## House Appropriations Committee HB 550

Mr. Chairman, members of the committee, the Montana Democratic Women's Legislative Caucus urges a "do pass" on HB 550. While Indian Education for All was included in the MT Constitution in 1972, it has only been funded since 2005 – in 2005 the funding was \$68.00 per ANB, in 2007 it was \$30.00 per ANB.

There have been some great accomplishments in these past four years throughout our classrooms in Montana. Teachers are receiving training, materials are being developed and our school students are learning about Montana's tribal nations. But, we cannot reduce the funding and expect this to continue – we must provide the resources to make sure IEA is a solid part of all classrooms for all Montana's students.

We know that these are difficult economic times but it's critical to the future health of our state that we all understand and acknowledge the impact of the American Indian heritage and its contributions to Montana as our constitutional delegates intended.

Our schools need adequate funding to continue to provide teacher training, to purchase materials for instruction, to help with curriculum integration and support student activities. We can't reduce the funding and hope for success.

Dear Reps. Pease-Lopez and Sesso,

My name is Doug Ruhman. I am a faculty member at Salish Kootenai College in Pablo. I have been a classroom teacher for 21 years, and I am currently involved in teacher training at SKC in the Education Department. Our bachelors degree program in elementary education is the first new K-8 teacher training program approved by the state in decades, and the first 4-year licensing program at a tribal college in Montana. I am honored and proud to work as an instructor at SKC.

Besides instructing courses to upcoming student teachers, I am responsible for placing our students in K-12 classrooms here on the Reservation for practicum and student teaching. In this capacity I have been fortunate to be in many different grade levels and classrooms over the past several years. Since Indian Education for All clarified the constitutional directive to include the unique cultural heritage of Montana's Indian people in school curricula, I have seen substantial inroads towards improved awareness and cooperation with regard to Indian education, especially in and around Reservation communities. Relations between Native families and the schools that serve their children have improved, and non-Indian teachers are now beginning to get over the fear and uncertainty which characterized the first years of IEFA. In the short time since OPI was given the means to support curriculum development through IEFA, amazing materials have been produced and made available to students, teachers, and parents. What this legislation has accomplished both in terms of student knowledge and with relations between tribal and school communities has been very encouraging. This is particularly observable in Indian Country, but much less so in Montana's mostly non-Indian communities. With increased funding, the full promise of IEFA can be expanded and made more accessible to all of Montana's children- in keeping with the intent and spirit of the legislation.

That much has been accomplished with IEFA- given its relatively meager appropriation- is a testimonial to the resolve and dedication of Montana's education community. With the increased funding level proposed by Rep. Sands' HB 550, Montana educators at all levels can really go to the next level and see to it that our schools meet and exceed their constitutional and ethical responsibility to address Indian education issues. Further curricular materials can be developed and older ones refined to better address the ever-changing standards that exist in the education world.

I urge you to support HB 550 because we have worked so hard to set good work in motion, and now more than ever we need to see to it that our state's commitment to Indian education becomes a norm, not just a one time notion.



**Article X, 1 (2) "The state recognizes the distinct and unique cultural heritage of the American Indian and is committed in its educational goals to the preservation of their cultural integrity"**

***Montana schools need continued funding to implement quality Indian Ed. for All.***

***We cannot go backwards – we must go forward and provide resources for all students and their teachers in Montana to fully implement Indian Education for All.***

**Indian Education for All is...**

- A Montana constitutional promise (Article X, 1 (2))  
*(it is the only educational program specifically referenced in the Constitution)*
- In statute with legislative intent in 20-1-501 and in the definition of a quality education in SB 152 (20-9-309)
- Part of what makes up a "Quality Education" as required by the Court in 1989 and 2005 and clarified in the 2008 decision
- Good for all Montana students – it will continue to build a better Montana for all citizens.

**20-9-329. Indian Education for All payment to K-12 schools 2005 - 2009**

**Funding per ANB declines each biennium**

**2005 Special Session 2005 (after Court Decision) – for one school year - 2006-07**

\$68.01 per ANB

## Indian Education for All - Supportive Documentation

Article X, 1 (2) "The state recognizes the distinct and unique cultural heritage of the American Indian and is committed in its educational goals to the preservation of their cultural integrity"



### Montana - Indian Education for All Statute (HB 528) - 1999

**20-1-501. Recognition of American Indian cultural heritage -- legislative intent.** (1) It is the constitutionally declared policy of this state to recognize the distinct and unique cultural heritage of American Indians and to be committed in its educational goals to the preservation of their cultural heritage.

(2) It is the intent of the legislature that in accordance with Article X, section 1(2), of the Montana constitution:

(a) every Montanan, whether Indian or non-Indian, be encouraged to learn about the distinct and unique heritage of American Indians in a culturally responsive manner; and

(b) every educational agency and all educational personnel will work cooperatively with Montana tribes or those tribes that are in close proximity, when providing instruction or when implementing an educational goal or adopting a rule related to the education of each Montana citizen, to include information specific to the cultural heritage and contemporary contributions of American Indians, with particular emphasis on Montana Indian tribal groups and governments.

(3) It is also the intent of this part, predicated on the belief that all school personnel should have an understanding and awareness of Indian tribes to help them relate effectively with Indian students and parents, that educational personnel provide means by which school personnel will gain an understanding of and appreciation for the American Indian people.

**Montana "Quality Education Definition"**  
**SB 152 (2005 Session)**

*Note those in BOLD that are specific to Indian Education For All*

20-9-309. Basic system of free quality public elementary and secondary schools defined -- identifying educationally relevant factors -- establishment of funding formula and budgetary structure -- legislative review. (1) Pursuant to Article X, section 1, of the Montana constitution, the legislature is required to provide a basic system of free quality public elementary and secondary schools throughout the state of Montana that will guarantee equality of educational opportunity to all.

(2) As used in this section, a "basic system of free quality public elementary and secondary schools" means:

**(c) educational programs to implement the provisions of Article X, section 1(2), of the Montana constitution and Title 20, chapter 1, part 5, through development of curricula designed to integrate the distinct and unique cultural heritage of American Indians into the curricula, with particular emphasis on Montana Indians;**

**Excerpts - Helena School District v State, 769 P.2d 684 (S.Ct. Montana.1989)**

The Montana Supreme Court held that Article X, 1 (2) "establishes a special burden in Montana for the education of American Indian children which must be addressed as a part of the school funding issues."

**Excerpts - Supreme Court Decision, March 23, 2005: Issue 4:**

35 The District Court concluded that the State has failed to recognize the distinct and unique cultural heritage of American Indians and that it has shown no commitment in its educational goals to the preservation of Indian cultural identity, as demanded by Article X, Section 1 (2).

**Excerpts - Sherlock Decision - April 2004**

MONTANA FIRST JUDICIAL DISTRICT COURT, LEWIS AND CLARK COUNTY (Trial in this matter occurred from January 20 to February 4, 2004.)

174. In *Helena Elementary I*, the Montana Supreme Court addressed this subsection and held that "[T]he provision establishes a special burden in Montana for the education of American Indian children which must be addressed as part of the school funding....Despite this admonition by the supreme court, it would appear that nothing has been done to effectuate subsection (2) of Article X, Section 1 of the Montana Constitution....

177. To have any meaning or effect, the Indian Education for All Act requires resources and programs, which, in turn, require funding. Despite this, the legislature has provided no funding.

178. In reality, the State appears to be defenseless on Plaintiffs' claim that Article X, Section 1(2) of the Montana Constitution has not been implemented by the State despite the constitution's direction to do so.
