

- Homeland Security -






-SECC Levels of Activation-



- Level ① - 24/hr Duty Officer
- Level ② - Duty Officer & SECC Manager
- Level ③ - Partial Activation with all ICS Functions operational, extended hours
- Level ④ - Full Activations with all ICS Functions filled, usually 24/hr operation
- Level ⑤ - Same as Level ④ but with MAC Group
