Fiscal Analysis

ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. This is the only provision being considered. If other provisions are enacted, the cost associated with this provision may be different.
- 2. Currently, about 64 firefighters work for eligible agencies. This legislation will affect only those firefighters hired after the effective date the agency elects to join the Firefighter's Unified Retirement System (FURS). Assuming a turnover of about 10 percent, this would be six people per year.
- 3. The average annual salary for a newly hired firefighter is \$27,264 and salaries will increase by 4.5 percent per year.

EFFECT ON COUNTY OR OTHER LOCAL REVENUES OR EXPENDITURES:

Local government contributions will increase from 6.9% of payroll to 14.36% of salary for each firefighter who becomes a member of FURS. Employers currently paying social security for their firefighters will not be exempt from social security if they become members of FURS.

LONG-RANGE IMPACTS:

The state and local government contributions will increase steadily with turnover until the entire department is under FURS.
