Fiscal Analysis

ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. The Bozeman and Whitefish armories will not be sold. The armories will be transferred to a public entity pursuant to 77-2-351, MCA.
- 2. The building value for the Bozeman Armory is \$2,623,022, based on the property values provided by the Risk Management and Tort Defense Division.
- 3. The building value for the Whitefish Armory is \$744,630, based on the property values provided by the Risk Management and Tort Defense Division.
- 4. The Bozeman and Whitefish armories were going to be sold.
- 5. The proceeds from the sale of the armories were going to be used to pay a portion of the G.O. debt service on the bonds issued for construction of the new Bozeman and Kalispell armories.
- 6. The proceeds from the sale were going to be available in FY 2005 and be deposited in the general fund for this purpose.

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7. The general fund will now have to pay the entire debt service on the bonds issued for construction of the new Bozeman and Kalispell armories.

LONG-RANGE IMPACTS:

The proceeds from the sale of the Bozeman and Whitefish armories (now estimated to be approximately \$3,367,652) were to be available in FY 2005. The proceeds were going to be used to reduce the amount of bond issued required or to pay a portion of the G.O. debt service on the bonds issued for construction of the new armories located in Bozeman and Kalispell. If the armories are transferred to a public entity instead of being sold, the general fund will have \$3,367,652 less for debt service for these projects.
