# **Fiscal Analysis**

## ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. The rate of arrests and total number of convictions for sale of dangerous drugs will not increase.
- 2. HB 106 increases the minimum sentence in 45-9-101(4), MCA, and 45-9-110(4), MCA, from one year to three years for individuals convicted of distributing dangerous drugs if the distribution takes place in a day care facility. It also prohibits deferral or suspension of the first two years of the sentence. The Department of Corrections (DOC) does not capture crime location information.

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- 3. Given this increase in minimum sentences and the prohibition against deferral or suspension, the DOC anticipates increased costs. Assuming a variable cost of \$6.00 per offender per day, this would result in increased costs of \$2,190 per offender per year. However, the DOC cannot predict how HB 106 will impact the overall sentences that the judicial system will give to offenders.
- 4. There is no fiscal impact to the Department of Justice.
- 5. There is no fiscal impact to the Board of Crime Control.
