Linda McCulloch, Secretary of State of the State of Montana, extended greetings to the members on behalf of the State of Montana and then delivered the following speech:

“Good morning and welcome to Day One of Montana’s 62nd Legislative Session. Welcome to Helena and if it is your first Session as a Legislator, welcome to the People’s House. I’d like to introduce you to my Goddaughter who is visiting with me this week and helping me open today’s House Session. Please welcome Ms. Katelyn Weldon. Katelyn is a 6th grader at Blue Creek Elementary School in Billings. Some of you might remember her father, former Senator Jeff Weldon. Welcome to the House, Katelyn! Sixteen years ago in the 54th Legislative Session, I sat in your seat Rep. McClafferty, and then in later sessions, your seat, Rep. Mehlhoff. In that 54th Session, I served with: Lieutenant Governor John Bohlinger (Seat: Rep. O’Neil, 1995-1997) Former Lieutenant Governor Karl Ohs (Seats: Rep. Gibson 1995, Rep. McGillvray 1997-1999) Governor Schweitzer’s Budget Director David Ewer (Seat: Rep. Reinhart, 1995) Public Service Commissioner Brad Molnar (Seat: Rep. Loney 1995-97, Rep.

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MacLaren 1999) Rep. Squires (Seat: Rep. Frank Smith 1995 and, Rep. Edmunds 1997-99) The stories I could tell about Rep. Squires back in the olden days. It seems to me a good time to start to get to know your fellow Legislators and start to build your own stories and fond memories of your Legislative experience. Let's take a minute and start to build some collegial relationships: How many of you are first time Legislators, House or Senate? Raise your hands, keep them raised and look around at your colleagues. How many of you are serving in the Legislature of two or more years? Raise your hand if you have had family members serve in the Legislature? Anybody have a family member right now - in either the House or the Senate? Did any of you serve as a page in your earlier years? Did any of you visit this Capitol back in the day as a student on a field trip? How many of you drove more than 250 miles to get here to Helena for today? How many of you have served as an elected official in another capacity other than the Legislature (i.e. school board, mayor, county commissioner, etc.)? I remember the opening of my first Legislative Session. I walked into this chamber wondering what would be accomplished. Would my bills pass? What would be the final outcome of the Session? Folks in this chamber and around Montana are wondering what will be the outcome of the 62nd Legislative Session. What will this Legislature be known for? History does keep track of each Legislative Session, some more prominently than others. Will this chamber be known for compromising, or for bickering? Will party-line votes outweigh bipartisan support? And will you and your constituents be proud of the work that's accomplished? One of the early lessons I learned in public service as a young teacher is 'Just because you have the right to do something, doesn't mean it's the right thing to do...Just because you have the right to do something, doesn't mean it's the right thing to do.' Just because one party has the votes to outweigh another party, doesn't mean they should abuse their authority; Just because another party has the power of the veto, doesn't mean they should rely on it; and just because you have all been elected to serve your constituents, doesn't mean you should forget your neighbors. I think this is such an important message that many years ago I typed it on construction paper, using my Apple IIE computer. I hung on a wall in my classroom, I brought it with me to each Legislative Session, it hung in my office at OPI and now you will find it in my office downstairs at the Secretary of State's Office. It's just that important of a message. Just because you have the right to do something, doesn't mean it's the right thing to do. What matters most in the next 90 days, is that each of you has the power to do good work for the people of Montana. No one back home sends you here for negative reasons. Regardless, of whether they voted for you or not, they want you to do good for the people of Montana all the people of Montana. My first session in the House looked a lot like this one. Republicans held a majority over Democrats: 67 to 33. There is one more Republican this Session with 68 Republicans and 32 Democrats. The Senate was also similar with 17 Democrats and 33 Republicans in 1995 and now 22 Democrats and 28 Republicans this Session. In that 1995 Session the Governor was a Republican. Despite a 2 to 1 stronghold, both parties worked well together. Many of us – on both sides of the aisle - were able to pass our bills with strong support. Sure, we disagreed. But we respected each other and considered all opinions before making a decision. Compromise happened then, it's happened since then, and you all have the power to ensure it happens in the next 90 days. You are in this room because your constituents believe in your ability to reason, to work through disagreements, and to approach policy making in a civil manner. They want you to not only stand firm in your beliefs, but also to remember that you work for them – their beliefs matter most. Let's start this session on more than just a promise to work together. Let's start on the other side of the aisle literally! Please stand up. Now I want you to walk across the aisle – and

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introduce yourself to someone from a different party. Preferably someone whom you do not know. I want you to introduce yourself, shake hands or hug three people not from your own party. You absolutely cannot come back to your own seat until you have met at least three legislators not from your own party. Now get busy! At the end of the day, it's not about Democrat ideas or Republican ideas. It's about ideas that help Montanans. It's about supporting the good ideas, the fair ideas. Remember the issues. Remember the people you work for. Remember: Just because you have the right to do something, doesn't mean it's the right thing to do. And remember that you're on TV! Montanans are watching. Please join me in waving to the Montana school kids all over the state who are watching this ceremony today! What will the 62nd Montana Legislature be known for? The 100 of you sitting in this historic chamber in the seats of past Legislators will decide. The people of Montana await your decisions."

Secretary of State McCulloch introduced the Honorable Mike McGrath, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Montana. Representative McNutt and Representative Hollenbaugh escorted Chief Justice McGrath into the chamber.

Chief Justice McGrath administered the following oath of office:

"I do solemnly swear that I will support, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Montana and that I will discharge the duties of my office as a Montana State Representative with fidelity, so help me God. "

Secretary of State McCulloch thanked Chief Justice McGrath, and informed the members of the House of Representatives that he had been advised that all oaths of office had been signed and received. These were presented to the Chief Justice McGrath for his acknowledgment and then filed in the Secretary of State's office.

Secretary of State McCulloch called for nominations for the office of the Speaker of the House. Representative McGillvray nominated Representative Milburn. Representative Sesso moved that the nominations be closed. Motion passed.

Secretary McCulloch declared that Representative Milburn had been duly elected speaker of the House of Representatives for the 62nd Legislature. Representatives Reichner and Sesso escorted Speaker Milburn to the rostrum.

Speaker Milburn thanked Secretary McCulloch, Chief Justice McGrath, Professor Miles, and Mr. Milburn on behalf of the House and Representatives Arntzen and Hunter escorted them from the House.

Speaker Milburn addressed the House.

Representative McGillvray moved the following individuals be nominated as officers as the House of Representatives. Chief Clerk - Beth Cargo. Sergeant-at-Arms - Russ Bean. The House officers were appointed by unanimous consent.

Representative McGillvray moved that Representative Taylor be nominated as Speaker Pro-

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Tem of the House of Representatives. Representative Taylor was unanimously elected.

Chief Clerk Cargo read the following announcements from the Caucus:

"This is to advise you that the caucuses have elected the following officials." House Majority leader - Representative Tom McGillvray. House Minority Leader - Representative Jon Sesso. House Majority Whips - Representative Gerald Bennett, Representative Keith Regier, Representative Cary Smith and Representative Wendy Warburton.
