4	A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF
5	MONTANA SUPPORTING THE DEVELOPMENT OF SECURE AND CONFIDENTIAL HEALTH INFORMATION
6	TECHNOLOGY AND EXCHANGE IN LOCAL COMMUNITIES.
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8	WHEREAS, the rising cost of health care is the significant factor accounting for the decline in insurance
9	coverage rates, and 60% of Americans are worried about the rising cost of health insurance; and
10	WHEREAS, the average cost of health care for each individual in 2004 was \$6,280, and the United States
11	spent almost \$1.9 trillion dollars, or 16% of its gross domestic product, on health care; and
12	WHEREAS, according to a 2006 survey by the Kaiser Family Foundation, 80% of Americans are
13	dissatisfied with "the total cost of health care in this country" and 54% of Americans are dissatisfied with "the
14	quality of health care in this country"; and
15	WHEREAS, health information technology is the network infrastructure and health information exchange
16	is the comprehensive management of medical information and its secure exchange between health care
17	consumers and providers; and
18	WHEREAS, health information technology and health information exchange may slow the rising cost of
19	health care by eliminating unnecessary or duplicate procedures, decreasing paperwork, and increasing
20	administrative efficiencies; and
21	WHEREAS, health information technology and health information exchange will allow health care
22	providers to access relevant information about patients in a timely manner, thereby reducing medical errors
23	allowing for more accurate diagnoses, and bettering patient care; and
24	WHEREAS, with health information technology and health information exchange capabilities
25	communities will be able to communicate and respond to local health emergencies more quickly and more
26	efficiently; and
27	WHEREAS, states that have used this technology report beneficial results that include but are not limited
28	to a reduction in the number of patients who stopped taking medication prematurely, access to useful information
29	in emergency room situations, increased adherence to guideline or protocol-based care, and increased ability
30	to measure and improve performance.



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1 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE
