Certified Regional Development Corporations (Title 90, Chapter 1, Part 116 MCA)

- The goal of this program is to develop greater local capacity for economic development on a regional basis.
- Maximum of 12 regional development organizations that must work with communities throughout their service area to provide technical and financial assistance on economic and community development efforts.
- **Focus**, whenever and wherever possible, is to provide resources and assistance for economic development through local development organizations.
 - Selected and supported locally.
 - Closest to their customers.
 - Knowledge and commitment to their community.
- \$425,000 (statutory appropriation) matched \$1 to \$1 with local funds.

Qualifications For Certification:

- ***Written support from:***
 - All county governments.
 - A majority of all incorporated cities and towns.
 - A significant level of support from economic development organizations in the region.
- ***Experience and ability,***
 - Revolving loan funds.
 - Business technical assistance.
 - State and federal grants and programs.


Background

The 2003 Montana Legislature created the Certified Regional Development Corporations (CRDC) program. The legislative intent of the CRDC program is to encourage a regional approach to economic development that facilitates the efficient delivery of economic development programs by supporting regional capacity building.

As directed by HB76, the Department of Commerce (DOC) through the CRDC program designates up to 12 CRDCs and awards regional capacity building grants to match local economic development funds. \$425,000 annually was appropriated to the DOC by the legislature for this purpose. The Department of Commerce issued a request for proposals and has selected 12 CRDCs. The first year of funding has been advanced and the Department is preparing for the second round of funding in early 2005..

CRDCs are responsible for helping local officials, communities, and businesses "assess, plan, and facilitate action within their regions. The CRDC program promotes public and private sector partnerships at the regional level in order to identify and respond to economic development issues and opportunities facing each of Montana's diverse economic regions. Each CRDC is required to have the support of all the counties and a majority of the incorporated cities and towns in their region to obtain and maintain certification. This new program will help local officials, communities and businesses create new economic opportunities throughout the State of Montana.

CRDC Activities

CRDCs leverage scarce resources for economic development. Most local governments and communities lack the financial resources to hire and maintain professional economic development staff and find themselves in need of assistance in providing development services to local businesses and citizens. CRDC program funding supports local governments and communities in developing professional economic development capacity.

CRDCs provide professional economic development services. CRDCs have the resources: staff, knowledge and funds (albeit limited) and are better equipped than many local governments to provide economic development services. CRDC staffs are made up of professionals with a wide range of backgrounds in such areas as economic development, human services, management, and planning.

CRDCs facilitate the identification of priority needs of local communities. There is a clear recognition that local strategic planning is critical in developing local economies. CRDCs foster collaboration and bring elected officials, business leaders and stakeholders together to prepare and implement regional development strategies. CRDCs provide business technical assistance and financing.

CRDCs leverage financial resources from a variety of sectors that include government (federal, state, county and local), the private sector, philanthropic community and academia to aid in the expansion of their regions economy. For example, CRDCs manage Revolving Loan Funds (RLF) that are designed to assist new and/or expanding businesses. Business financing through an RLF assists in making a project a reality and thereby creating new local employment opportunities.
