rural Veterans Coordination Program
 - to community-based orgs and to local and state gov't agencies
- National Veteran Sports Program

*veteran-focused grants from other agencies are not included in this presentations



Some Grants Are Available Only To State Governments/Institutions

- State Veteran Nursing Homes DPHHS
 - State Home Construction Program
 - State Nurse Retention Grant Program
 - State Home Per Diem Program
- State Veteran Cemeteries MVAD
 - Veterans Cemetery Grant Services (also available to Tribes)



State Structure



Main State Agencies

- Montana Veterans' Affairs Division (MVAD)
 - Claims assistance (veteran service officers) health and nonhealth claims
 - State veteran cemetery program

- Dept. of Public Health and Human Services (DPHHS)
 - State Veterans' Homes (Columbia Falls, Glendive)
 - State Suicide Prevention Program



Other State Agency Programs – State Funding

- Dept. of Labor and Industry (employment)
- Dept. of Commerce (home loan)
- Dept. of Revenue (various tax exemptions)
- Commissioner of Higher Education (tuition waivers)
- Dept. of Fish, Wildlife and Parks (hunting/fishing licenses)
- Dept. of Justice (motor vehicles, license plates)

- May wish to find a VA certified agent to assist
 - VA maintains a list



Veterans With Health Issue Start With Enrollment in VA Health Care System

- Initial application
 - Need complete and accurate records
- VA determination of eligibility for enrollment
 - Disability determination key to eligibility for many programs
 - Percentage service-connected
 - Percentage disabled
- If eligible, VA assigns veteran to a Priority Group



1. Application

- Veteran completes and submits
- unassisted
- VA certified agent
- VA certified agent
- accredited person
- accredited attorney
- Vet Service Org
- MVAD officer*
- Claim Product Submitted

2. Triage

- VA employees at a Regional Benefit Office evaluate claim
- Is it ready or does it needs further development?

3. Development

- Scheduling any necessary medical or other examinations
- More Records gathering if necessary

4. Evidence

 VA evaluates whether there is sufficient evidence to support the claim

*MVAD Veteran Service Officer Role – State Employees (under Joe Foster)

If veteran designates MVAD VSO as agent, VSO acts on behalf of veteran throughout process, to gather records, ensure application is complete, and walk veteran through every step





More on Disability Rating

- Percentage of service connection to disability condition
 - Did it occur during service?
 - Was it aggravated during service?
 - Is it a presumptive condition? (example, agent orange exposure)
- What is the nature of condition?
 - How chronic?
 - How often is it a problem?
- Evidence / documentation is the key
 - Service and medical records
 - Medical exams and opinions
 - Private medical records
 - Lay statements



- Total cannot exceed 100%
- Combined Rating Table







Impact of Disability Rating - Far Reaching

- Determines eligibility for VA health care
- Determines amount of monthly disability compensation paid \$, \$\$, \$\$\$
- Determines eligibility for all kinds of various other benefits, examples:
 - 10% service-connected disability for employment & vocational rehab programs
 - 50% rating and a purple heart for special DV license plate
 - 100% rating (among other criteria) for MT state property tax relief
- Can be for a lifetime

Historical Perspective on Claims Assistance

- Veteran benefits date back to Revolutionary War kept evolving
- Congressional administration at first
- Growing complexity of benefit types, eligibility
- Federal agencies created, consolidated into VA
- Veterans needed help in presenting claims
- Non-judicial process desirable, but also advocacy on behalf of veteran
- Benefit claims process developed through veteran service organizations and negotiated with VA
- Federal laws and regulations govern claims for VA benefits or health care
- States had interest, too, many state veteran boards or commissions date back to their statehood.
- Montana board created in 1919 to administer a Veterans' Welfare Fund



Importance of Claim Product

- Quality Assurance
 - Attitude of advocacy for veteran
 - Technical proficiency and competency
 - Is veteran applying for all benefits eligible for?
 - Is the claim product presented to the VA the best product that can be presented?
 - *MVAD presentation will get into more detail



Legal Basis for Agents to Assist

- Begins with federal law 38 U.S.C. sections 5901 5905
 - Agents acting for veterans must be recognized/certified by VA
 - VA may recognize certain listed organizations as agents, such as American Legion, DAV, VFW, others
 - Agents may not charge a fee, must hold a veterans' power of attorney
 - Must receive training and maintain continuing education
 - *MVAD presentation will get into more detail



Veteran Service Officers May Work Under...

No one – may be an individual or attorney certified by VA

 A congressionally recognized veteran service organization (American Legion, DAV, VFW, VVA, etc.)

- A state, county, or tribal government
 - may have an agreement with a veteran service organization, and/or become a congressionally chartered veteran service organization themselves (MVAD has both)



What Do Other States Do?

- Selected States
 - Montana state VSOs, county VSOs are authorized (Ravalli County only one so far), national VSOs not allowed pursuant to agreement with MVAD
 - North Dakota county VSOs, national and tribal VSOs present
 - South Dakota county VSOs, tribal VSOs present
 - Wyoming state VSOs, there is a Tri-County Veterans Services entity
 - Idaho state and county VSOs
- North Dakota Study
 - Recommended changing to from county VSOs to state-level VSOs, specifically to Montana's model
- <u>Side Note</u>: Some state veterans' organizations encompass more than benefit claims assistance and state cemeteries



What recourse if claims agent is not performing well?

- Veteran could rescind power of attorney
- VA could withdraw certification
- If a public employee, could be fired
- If working under Veteran Service Organization, could lose recognition
- If an individual or attorney, back to veteran rescinding power of attorney or VA withdrawing certification
