2. Section 87-1-242(2) requires that 20% of any increase in licenses marked with an \* above be set aside and earmarked for the Habitat Montana program.

3. Due to the higher price, a 15% reduction in nonresident black bear license sales in license year 2002 and a 10% reduction in license year 2003 are anticipated.

4. Due to the higher price, a 10% reduction in nonresident season fishing and nonresident two-day fishing licenses in license year 2002 and a 5% reduction in license year 2003 are anticipated.

- 5. No other nonresident license sales are anticipated to decline due to higher prices.
- 6. Under current law, nonresidents must purchase an upland game bird license (@ \$110) before they can purchase a turkey license (@ \$13) at a total cost of \$123. This legislation eliminates the requirement of purchasing the upland game bird license. It is assumed there are 1,500 nonresident upland game bird hunters that will benefit from this change in license structure.
- 7. Sales volumes are based upon estimated sales for license years 2002 and 2003. Revenue from these license sales is then converted to fiscal year estimates on a prorated basis.
- 8. This legislation goes into effect March 1, 2002, the beginning of a license year. Fiscal year 2002 revenue will be less than fiscal year 2003 because the higher fees will be collected for only a portion of the fiscal year.
