ASSUMPTIONS:

Department of Commerce

- 1. HB 426 would prohibit home inspectors from performing maintenance and/or repair work on residential property they inspected for a period of one year, and require the department to adopt rules governing the standards of practice for the profession. Since there is no licensure, please see technical note below.
- 2. The Department of Commerce Office of Consumer Affairs would adopt rules governing the standards of practice for the profession within the currently requested budget presented by Governor Martz in HB 2. There is no fiscal impact.

TECHNICAL NOTES:

1. The LAWS title of HB 426 is "Licensure of home inspectors" which is incorrect since HB 426 does not provide for the licensure of anyone. HB 426 would prohibit home inspectors from performing maintenance and/or repair work on residential properties they inspected for a period of one year. There is no licensure.
