Department of Commerce

1. SB 202 would allow licensed chiropractors to practice animal chiropractics. Chiropractors wishing to practice animal chiropractics would be required to complete a recognized animal chiropractic certification program among other items. The Professional & Occupational Licensing Division of the Department of Commerce does not foresee any fiscal impact on the Board of Chiropractors at this time. It is assumed that those chiropractors meeting the requirements of SB 202 would have a specialty added to their existing license rather than be issued a separate license. The Board does not currently charge for adding specialties to licenses.
