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2	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

4	Section 1. Section 41-3-101, MCA, is amended to read:		
5	"41-3-101. Declaration of policy. (1) It is the policy of the state of Montana to:		
6	(a) ensure that all youth are afforded an adequate physical and emotional environment to promote		
7	normal development provide for the protection of children whose health and welfare are or may be adversely		
8	affected and further threatened by the conduct of those responsible for the children's care and protection;		
9	(b) compel in proper cases the parent or guardian of a youth to perform the moral and legal duty owed		
10	to the youth;		
11	(c)(b) achieve these purposes in a family environment and preserve the unity and welfare of the family		
12	whenever possible;		
13	(d) preserve the unity and welfare of the family whenever possible;		
14	(e)(c) ensure that there is no forced removal of a child from the family based solely on an		
15	unsubstantiated allegation of abuse or neglect unless the department has reasonable cause to suspect that the		
16	child is at imminent risk of harm;		
17	(f)(d) recognize that a child is entitled to assert the child's constitutional rights;		
18	(g)(e) ensure that all children have a right to a healthy and safe childhood in a nurturing permanent		
19	family or in the closest possible substitute placement;		
20	(h) provide for the protection of children whose health and welfare are or may be adversely affected and		
21	further threatened by the conduct of those responsible for their care and protection;		
22	(i) require a department social worker to interview the parents of a child to which a petition pertains, if		
23	they are reasonably available, before the state may file a petition for temporary investigative authority or a		
24	petition for immediate protection and emergency protective services and to require that a judge may not issue		
25	an order granting a petition, except an order for immediate protection of the youth, until the parents, if they are		
26	reasonably available, are given the opportunity to appear before the judge or have their statements, if any,		
27	presented to the judge for consideration before an order is granted; and		
28	(j)(f) ensure that whenever removal of a child from the home is necessary, the child is entitled to		
29	maintain ethnic, cultural, and religious heritage whenever appropriate.		
30	(2) It is intended that the mandatory reporting of abuse or endangerment cases by professional people		

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1 and other community members to the appropriate authority will cause the protective services of the state to seek 2 to prevent further abuses, protect and enhance the welfare of these children, and preserve family life whenever 3 appropriate.

4 (3) In implementing this chapter, whenever it is necessary to remove a child from the child's home, the 5 department shall, when it is in the best interests of the child, place the child with the child's noncustodial birth 6 parent or with the child's extended family, including adult siblings, grandparents, great-grandparents, aunts, and 7 uncles, when placement with the extended family is approved by the department, prior to placing the child in an 8 alternative protective or residential facility. Prior to approving a placement, the department shall investigate 9 whether anyone living in the home has been convicted of a crime involving serious harm to children.

- 10 (4) In implementing the policy of this section, the child's health and safety are of paramount concern."

Section 2. Section 41-3-102, MCA, is amended to read:

13 **"41-3-102. Definitions.** As used in this chapter, the following definitions apply:

14 (1) (a) "Abandon", "abandoned", and "abandonment" mean:

- 15 (a)(i) leaving a child under circumstances that make reasonable the belief that the parent does not 16 intend to resume care of the child in the future;
- 17 (b)(ii) willfully surrendering physical custody for a period of 6 months and during that period not 18 manifesting to the child and the person having physical custody of the child a firm intention to resume physical 19 custody or to make permanent legal arrangements for the care of the child;
- 20 (c)(iii) that the parent is unknown and has been unknown for a period of 90 days and that reasonable 21 efforts to identify and locate the parent have failed; or
- 22 (d)(iv) the voluntary surrender, as defined in 40-6-402, by a parent of a newborn who is no more than 23 30 days old to an emergency services provider, as defined in 40-6-402.
- 24

(b) The terms do not include the voluntary surrender of a child to the department SOLELY because of 25 parental inability to access publicly funded services.

- 26 (2) "A person responsible for a child's welfare" means:
- 27 (a) the child's parent, guardian, foster parent or an adult who resides in the same home in which the 28 child resides;
- 29 (b) a person providing care in a day-care facility;
- 30 (B) A PERSON PROVIDING CARE IN A DAY-CARE FACILITY;



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1 (c)(b)(C) an employee of a public or private residential institution, facility, home, or agency; or 2 (d)(c)(D) any other person responsible for the child's welfare in a residential setting. 3 (3) "Abused or neglected" means the state or condition of a child who has suffered child abuse or 4 neglect. 5 (4) (a) "Adequate health care" means any medical care or nonmedical remedial health care recognized 6 by an insurer licensed to provide disability insurance under Title 33, including the prevention of the withholding 7 of medically indicated treatment or medically indicated psychological care permitted or authorized under state 8 law. 9 (b) This chapter may not be construed to require or justify a finding of child abuse or neglect for the sole 10 reason that a parent or legal guardian, due to religious beliefs, does not provide adequate health care for a child. 11 However, this chapter may not be construed to limit the administrative or judicial authority of the state to ensure 12 that medical care is provided to the child when there is imminent substantial risk of serious harm to the child. 13 (5) "Best interests of the child" means the physical, mental, and psychological conditions and needs 14 of the child and any other factor considered by the court to be relevant to the child. 15 (6) "Child" or "youth" means any person under 18 years of age. 16 (7) (a) "Child abuse or neglect" means: 17 (i) actual physical or psychological harm to a child's health or welfare child; 18 (ii) substantial risk of physical or psychological harm to a child's health or welfare child; or 19 (iii) abandonment. 20 (b) The term includes actual physical or psychological harm to a child or substantial risk of physical or 21 psychological harm to a child by the acts or omissions of a person responsible for the child's welfare. 22 (c) The term does not include self-defense, defense of others, or action taken to prevent the child from self-harm that does not constitute physical or psychological harm to a child's health or welfare child. 23 24 (8) "Concurrent planning" means to work toward reunification of the child with the family while at the 25 same time developing and implementing an alternative permanent plan. 26 (9) "Department" means the department of public health and human services provided for in 2-15-2201. 27 (10) "Family group conference decisionmaking meeting" means a meeting that involves family members 28 in either developing treatment plans or making placement decisions, or both. 29 (11) "Harm to a child's health or welfare" means the harm that occurs whenever the parent or other 30 person responsible for the child's welfare:



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(a) inflicts or allows to be inflicted upon the child physical abuse, physical neglect, or psychological
 abuse or neglect;

3 (b) commits or allows to be committed sexual abuse or exploitation of the child;

4 (c) induces or attempts to induce a child into giving untrue testimony that the child or another child was
 5 abused or neglected by a parent or person responsible for the child's welfare;

6 (d) causes malnutrition or failure to thrive or otherwise fails to supply the child with adequate food or

7 fails to supply clothing, shelter, education, or adequate health care, though financially able to do so or offered

8 financial or other reasonable means to do so;

9 (e) exposes or allows the child to be exposed to an unreasonable risk to the child's health or welfare
 10 by failing to intervene or eliminate the risk; or

11 (f) abandons the child.

(12)(11) "Limited emancipation" means a status conferred on a youth by a court in accordance with
 41-3-438 <u>41-1-501</u> under which the youth is entitled to exercise some but not all of the rights and responsibilities
 of a person who is 18 years of age or older.

15 (13)(12) "Parent" means a biological or adoptive parent or stepparent.

(14)(13) "Parent-child legal relationship" means the legal relationship that exists between a child and
 the child's birth or adoptive parents, as provided in Title 40, chapter 6, part 2, unless the relationship has been
 terminated by competent judicial decree as provided in 40-6-234, Title 42, or part 6 of this chapter.

(15)(14) "Permanent placement" means reunification of the child with the child's parent, adoption,
 placement with a legal guardian, placement with a fit and willing relative, or placement in another planned
 permanent living arrangement until the child reaches 18 years of age.

(16)(15) "Physical abuse" means an intentional act, an intentional omission, or gross negligence
 resulting in substantial skin bruising, internal bleeding, substantial injury to skin, subdural hematoma, burns,
 bone fractures, extreme pain, permanent or temporary disfigurement, impairment of any bodily organ or function,
 or death.

(17)(16) "Physical neglect" means either failure to provide basic necessities, including but not limited
 to appropriate and adequate nutrition, protective shelter from the elements, and appropriate clothing related to
 weather conditions, or failure to provide cleanliness and general supervision, or both, or exposing or allowing
 the child to be exposed to an unreasonable physical or psychological risk to the child.

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(17) (a) "Physical or psychological harm to a child" means the harm that occurs whenever the parent



1 or other person responsible for the child's welfare: 2 (i) inflicts or allows to be inflicted upon the child physical abuse, physical neglect, or psychological abuse 3 or neglect; 4 (ii) commits or allows sexual abuse or exploitation of the child; 5 (iii) induces or attempts to induce a child into giving untrue testimony that the child or another child was 6 abused or neglected by a parent or other person responsible for the child's welfare; 7 (iv) causes malnutrition or a failure to thrive or otherwise fails to supply the child with adequate food or 8 fails to supply clothing, shelter, education, or adequate health care, though financially able to do so or offered 9 financial or other reasonable means to do so; 10 (v) exposes or allows the child to be exposed to an unreasonable risk to the child's health or welfare 11 by failing to intervene or eliminate the risk; or 12 (vi) abandons the child. 13 (b) The term does not include a youth not receiving supervision SOLELY because of parental inability to 14 control the youth's behavior. 15 (18) "Psychological abuse or neglect" means severe maltreatment through acts or omissions that are 16 injurious to the child's emotional, intellectual, or psychological capacity to function, including acts of violence 17 against another person residing in the child's home. 18 (19) "Reasonable cause to suspect" means cause that would lead a reasonable person to believe that 19 child abuse or neglect may have occurred or is occurring, based on all the facts and circumstances known to 20 the person. 21 (20) "Residential setting" means an out-of-home placement where the child typically resides for longer 22 than 30 days for the purpose of receiving food, shelter, security, guidance, and, if necessary, treatment. 23 (21) (a) "Sexual abuse" means the commission of sexual assault, sexual intercourse without consent, 24 indecent exposure, deviate sexual conduct, sexual abuse, ritual abuse, or incest, as described in Title 45, 25 chapter 5. 26 (b) Sexual abuse does not include any necessary touching of an infant's or toddler's genital area while 27 attending to the sanitary or health care needs of that infant or toddler by a parent or other person responsible 28 for the child's welfare. 29 (22) "Sexual exploitation" means allowing, permitting, or encouraging a child to engage in a prostitution 30 offense, as described in 45-5-601 through 45-5-603, or allowing, permitting, or encouraging sexual abuse of

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1 children as described in 45-5-625.

(23) "Social worker" means an employee of the department who, before the employee's field
assignment, has been educated or trained in a program of social work or a related field that includes cognitive
and family systems treatment or who has equivalent verified experience or verified training in the investigation
of child abuse, neglect, and endangerment. This definition does not apply to any provision of this code that is
not in this chapter.

7 (24) "Treatment plan" means a written agreement between the department and the parent or guardian
8 or a court order that includes action that must be taken to resolve the condition or conduct of the parent or
9 guardian that resulted in the need for protective services for the child. The treatment plan may involve court
10 services, the department, and other parties, if necessary, for protective services.

(25) "Unfounded" means that after an investigation, the investigating person has determined that the
 reported abuse, neglect, or exploitation has not occurred.

(26) (a) "Withholding of medically indicated treatment" means the failure to respond to an infant's
life-threatening conditions by providing treatment, including appropriate nutrition, hydration, and medication, that,
in the treating physician's or physicians' reasonable medical judgment, will be most likely to be effective in
ameliorating or correcting the conditions.

(b) The term does not include the failure to provide treatment, other than appropriate nutrition, hydration,
or medication, to an infant when, in the treating physician's or physicians' reasonable medical judgment:

19 (i) the infant is chronically and irreversibly comatose;

20 (ii) the provision of treatment would:

21 (A) merely prolong dying;

22 (B) not be effective in ameliorating or correcting all of the infant's life-threatening conditions; or

23 (C) otherwise be futile in terms of the survival of the infant; or

(iii) the provision of treatment would be virtually futile in terms of the survival of the infant and the treatment itself under the circumstances would be inhumane. For purposes of this subsection (26), "infant" means an infant less than 1 year of age or an infant 1 year of age or older who has been continuously hospitalized since birth, who was born extremely prematurely, or who has a long-term disability. The reference to less than 1 year of age may not be construed to imply that treatment should be changed or discontinued when an infant reaches 1 year of age or to affect or limit any existing protections available under state laws regarding medical neglect of children 1 year of age or older.

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1	(27) "Youth in need of care" means a youth who has been adjudicated or determined, after a hearing		
2	to be or to have been abused, neglected, or abandoned."

4	Section 3. Section 41-3-103, MCA, is amended to read:		
5	"41-3-103. Jurisdiction and venue. (1) In all matters arising under this chapter, the district court has		
6	jurisdiction over:		
7	(a) a youth who is within the state of Montana for any purpose;		
8	(b) a youth or other person subject to this chapter who under a temporary or permanent order of the		
9	court has voluntarily or involuntarily left the state or the jurisdiction of the court; or		
10	(c) a person who is alleged to have abused or neglected a youth who is in the state of Montana for any		
11	purpose.		
12	(2) The Either the county where a youth is located or a county where the youth's parent or guardian		
13	resides has initial jurisdiction over a youth alleged to be a youth in need of care. Venue may be transferred to		
14	the county of residence of the youth's parent or guardian."

16	Section 4. Section 41-3-113, MCA, is amended to read:		
17	"41-3-113. Appeals. (1) Appeals of court orders or decrees made under this part shall must be given		
18	precedence on the calendar of the supreme court over all other matters, unless otherwise provided by law.		
19	(2) An appeal does not stay the order or decree appealed from; however, the and does not divest the		
20	presiding district court judge of jurisdiction to take steps that are necessary, in the best interests of the child, and		
21	in order to protect the health and safety of the child. The supreme court may order a stay upon application and		
22	hearing if suitable provision is made for the care and custody of the child.		
23	(3) If the appeal results in the reversal of the order appealed, the legal status of the child reverts to the		
24	child's legal status before the entry of the order that was appealed. The child's prior legal status remains in effect		
25	until further order of the district court unless the supreme court orders otherwise."

27	Section 5. Section 41-3-205, MCA, is amended to read:		
28	"41-3-205. Confidentiality disclosure exceptions. (1) The case records of the department and its		
29	local affiliate, the local office of public assistance, the county attorney, and the court concerning actions taken		
30	under this chapter and all records concerning reports of child abuse and neglect must be kept confidential except		



as provided by this section. Except as provided in subsections (6) and (7), a person who purposely or knowingly
 permits or encourages the unauthorized dissemination of the contents of case records is guilty of a
 misdemeanor.

4 (2) Records may be disclosed to a court for in camera inspection if relevant to an issue before it. The 5 court may permit public disclosure if it finds disclosure to be necessary for the fair resolution of an issue before 6 it.

7 (3) Records, including case notes, correspondence, evaluations, videotapes, and interviews, unless
8 otherwise protected by this section or unless disclosure of the records is determined to be detrimental to the child
9 or harmful to another person who is a subject of information contained in the records, may be disclosed to the
10 following persons or entities in this state and any other state or country:

(a) a department, agency, or organization, including a federal agency, military enclave, or Indian tribal
 organization, that is legally authorized to receive, inspect, or investigate reports of child abuse or neglect and
 that otherwise meets the disclosure criteria contained in this section;

(b) a licensed youth care facility or a licensed child-placing agency that is providing services to the
family or child who is the subject of a report in the records or to a person authorized by the department to receive
relevant information for the purpose of determining the best interests of a child with respect to an adoptive
placement;

(c) a health or mental health professional who is treating the family or child who is the subject of a report
in the records;

(d) a parent, guardian, or person designated by a parent or guardian of the child who is the subject of
 a report in the records or other person responsible for the child's welfare, without disclosure of the identity of any
 person who reported or provided information on the alleged child abuse or neglect incident contained in the
 records;

(e) a child named in the records who was allegedly abused or neglected or the child's legal guardian
or legal representative, including the child's guardian ad litem or attorney or a special advocate appointed by
the court to represent a child in a pending case;

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(f) the state protection and advocacy program as authorized by 42 U.S.C. 6042(a)(2)(B);

(g) approved foster and adoptive parents who are or may be providing care for a child;

(h) a person about whom a report has been made and that person's attorney, with respect to therelevant records pertaining to that person only and without disclosing the identity of the reporter or any other

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1 person whose safety may be endangered;

2 (i) an agency, including a probation or parole agency, that is legally responsible for the supervision of 3 an alleged perpetrator of child abuse or neglect;

4 (i) a person, agency, or organization that is engaged in a bona fide research or evaluation project and 5 that is authorized by the department to conduct the research or evaluation;

6 (k) the members of an interdisciplinary child protective team authorized under 41-3-108 or of a family 7 group conference decisionmaking meeting for the purposes of assessing the needs of the child and family, 8 formulating a treatment plan, and monitoring the plan;

9

(I) the coroner or medical examiner when determining the cause of death of a child;

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(m) a child fatality review team recognized by the department;

11 (n) a department or agency investigating an applicant for a license or registration that is required to 12 operate a youth care facility, day-care facility, or child-placing agency;

13 (o) a person or entity who is carrying out background, employment-related, or volunteer-related 14 screening of current or prospective employees or volunteers who have or may have unsupervised contact with 15 children through employment or volunteer activities. A request for information under this subsection (3)(o) must 16 be made in writing. Disclosure under this subsection (3)(o) is limited to information that indicates a risk to 17 children, persons with developmental disabilities, or older persons posed by the person about whom the 18 information is sought, as determined by the department.

19 (p) the news media, a member of the United States congress, or a state legislator, if disclosure is limited 20 to confirmation of factual information regarding how the case was handled and if disclosure does not violate the 21 privacy rights of the child or the child's parent or guardian, as determined by the department;

22 (q) an employee of the department or other state agency if disclosure of the records is necessary for 23 administration of programs designed to benefit the child;

24 (r) an agency of an Indian tribe or the relatives of an Indian child if disclosure of the records is necessary 25 to meet requirements of the federal Indian Child Welfare Act;

26 (s) a youth probation officer who is working in an official capacity with the child who is the subject of a 27 report in the records;

28 (t) a county attorney, peace officer, or attorney who is hired by or represents the department if disclosure 29 is necessary for the investigation, defense, or prosecution of a case involving child abuse or neglect;

30 (u) a foster care review committee established under 41-3-115 or, when applicable, a citizen review

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1 board established under Title 41, chapter 3, part 10;

2 (v) a school employee participating in an interview of a child by a social worker, county attorney, or
3 peace officer, as provided in 41-3-202;

4 (w) a member of a county interdisciplinary child information team formed under the provisions of 5 52-2-211;

6 (x) members of a local interagency staffing group provided for in 52-2-203;

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8 (z) a principal of a school or other employee of the school district authorized by the trustees of the

district to receive the information with respect to a student of the district who is a client of the department.

(y) a member of a youth placement committee formed under the provisions of 41-5-121; or

(4) A school or school district may disclose, without consent, personally identifiable information from
the education records of a pupil to the department, the court, a review board, and the child's court-appointed
attorney, guardian ad litem, or special advocate.

(5) Information that identifies a person as a participant in or recipient of substance abuse treatment
 services may be disclosed only as allowed by federal substance abuse confidentiality laws, including the consent
 provisions of the law.

(6) A person who is authorized to receive records under this section shall maintain the confidentiality
of the records and may not disclose information in the records to anyone other than the persons described in
subsection (3)(a). However, this subsection may not be construed to compel a family member to keep the
proceedings confidential.

20 (7) A news organization or its employee, including a freelance writer or reporter, is not liable for 21 reporting facts or statements made by an immediate family member under subsection (6) if the news 22 organization, employee, writer, or reporter maintains the confidentiality of the child who is the subject of the 23 proceeding.

(8) This section is not intended to affect the confidentiality of criminal court records, records of law
 enforcement agencies, or medical records covered by state or federal disclosure limitations.

(9) Copies of records, evaluations, reports, or other evidence obtained or generated pursuant to this
 section that are provided to the parent, the guardian, or the parent or guardian's attorney must be provided
 without cost."

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Section 6. Section 41-3-301, MCA, is amended to read:



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1 "41-3-301. Emergency protective service. (1) Any child protective social worker of the department, 2 a peace officer, or the county attorney who has reason to believe any youth is in immediate or apparent danger 3 of harm may immediately remove the youth and place the youth in a protective facility. The department may 4 make a request for further assistance from the law enforcement agency or take appropriate legal action. The 5 person or agency placing the child shall notify the parents, parent, guardian, or other person having legal 6 physical custody of the youth at the time the placement is made or as soon after placement as possible. 7 Notification under this subsection must include the reason for removal, information regarding the show cause 8 hearing, and the purpose of the show cause hearing.

9 (2) A child who has been removed from the child's home or any other place for the child's protection
10 or care may not be placed in a jail.
