## ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. HB103 allows the Board of Public Education to accredit schools for up to 3 years at a time. The Office of Public Instruction will provide staff resources to the BPE for development of procedures for multi-year accreditation to schools. This will be done within existing OPI resources.
- 2. There is no impact in the current biennium, as the revised program will be developed and implemented over the following year or two and the reductions in the number of accreditations will not happen immediately. In the long term, the reduction in annual accreditations should reduce the amount of work required of two FTE currently working in accreditation.
