4	A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT CREATING THE MONTANA SUSTAINABLE FORESTS USE ACT;
5	ESTABLISHING A STATE POLICY FOR MANAGEMENT OF <u>PUBLIC</u> FOREST LANDS; REQUIRING THE
6	DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES AND CONSERVATION TO SUPPORT RESTORATION AND
7	SUSTAINABLE FOREST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES; REQUIRING PROMOTION OF FOREST
8	MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES WITHIN AND ADJACENT TO THE WILDLAND URBAN INTERFACE; AND
9	GRANTING AUTHORITY TO INTERVENE IN LITIGATION OR APPEALS OF FEDERAL FOREST
10	MANAGEMENT PROJECTS."

12	WHEREAS, Montana's state, federal, tribal, and private PUBLIC forests are important environmental,
13	economic, and recreational resources; and
14	WHEREAS, fire suppression and lack of active management of ON SOME PUBLIC forests has led to
15	overstocked stands, unnatural distribution of tree species and age classes, and an increased susceptibility of
16	forests to insect and disease epidemics and uncharacteristic wildfires that threaten Montana communities and
17	watersheds; and
18	WHEREAS, two-thirds of the forests in Montana are managed by the federal government and include
19	some of the most important environmental, economic, and recreational resources in the state; and
20	WHEREAS, more than one-quarter of the forests in Montana are privately owned and help provide clean
21	air and water, timber and agroforestry products, fish and wildlife habitat, functional and intact watersheds,
22	recreational opportunities, aesthetics, and open space amenities; and
23	WHEREAS, successful forest management is hampered by political boundaries when different public and
24	private entities work independently and not cooperatively in promoting forest health and protection; and
25	WHEREAS, INNOVATIVE PARTNERSHIPS BETWEEN TRADITIONAL ADVERSARIES IN FEDERAL FOREST
26	MANAGEMENT DEMONSTRATE THAT CONSENSUS-BASED SOLUTIONS CAN BE REACHED ON LANDSCAPE LEVEL PROJECTS
27	ON FEDERAL LANDS THAT INTEGRATE ACTIVE FOREST MANAGEMENT, RESTORATION, AND STEWARDSHIP; AND
28	WHEREAS, the Department of Natural Resources and Conservation is uniquely situated to provide
29	expertise and guidance on the management of PUBLIC forests in Montana.
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1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
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3	<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 1. Short title. [Sections 1 through 3] may be cited as the "Montana
4	Sustainable Forests Use Act".
5	
6	NEW SECTION. Section 1. Findings and policy. (1) The legislature finds that the sustainable
7	management of all PUBLIC forests in Montana is vital to conserving the state's natural resources and their
8	economic and ecological potential for the benefit of all Montanans.
9	(2) The legislature finds that <u>PUBLIC</u> forests in Montana should be <u>SUSTAINABLY</u> managed to maintain
10	biodiversity, productivity, regeneration capacity, vitality, and potential to fulfill relevant ecological, economic, and
11	social functions.
12	(3) The legislature finds that sustainable forest stewardship and management of Montana's
13	PUBLIC FORESTS REQUIRES A BALANCED APPROACH THAT ENSURES A STABLE TIMBER SUPPLY, ACTIVE RESTORATION,
14	HEALTHY WATERSHEDS AND FISH AND WILDLIFE HABITAT, AREAS FOR NATURAL PROCESSES, AND ALLOWANCES FOR
15	RECREATIONAL MULTIPLE USES.
16	(3)(4) The legislature declares that it is the policy of this state to promote the sustainable use of all <u>PUBLIC</u>
17	forests within the state through sound management and collaboration with LOCAL, state ,, AND federal, and private
18	entities.
19	
20	NEW SECTION. Section 2. Duties authority. To implement the policy of [section 2] [SECTION 1], the
21	department of natural resources and conservation shall:
22	(1) support forest restoration and sustainable forest management practices on private, state, and federal
23	forests in Montana, including forest restoration, on public forests in Montana consistent with all
24	APPLICABLE LAWS AND ADMINISTRATIVE REQUIREMENTS;
25	(2) provide technical INFORMATION and educational assistance to NONINDUSTRIAL, private forest
26	landowners;
27	(3) promote forest management activities within and adjacent to the wildland urban interface and promote
28	the implementation of community wildfire protection plans;
29	(4) promote the maintenance of a viable forest and wood products industry AND OTHER BUSINESSES AND
30	INDIVIDUAL ACTIVITIES THAT RELY ON PUBLIC FOREST LANDS;
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1	(5) represent the state's interest in the federal forest management planning and policy process, including
2	establishing cooperative agency status with federal agencies;
3	(6) provide information and assistance for PROMOTE the development of an independent, long-term
4	sustained yield calculation on Montana's federal forests;
5	(7) have the authority to intervene in litigation or appeals on federal forest management projects that
6	comply with the policy in [section 2] [SECTION 1] AND IN WHICH LOCAL AND STATE INTERESTS ARE CLEARLY INVOLVED;
7	(8) have the authority to enter into agreements with federal agencies to participate in forest management
8	activities on federal lands; and
9	(9) coordinate with government entities, nongovernmental organizations, and private entities to comply
10	with the provisions of [sections 1 through 3].
11	(9) PARTICIPATE IN AND FACILITATE COLLABORATION BETWEEN TRADITIONAL FOREST INTERESTS IN REACHING
12	CONSENSUS-BASED SOLUTIONS ON FEDERAL LAND MANAGEMENT ISSUES.
13	
14	NEW SECTION. Section 4. Notification to tribal governments. The secretary of state shall send a
15	copy of [this act] to each tribal government located on the seven Montana reservations and to the Little Shell
16	Chippewa tribe.
17	
18	NEW SECTION. Section 3. Codification instruction. [Sections 1 through 3] [Sections 1 AND 2] are
19	intended to be codified as an integral part of Title 76, chapter 13, and the provisions of Title 76, chapter 13, apply
20	to [sections 1 through 3] [SECTIONS 1 AND 2].
