9	APPLICATION PROOF OF A CURRENT LIABILITY INSURANCE POLICY, SUBJECT TO PERIODIC REVIEW
10	BY THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRY; CLARIFYING CLARIFY THE DEFINITION OF
11	INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR TO INCLUDE A CONTRACTOR WHO HAS RECEIVED AN EXEMPTION
12	GRANTED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRY; IMPOSING A CIVIL PENALTY AND
13	REQUIRING REPAYMENT OF UNEMPLOYMENT CONTRIBUTIONS AND WORKERS' COMPENSATION
14	PREMIUMS AGAINST AN EMPLOYER WHO FALSELY MISREPRESENTS AN EMPLOYEE'S STATUS AS AN

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21	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
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23	Section 1. Section 39-71-120, MCA, is amended to read:
24	"39-71-120. Independent contractor defined. (1) An "independent contractor" is one who renders
25	service in the course of an occupation and:
26	(a) has been and will continue to be free from control or direction over the performance of the services,
27	both under the contract and in fact; and
28	(b) is engaged in an independently established trade, occupation, profession, or business; and
29	(c) has received an exemption granted under 39-71-401(3).
30	(2) An individual performing services for remuneration is considered to be an employee under this

chapter unless the requirements of subsection (1) are met." 1 2 3 Section 1. Section 39-71-401, MCA, is amended to read: 4 "39-71-401. Employments covered and employments exempted. (1) Except as provided in 5 subsection (2), the Workers' Compensation Act applies to all employers, as defined in 39-71-117, and to all 6 employees, as defined in 39-71-118. An employer who has any employee in service under any appointment or 7 contract of hire, expressed or implied, oral or written, shall elect to be bound by the provisions of compensation 8 plan No. 1, 2, or 3. Each employee whose employer is bound by the Workers' Compensation Act is subject to 9 and bound by the compensation plan that has been elected by the employer. 10 (2) Unless the employer elects coverage for these employments under this chapter and an insurer 11 allows an election, the Workers' Compensation Act does not apply to any of the following employments: 12 (a) household and domestic employment; 13 (b) casual employment as defined in 39-71-116; 14 (c) employment of a dependent member of an employer's family for whom an exemption may be 15 claimed by the employer under the federal Internal Revenue Code; 16 (d) employment of sole proprietors, working members of a partnership, working members of a limited 17 liability partnership, or working members of a member-managed limited liability company, except as provided 18 in subsection (3); 19 (e) employment of a real estate, securities, or insurance salesperson paid solely by commission and 20 without a guarantee of minimum earnings; 21 (f) employment as a direct seller as defined by 26 U.S.C. 3508; 22 (g) employment for which a rule of liability for injury, occupational disease, or death is provided under 23 the laws of the United States; 24 (h) employment of a person performing services in return for aid or sustenance only, except 25 employment of a volunteer under 67-2-105; 26 (i) employment with a railroad engaged in interstate commerce, except that railroad construction work 27 is included in and subject to the provisions of this chapter; 28 (j) employment as an official, including a timer, referee, umpire, or judge, at an amateur athletic event; 29 (k) employment of a person performing services as a newspaper carrier or freelance correspondent if 30 the person performing the services or a parent or guardian of the person performing the services in the case of



1 a minor has acknowledged in writing that the person performing the services and the services are not covered. 2 As used in this subsection, "freelance correspondent" is a person who submits articles or photographs for 3 publication and is paid by the article or by the photograph. As used in this subsection, "newspaper carrier": 4 (i) is a person who provides a newspaper with the service of delivering newspapers singly or in bundles; 5 but 6 (ii) does not include an employee of the paper who, incidentally to the employee's main duties, carries 7 or delivers papers. 8 (I) cosmetologist's services and barber's services as defined in 39-51-204(1)(e); 9 (m) a person who is employed by an enrolled tribal member or an association, business, corporation, 10 or other entity that is at least 51% owned by an enrolled tribal member or members, whose business is 11 conducted solely within the exterior boundaries of an Indian reservation; 12 (n) employment of a jockey who is performing under a license issued by the board of horseracing from 13 the time that the jockey reports to the scale room prior to a race through the time that the jockey is weighed out 14 after a race if the jockey has acknowledged in writing, as a condition of licensing by the board of horseracing, 15 that the jockey is not covered under the Workers' Compensation Act while performing services as a jockey; 16 (o) employment of a trainer, assistant trainer, exercise person, or pony person who is performing 17 services under a license issued by the board of horseracing while on the grounds of a licensed race meet; 18 (p) employment of an employer's spouse for whom an exemption based on marital status may be 19 claimed by the employer under 26 U.S.C. 7703; 20 (g) a person who performs services as a petroleum land professional. As used in this subsection, a 21 "petroleum land professional" is a person who: 22 (i) is engaged primarily in negotiating for the acquisition or divestiture of mineral rights or in negotiating 23 a business agreement for the exploration or development of minerals; 24 (ii) is paid for services that are directly related to the completion of a contracted specific task rather than 25 on an hourly wage basis; and 26 (iii) performs all services as an independent contractor pursuant to a written contract. 27 (r) an officer of a quasi-public or a private corporation or manager of a manager-managed limited liability 28 company who qualifies under one or more of the following provisions: 29 (i) the officer or manager is not engaged in the ordinary duties of a worker for the corporation or the 30 limited liability company and does not receive any pay from the corporation or the limited liability company for

2	(ii) the officer or manager is engaged primarily in household employment for the corporation or the
3	<del>limited liability company;</del>
4	(iii) the officer or manager either:
5	(A) owns 20% or more of the number of shares of stock in the corporation or owns 20% or more of the
6	<del>limited liability company; or</del>
7	(B) owns less than 20% of the number of shares of stock in the corporation or limited liability company
8	if the officer's or manager's shares when aggregated with the shares owned by a person or persons listed in
9	subsection (2)(r)(iv) total 20% or more of the number of shares in the corporation or limited liability company;
10	<del>or</del>
11	(iv) the officer or manager is the spouse, child, adopted child, stepchild, mother, father, son-in-law,
12	daughter-in-law, nephew, niece, brother, or sister of a corporate officer who meets the requirements of
13	subsection (2)(r)(iii)(A) or (2)(r)(iii)(B).
14	(s) a person who is an officer or a manager of a ditch company as defined in 27-1-731;
15	(t) service performed by an ordained, commissioned, or licensed minister of a church in the exercise
16	of the church's ministry or by a member of a religious order in the exercise of duties required by the order.
17	(3) (a) A sole proprietor, a working member of a partnership, a working member of a limited liability
18	partnership, or a working member of a member-managed limited liability company who represents to the public
19	that the person is an independent contractor shall elect to be bound personally and individually by the provisions
20	of compensation plan No. 1, 2, or 3 but may apply to the department for an exemption from the Workers'
21	Compensation Act.
22	(b) The application must be made in accordance with the rules adopted by the department and include
23	proof that the applicant has a current liability insurance policy, which is subject to periodic review as required
24	by the department. There is a \$25 fee for the initial application. Any subsequent application renewal must be
25	accompanied by a \$25 application fee. The application fee must be deposited in the administration fund
26	established in 39-71-201 to offset the costs of administering the program.
27	(c) When an application is approved by the department, it is conclusive as to the status of an
28	independent contractor and precludes the applicant from obtaining benefits under this chapter.
29	(d) The exemption, if approved, remains in effect for 3 years following the date of the department's
30	approval unless the department determines that the contractor has failed to maintain the liability insurance policy

1 required in subsection (3)(b). To maintain the independent contractor status, an independent contractor shall 2 every 3 years submit a renewal application every 3 years. A renewal application must be submitted for all 3 independent contractor exemptions approved on or after July 1, 1995. The renewal application and the \$25 4 renewal application fee, along with the proof of insurance required in subsection (3)(b), must be received by the 5 department at least 30 days before the anniversary date of the previously approved exemption. (e) A person who makes a false statement or misrepresentation concerning that person's status as an 6 7 exempt independent contractor is subject to a civil penalty of \$1,000. The department may impose the penalty 8 for each false statement or misrepresentation. The penalty must be paid to the uninsured employers' fund. The 9 lien provisions of 39-71-506 apply to the penalty imposed by this section. 10 (f) If an employer misrepresents an employee's status as an exempt independent contractor, the 11 department may impose a civil penalty of \$1,000 in addition to any other penalties provided in law. 12 (f)(g) If the department denies the application for exemption, the applicant may, after mediation pursuant 13 to department rules, contest the denial by petitioning the workers' compensation court. 14 (4) (a) A corporation or a manager-managed limited liability company shall provide coverage for its 15 employees under the provisions of compensation plan No. 1, 2, or 3. A quasi-public corporation, a private 16 corporation, or a manager-managed limited liability company may elect coverage for its corporate officers or 17 managers, who are otherwise exempt under subsection (2), by giving a written notice in the following manner: 18 (i) if the employer has elected to be bound by the provisions of compensation plan No. 1, by delivering 19 the notice to the board of directors of the corporation or to the management organization of the 20 manager-managed limited liability company: or 21 (ii) if the employer has elected to be bound by the provisions of compensation plan No. 2 or 3, by 22 delivering the notice to the board of directors of the corporation or to the management organization of the 23 manager-managed limited liability company and to the insurer. 24 (b) If the employer changes plans or insurers, the employer's previous election is not effective and the 25 employer shall again serve notice to its insurer and to its board of directors or the management organization of 26 the manager-managed limited liability company if the employer elects to be bound. 27 (5) The appointment or election of an employee as an officer of a corporation, a partner in a partnership, 28 a partner in a limited liability partnership, or a member in or a manager of a limited liability company for the 29 purpose of exempting the employee from coverage under this chapter does not entitle the officer, partner, 30 member, or manager to exemption from coverage.



1 (6) Each employer shall post a sign in the workplace at the locations where notices to employees are 2 normally posted, informing employees about the employer's current provision of workers' compensation 3 insurance. A workplace is any location where an employee performs any work-related act in the course of 4 employment, regardless of whether the location is temporary or permanent, and includes the place of business 5 or property of a third person while the employer has access to or control over the place of business or property 6 for the purpose of carrying on the employer's usual trade, business, or occupation. The sign must be provided 7 by the department, distributed through insurers or directly by the department, and posted by employers in 8 accordance with rules adopted by the department. An employer who purposely or knowingly fails to post a sign 9 as provided in this subsection is subject to a \$50 fine for each citation." 10 11 NEW SECTION. Section 1. Study of independent contractor exemption. (1) The commissioner of 12 LABOR AND INDUSTRY SHALL APPOINT AN ADVISORY COMMITTEE THAT WILL SERVE ON A VOLUNTEER BASIS TO DEFINE THE 13 TERM "INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR" AND STUDY THE ISSUES RELATED TO EXEMPTIONS OF INDEPENDENT CONTRACTORS 14 FROM COVERAGE UNDER THE WORKERS' COMPENSATION ACT. 15 (2) THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE MUST CONSIST OF: 16 (A) MEMBERS REPRESENTING BUSINESS AND COMMUNITY INTERESTS; 17 (B) MEMBERS REPRESENTING WORKERS' COMPENSATION INSURERS; 18 (C) MEMBERS REPRESENTING BUILDING CONTRACTORS OF WHOM AT LEAST ONE-HALF MUST BE INDEPENDENT 19 CONTRACTORS; 20 (D) MEMBERS REPRESENTING LABOR ORGANIZATIONS; AND 21 (E) A REPRESENTATIVE FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRY. 22 (3) THE COMMITTEE IS EXEMPT FROM THE REQUIREMENTS OF 2-15-122 OR 2-15-124. 23 (4) THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRY SHALL PERIODICALLY REPORT ITS FINDINGS AND PROGRESS TO 24 THE ECONOMIC AFFAIRS INTERIM COMMITTEE, INCLUDING ANY RECOMMENDATIONS FOR PROPOSED LEGISLATION TO THE 25 59TH LEGISLATURE REGARDING INDEPENDENT CONTRACTORS. 26 27 NEW SECTION. Section 2. Effective date -- applicability. [This act] is effective on passage and 28 approval and applies to independent contractor exemptions issued or renewed on or after [the effective date of 29 this act]. 30 - END -

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
