Property Rights - These states' courts have clearly stated that economic development is not a valid "public use", or have adopted a definition so restrictive the question could not reasonably arise.

Leans Toward Property Rights - These states' courts have indicated that a restrictive definition of "public use" would apply, but is still subject to challenge.

Undetermined - These states have shown no tendency in either direction or have conflicting cases.

Leans Toward Government Power - These states' courts have indicated a willingness to expand the definition of "public use" and accommodate government interests.

Favors Government Power - These states' courts or constitutions clearly provide broad definitions of "public use", and the federal constitutional standard applies (*i.e.*, economic development can be an appropriate "public use").
