12	46-18-244, 46-18-245, AND 53-30-132, MCA; AND PROVIDING A RETROACTIVE APPLICABILITY DATE."

14	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
15	
16	Section 1. Section 46-18-201, MCA, is amended to read:
17	"46-18-201. Sentences that may be imposed. (1) (a) Whenever a person has been found guilty of an
18	offense upon a verdict of guilty or a plea of guilty or nolo contendere, a sentencing judge may defer imposition
19	of sentence, except as otherwise specifically provided by statute, for a period:
20	(i) not exceeding 1 year for a misdemeanor or for a period not exceeding 3 years for a felony; or
21	(ii) not exceeding 2 years for a misdemeanor or for a period not exceeding 6 years for a felony if a
22	financial obligation is imposed as a condition of sentence for either the misdemeanor or the felony, regardless
23	of whether any other conditions are imposed.
24	(b) Except as provided in 46-18-222, imposition of sentence in a felony case may not be deferred in the
25	case of an offender who has been convicted of a felony on a prior occasion, whether or not the sentence was
26	imposed, imposition of the sentence was deferred, or execution of the sentence was suspended.
27	(2) Whenever a person has been found guilty of an offense upon a verdict of guilty or a plea of guilty
28	or nolo contendere, a sentencing judge may suspend execution of sentence, except as otherwise specifically
29	provided by statute, for a period up to the maximum sentence allowed or for a period of 6 months, whichever
30	is greater, for each particular offense.
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1 (3) Whenever a person has been found guilty of an offense upon a verdict of guilty or a plea of guilty 2 or nolo contendere, a sentencing judge may impose a sentence that may include: 3 (a) a fine as provided by law for the offense; 4 (b) payment of costs, as provided in 46-18-232, or payment of costs of court-appointed counsel as 5 provided in 46-8-113; 6 (c) a term of incarceration at a county detention center or state prison, as provided in Title 45, for the 7 offense; 8 (d) commitment of: 9 (i) an offender not referred to in subsection (3)(d)(ii) to the department of corrections, with a 10 recommendation for placement in an appropriate correctional facility or program; however, all but the first 5 years 11 of the commitment to the department of corrections must be suspended; or 12 (ii) a youth transferred to district court under 41-5-206 and found guilty in the district court of an offense 13 enumerated in 41-5-206 to the department of corrections for a period determined by the court for placement in 14 an appropriate correctional facility or program; 15 (e) with the approval of the facility or program, placement of the offender in a community corrections 16 facility or program as provided in 53-30-321; 17 (f) with the approval of the prerelease center or prerelease program and confirmation by the department 18 of corrections that space is available, placement of the offender in a prerelease center or prerelease program 19 for a period not to exceed 1 year: 20 (g) chemical treatment of sex offenders, as provided in 45-5-512, if applicable, that is paid for by and 21 for a period of time determined by the department of corrections, but not exceeding the period of state 22 supervision of the person; or 23 (h) any combination of subsections (2) through (3)(g). 24 (4) When deferring imposition of sentence or suspending all or a portion of execution of sentence, the 25 sentencing judge may impose upon the offender any reasonable restrictions or conditions during the period of the deferred imposition or suspension of sentence. Reasonable restrictions or conditions imposed under 26 27 subsection (1)(a) or (2) may include but are not limited to: 28 (a) limited release during employment hours as provided in 46-18-701; 29 (b) incarceration in a detention center not exceeding 180 days; 30 (c) conditions for probation; Legislative

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1	(d) payment of the costs of confinement;
2	(e) payment of a fine as provided in 46-18-231;
3	(f) payment of costs as provided in 46-18-232 and 46-18-233;
4	(g) payment of costs of court-appointed counsel as provided in 46-8-113;
5	(h) with the approval of the facility or program, an order that the offender be placed in a community
6	corrections facility or program as provided in 53-30-321;
7	(i) with the approval of the prerelease center or prerelease program and confirmation by the department
8	of corrections that space is available, an order that the offender be placed in a prerelease center or prerelease
9	program for a period not to exceed 1 year;
10	(j) community service;
11	(k) home arrest as provided in Title 46, chapter 18, part 10;
12	(I) payment of expenses for use of a judge pro tempore or special master as provided in 3-5-116;
13	(m) with the approval of the department of corrections and with a signed statement from an offender
14	that the offender's participation in the boot camp incarceration program is voluntary, an order that the offender
15	complete the boot camp incarceration program established pursuant to 53-30-403;
16	(n) any other reasonable restrictions or conditions considered necessary for rehabilitation or for the
17	protection of the victim or society; or
18	(o) any combination of the restrictions or conditions listed in subsections (4)(a) through (4)(n).
19	(5) In addition to any <u>other</u> penalties imposed <del>pursuant to subsection (1)</del> , if <u>a person has been found</u>
20	guilty of an offense upon a verdict of guilty or a plea of guilty or nolo contendere and the sentencing judge finds
21	that <del>the <u>a</u> victim <del>of the offense, as defined in 46-18-243,</del> has sustained a pecuniary loss, the sentencing judge</del>
22	shall, as part of the sentence, require payment of full restitution to the victim, as provided in 46-18-241 through
23	46-18-249, whether or not any part of the sentence is deferred or suspended.
24	(6) In imposing a sentence on an offender convicted of a sexual or violent offense, as defined in
25	46-23-502, the sentencing judge may not waive the registration requirement provided in Title 46, chapter 23,
26	part 5.
27	(7) If a felony sentence includes probation, the department of corrections shall supervise the offender
28	unless the court specifies otherwise."

30	SECTION 2. SECTION 46-18-237, MCA, IS AMENDED TO READ:



1	"46-18-237. Garnishment report by supervising authority. (1) If the department of corrections
2	becomes aware that a prisoner person while incarcerated under the legal custody of the department of
3	corrections or a person supervised by the department is entitled to receive money from any source, the
4	prisoner's person's supervising authority may prepare a report identifying:
5	(a) the total costs incurred by the state or county during the prisoner's person's incarceration;
6	(b) the criminal sentences imposed upon the prisoner person, including:
7	(i) the amount of restitution, if any, ordered in each sentence;
8	(ii) the name and current address of each victim or other person to whom restitution is owed;
9	(iii) the amount of restitution paid by the prisoner person; and
10	(iv) the amount of restitution currently owed by the prisoner person for each sentence;
11	(c) the amount of any child support owed by the prisoner person.
12	(2) The supervising authority shall provide notice and a copy of the report to the board of crime control
13	OFFICE OF VICTIMS SERVICES IN THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE and the county attorney for the county in which the
14	prisoner person was sentenced, either of whom may submit the report along with a petition for garnishment to
15	the court that sentenced the <del>prisoner <u>person</u>. The court may order garnishment of the <del>prisoner's <u>person's</u> money</del></del>
16	for the payment of restitution, child support, and per diem costs of incarceration owed by the prisoner person.
17	Upon receipt of the petition, the court shall provide a copy of the report to the prisoner person, who has 15 days
18	following receipt to file an objection. The court may hold a hearing to consider objections raised by the prisoner
19	person.
20	(3) Upon compliance with the provisions of subsections (1) and (2), the court shall determine the
21	amount of restitution, child support, and repayment for per diem costs owed by the prisoner person. The court
22	shall order, up to the amount of money available, payment of an amount equal to the restitution owed by the
23	prisoner person to the person designated under 46-18-245 to supervise the making of restitution payments, any
24	outstanding child support payments to the department of public health and human services for disbursement
25	to the obligee, and per diem costs owed by the <del>prisoner</del> <u>person</u> . All restitution owed by the <del>prisoner</del> <u>person</u> must
26	be paid prior to payment of any child support payments. All child support owed by the prisoner person must be
27	paid prior to the payment of any per diem costs."
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Section 3. Section 46-18-241, MCA, is amended to read:

"46-18-241. Condition of restitution. (1) As provided in 46-18-201, a sentencing court shall, as part



1 of the sentence, require an offender to make full restitution to any victim of the offense who has sustained 2 pecuniary loss as a result of the offense, including a person suffering an economic loss as a result of the crime. 3 The duty to pay full restitution under the sentence remains with the offender OR THE OFFENDER'S ESTATE until full 4 restitution is paid or the offender dies, whichever occurs first, and is a condition of any probation or parole. The 5 offender remains under state supervision for the purposes of payment and collection of restitution until full 6 restitution is paid, regardless of whether any period of incarceration, probation, or parole imposed upon the 7 offender has expired. 8 (2) (a) The court shall require the offender to pay the cost of supervising the payment of restitution, as provided in 46-18-245, if the offender is able to pay, by paying an amount equal to 10% of the amount of 9 10 restitution ordered, but not less than \$5. 11 (b) A felony offender shall pay the restitution and cost of supervising the payment of restitution to the 12 department of corrections until the offender has fully paid the restitution and the cost of supervising the payment 13 of restitution. The department shall pay the restitution to the person or entity to whom the court ordered 14 restitution to be paid. The department may contract with a government agency or private entity for the collection 15 of the payments for restitution and the cost of collecting the payments for restitution during the period following 16 state supervision or state custody of the offender. The department shall adopt rules to implement this subsection 17 (2)(b). 18 (c) Payment In a misdemeanor case, payment of restitution and of the cost of supervising the payment 19 of restitution must be made to the court, which until the offender has fully paid the restitution and the cost of 20 supervising the payment of restitution. The court shall disburse the money to the entity employing the person 21 ordered to supervise restitution under 46-18-245, which shall disburse the restitution to the person or entity to 22 whom the court ordered restitution to be paid. 23 (3) If at any time the court finds that, because of circumstances beyond the offender's control, the 24 offender is not able to pay any restitution, the court may order the offender to perform community service during 25 the time that the offender is unable to pay. The offender must be given a credit against restitution due at the rate 26 of the hours of community service times the state minimum wage in effect at the time that the community service 27 is performed." 28 29 Section 4. Section 46-18-242, MCA, is amended to read: 30 "46-18-242. Investigation and report of victim's loss. (1) Whenever the court believes that a victim

16	person could recover against the offender in a civil action arising out of the facts or events constituting the

18	taken, destroyed, broken, or otherwise harmed and out-of-pocket losses, such as medical expenses, loss of

   offender and transfer the money to the department of corrections for a felony offense and to the sentencing court

5	"46-18-245. Supervision of payment. The For a felony offense, the court shall order the department
6	of corrections to supervise the payment of restitution. For a misdemeanor offense, the court may order a
7	probation officer, restitution officer, or other designated person to supervise the making of restitution and to
8	report to the court any default in payment. If the victim of a misdemeanor has received compensation under Title
9	53, chapter 9, the court may also order an employee of the board of crime control office of victims services, as
10	defined in 53-9-103, to supervise the making of restitution and to report to the court any default in payment."

12	Section 8. Section 53-30-132, MCA, is amended to read:
13	"53-30-132. Inmate participation and status in prison work programs prison industries and
14	vocational training program wages and benefits. (1) The department of corrections may:
15	(a) establish prison industries that will result in the production or manufacture of products and the
16	rendering of services that may be needed by any department or agency of the state or any political subdivision
17	of the state, by any agency of the federal government, by any other states or their political subdivisions, or by
18	nonprofit organizations and that will assist in the rehabilitation of inmates in institutions;
19	(b) obtain federal certification of specific prison industries programs in order to gain access to interstate
20	markets for prison industries products;
21	(c) contract with private industry for the sale of goods or components manufactured or produced in
22	shops under its jurisdiction and for the employment of inmates in federally certified prison industries programs;
23	(d) print catalogs describing goods manufactured or produced by prison industries and distribute the
24	catalogs;
25	(e) fix the sale price for goods produced or manufactured by prison industries. Prices may not exceed
26	prices existing in the open market for goods of comparable quality.
27	(f) require a correctional facility to purchase needed goods from other correctional facilities;

29	(h) provide for the removal of graffiti from property and equipment of institutions and the removal of litter

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(i) provide for construction projects, up to the aggregate sum of \$200,000 for each project, performed

3 (i) exempt projects authorized by this subsection from the provisions of Title 18, chapter 2, relating to
4 construction, public bidding, bonding, or contracts; and

5 (ii) exempt inmates who provide labor for those projects from the labor and wage requirements of Title
6 18, chapter 2, part 4. Inmates providing labor for projects under this subsection must be paid a rate of pay as
7 provided in subsection (5).

8 (j) provide for the repair and maintenance by prison industries of furniture and equipment of any state9 agency;

10 (k) provide for the manufacture by prison industries of motor vehicle license plates and other related
11 articles;

12 (I) sell manufactured or agricultural products and livestock on the open market;

(m) provide for the manufacture by prison industries of highway, road, and street marking signs for the
 use of the state or any of its political subdivisions, except when the manufacture of the signs is in violation of
 a collective bargaining contract;

(n) pay an inmate from receipts from the sale of products produced or manufactured or services
rendered in a program in which the inmate is working;

(o) collect 15% of the net gross wages paid to an inmate employed in a federally certified prison
 industries program, to be deposited in a department restitution fund and used to satisfy any unpaid restitution
 obligation of the inmate or, if the obligation has been fully paid or no restitution was ordered, for transfer quarterly
 to the crime victims compensation and assistance program in the department of justice for deposit in the state
 general fund as provided in Title 53, chapter 9, part 1; and

(p) collect from an inmate employed in a federally certified prison industries program charges for room
 and board consistent with charges established by the director for inmates assigned to prerelease centers.

(2) Except as provided in subsection (3), furniture made in the prison may be purchased by state
agencies in accordance with the procurement provisions under Title 18, chapter 4. All other prison-made
furniture may be sold only through licensed wholesale or retail furniture outlets or through export firms for sale
to international markets.

(3) Any state institution, facility, or program operated by the department of corrections may purchase
 prison-made furniture without complying with the procurement provisions under Title 18, chapter 4.

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- (4) While engaged in on-the-job training and production, inmates not employed in a federally certified
   prison industries program may be paid a wage in accordance with subsection (5). Inmates employed in a
   federally certified prison industries program must be paid as provided in subsection (5).
- 4 (5) (a) Except as provided for in subsection (5)(b), payment for the performance of work may be based
  5 on the following criteria:
- 6 (i) knowledge and skill;
- 7 (ii) attitude toward authority;
- 8 (iii) physical effort;
- 9 (iv) responsibility for equipment and materials; and
- 10 (v) regard for safety of others.

(b) The maximum rate of pay must be determined by the appropriation established for the program,
except that an inmate employed in a federally certified prison industries program must be paid at a rate not less
than the rate paid for similar work in the locality where the inmate performs the work.

- (6) Premiums for workers' compensation and occupational disease coverage for federally certified
  prison industries programs must be paid by the prison industries program or by the department of corrections.
  If the department of corrections pays the premium, reimbursement for premium payments for workers'
  compensation and occupational disease coverage must be made to the department of corrections by the private
  company contracting with the federally certified prison industries program for services and products.
- (7) Inmates not working in a federally certified prison industries training program are not employees,
  either public or private, and employment rights accorded other classes of workers do not apply to the inmates.
  Inmates working in a federally certified prison industry program are entitled to coverage and benefits as provided
  in 39-71-744.
- (8) Able-bodied persons committed to a state prison as adult offenders must be required to perform
  work as provided for by the department of corrections, including the manufacture of products or the rendering
  of services. In order to ensure the public safety, the department may secure inmates performing work."
