## Fiscal Analysis

### ASSUMPTIONS:

1. As SB 320 currently reads, there will be no impact to the state until an ethanol plant is in full production.
2. There will be no plant in production until the 2005 biennium.

### LONG-RANGE IMPACTS:

1. The 2001 State of Montana Spring Bid for vehicles resulted in vehicles that can be powered by renewable fuels as the successful bidder at \$15,453 per vehicle. This was lower than other vehicles that do not have the renewable fuel option.
2. E-85 fuel is currently approximately \$.35 higher than gasoline purchased through the state bulk fuel contract and will remain so.
