20	States , or its states, districts, territories, and commonwealths.
21	(2) An "authorized "Authorized insurer" is one an insurer duly authorized by subsisting a certificate of
22	authority issued by the commissioner to transact insurance in this state.
23	(3) A "domestic "Domestic insurer" is one an insurer incorporated under the laws of this state.
24	(4) A "foreign <u>"Foreign</u> insurer" is one <u>an insurer</u> formed under the laws of any jurisdiction other than this
25	state. Except where when distinguished by context, foreign insurer the term includes also an alien insurer.
26	(5) (a) "Insurance" is a contract whereby through which one undertakes to indemnify another or pay or
27	provide a specified or determinable amount or benefit upon determinable contingencies.
28	(b) Insurance does not include contracts for the installation, maintenance, and provision of inside
29	telecommunications wiring to residential or business premises.
30	(6) "Insurer" includes every person engaged as indemnitor, surety, or contractor in the business of
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1	entering into contracts of insurance. The te	rm also includes a health service corporation in the provisions listed
2	in 33-30-102.	
3	(7) A "resident <u>"Resident</u> domestic	c insurer" is an insurer incorporated under the laws of this state and:
4	(a) if a mutual company, not less the	nan one-half of the policyholders are natural persons <u>individuals</u> who
5	are residents of this state; or	
6	(b) if a stock insurer, not less than	one-half of the shares are owned by natural persons individuals who
7	are residents of this state and all of the dire	ectors and officers of the insurer are residents of this state.
8	(8) "State", when used relating in	relation to jurisdiction, means a state, the District of Columbia, or a
9	territory, commonwealth, or possession of	the United States.
10	(9) "Transact", with respect to insu	urance, includes any of the following <u>means to</u> :
11	(a) solicitation and inducement <u>so</u>	licit;
12	(b) preliminary negotiations negot	iate;
13	(c) effectuation of sell or effectuate	e a contract of insurance; or

 permitted to expire, after the farm mutual insurer has fully cured all failures that resulted in the expiration and

 certificate is not reinstated, the commissioner may grant a farm mutual insurer another certificate of authority only

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1 (b) the business entity has designated an individual licensed insurance producer who is responsible for 2 the business entity's compliance with the insurance laws of this state.

18 (4) The commissioner may license as a resident insurance producer an association of licensed Montana 19 insurance producers, whether or not incorporated, formed and existing substantially for purposes other than 20 insurance. The license must be used solely for the purpose of enabling the association to place, as a resident 21 insurance producer, insurance of the properties, interests, and risks of the state of Montana and of other public 22 agencies, bodies, and institutions and to receive the customary commission for the placement. The president and 23 secretary of the association shall apply for the license in the name of the association, and the commissioner shall 24 issue the license to the association in the association's name alone. The fee for the license is the same as that 25 required by 33-2-708(1)(a). 1 "33-17-1103. Accepting and paying commissions, fees, or consideration -- restriction. (1) An 2 insurer or insurance producer may not pay, directly or indirectly, a commission, service fee, brokerage fee, or 3 other valuable consideration to a person for services as an insurance producer unless the person performing the 4 service holds a valid license with regard to the kind or kinds of insurance for which the service was rendered at 5 the time the service was performed. A person not properly licensed in accordance with this chapter at the time the person performs the service as an insurance producer may not accept a commission, service fee, brokerage 6 7 fee, or other valuable consideration for the service. This section does not prevent payment or receipt of renewal 8 or other deferred commissions to or by a person entitled to receive the payment under this section.

9 (2) An insurance producer may not directly or indirectly share the insurance producer's commissions or 10 other compensation received or to be received by the insurance producer on account of a transaction under the 11 insurance producer's license with any person not also licensed under this chapter as to the same kind or kinds 12 of insurance involved in the transactions. This provision does not affect payment of the regular salaries due <u>to</u> 13 employees of the licensee, the distribution in regular course of business of compensation and profits among 14 members or stockholders if the licensee is a partnership or corporation, or use of funds for family or personal 15 purposes.

25 "33-19-105. Exemption based on federal standards for privacy of individually identifiable health 26 information -- notice to commissioner required -- rules. (1) The obligations imposed under this chapter do 27 not apply to a licensee that is a covered entity under the provisions of federal regulations that are part of the 28 federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA), 45 CFR, parts 160 and 164, 29 standards for privacy of individually identifiable health information <u>or security standards for the protection of</u> 30 <u>electronic health information</u> as to any use or disclosure of personal information that is covered under the HIPAA

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1 privacy and security regulations, except for the following provisions:

2 (a) A notice of insurance information practices described as a notice of privacy practices for protected 3 health information under HIPAA privacy regulations must be delivered annually, as provided for in 33-19-202(1).

4 (b) To the extent that an insurer collects, discloses, or uses personal information that is not covered 5 under the HIPAA notice of privacy practices, a separate Montana specific notice must be delivered pursuant to 6 the provisions of 33-19-202.

7 (c) A disclosure authorization remains valid for a period that does not exceed 24 months, as provided for in 33-19-206(2). 8

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(d) The reasons for an adverse underwriting decision must be specified, as provided for in 33-19-303.

10 (e) Disclosure of underwriting information is required, as provided for in 33-19-308.

11 (2) The commissioner may adopt rules regarding the exceptions from the exemption provisions 12 described in subsection (1), including additional exceptions that embody substantive provisions of this chapter 13 but would not be preempted by HIPAA privacy regulations.

14 (3) If a licensee considers itself exempt from a provision of this chapter for the reason provided in 15 subsection (1), the licensee shall give written notice to the commissioner of that exemption and a brief statement 16 describing why the licensee is a HIPAA-covered entity.

17 (4) A licensee may claim an exemption only for those lines of business that are subject to HIPAA privacy 18 regulations. All other lines of business are subject to this chapter.

19 (5) A third-party administrator business associate, as defined in the HIPAA privacy regulations, 45 CFR 20 160.103, that is a party to a valid business associate agreement required by HIPAA privacy regulations is exempt 21 from the provisions of this chapter, but only as to the scope of that particular agreement. Any activity of the 22 third-party administrator business associate that falls outside of the scope of that agreement is subject to the 23 provisions of this chapter.

24 (6) The commissioner retains the authority to conduct complete market conduct examinations of the 25 licensee as to the privacy policies and practices that are subject to state privacy laws.

26 (7) Beginning July 1, 2007 2009:

27 (a) if a licensee is subject to and in compliance with a federal regulation that is part of the federal health 28 insurance portability and accountability privacy and security regulations, 45 CFR, parts 160 and 164, and the 29 federal regulation with which the licensee complies is inconsistent with a provision of this chapter and not less 30 protective of consumer privacy, the licensee is exempt from compliance with the inconsistent provision of this



1 chapter;

(b) if a licensee considers itself exempt from a provision of this chapter for the reason provided in
subsection (7)(a), the licensee shall give written notice to the commissioner of that exemption, unless the
requirements of this subsection (7) are preempted by HIPAA privacy regulations. The notice must include a
statement of the reason for the claimed exemption."

8 "33-20-1303. License requirements. (1) A person may not act as or purport to be a viatical settlement
9 provider unless licensed as a viatical settlement provider under this part.

(2) (a) Except as provided in subsection (2)(b) and (2)(c), a person an individual may not broker, solicit,
 or negotiate viatical settlement contracts between a viator and one or more viatical settlement providers or
 otherwise act on behalf of a viator without first having obtained a license as a viatical settlement broker from the
 commissioner. An applicant for a viatical settlement broker's license shall:

(i) attend required viatical settlement broker training and pass a viatical settlement broker examination
 designated by the commissioner by rule; and

(ii) pay a fee for an original viatical settlement broker's license pursuant to 33-2-708. The fees for license
 renewal and lapsed license reinstatement for a viatical settlement broker's license are as provided in 33-2-708.

(b) A resident or nonresident insurance producer must be considered to meet the licensing requirements
 of a viatical settlement broker and must be permitted to operate as a viatical settlement broker if the insurance
 producer is licensed as an insurance producer with a life insurance line of authority in this state or in the
 insurance producer's home state and has been licensed for at least 1 year. In addition:

(i) not later than 30 days from the first day of operating as a viatical settlement broker, the insurance
producer shall notify the commissioner, on a form or in a manner prescribed by the commissioner, that the
insurance producer is acting as a viatical settlement broker and shall pay a fee pursuant to 33-2-708(1)(b)(viii).
The notification must include an acknowledgment by the insurance producer that the insurance producer will
operate as a viatical settlement broker in accordance with this part.

(ii) regardless of the manner in which the insurance producer is compensated, the insurance producer
must be considered to represent only the viator and owes a fiduciary duty to the viator to act according to the
viator's instructions and in the best interests of the viator.

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(c) If requested by the commissioner, a life insurance producer acting as a viatical settlement broker

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under this subsection (2) who has previously complied with subsection (2)(b)(i) shall report to the commissioner
when renewing a resident or nonresident life insurance producer's license regarding the life insurance producer's
intent to continue to act as a viatical settlement broker. The statement regarding an intent to continue acting as
a viatical settlement broker must be made on the life insurance producer's license renewal form. A person An
<u>individual</u> who makes a statement pursuant to this subsection (2)(c) may not be charged an additional fee.

6 (d) The provisions of subsections (2)(a) and (2)(b) do not prohibit a person <u>an individual</u> licensed as an 7 attorney, certified public accountant, or certified financial planner who is accredited by a nationally recognized 8 accreditation agency, who is retained to represent the viator, and whose compensation is not paid directly or 9 indirectly by the viatical settlement provider from negotiating viatical settlement contracts without having to obtain 10 a license as a viatical settlement broker.

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"33-38-105. Sale of medical care discount card by unregistered supplier prohibited --



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requirements for registration -- list of authorized enrollers required -- exceptions. (1) A medical care
 discount card supplier may not market, promote, sell, or distribute a medical care discount card in this state
 unless the supplier holds a certificate of registration as a supplier issued by the commissioner.

4 (2) An application to the commissioner for a certificate of registration must be accompanied by a 5 nonrefundable application fee of \$100. The commissioner shall issue the certificate unless the commissioner determines that the medical care discount card supplier or an officer or manager is not financially responsible, 6 7 does not have adequate expertise or experience to operate a medical care discount card business, or is not of 8 good character or that the supplier or its affiliates or a business formerly owned or managed by the supplier or 9 an officer or manager of the supplier has had a previous application for a certificate of registration denied, 10 revoked, suspended, or terminated for cause or is under investigation for or has been found in violation of a 11 statute or regulation in another any jurisdiction within the previous 5 years.
