

## LIBRARY STATE AID PER CAPITA/PER SQUARE MILE

Your Montana public libraries are in critical need of an increase in state aid funding. Funding for libraries at the federal, state and local level has declined, yet demand for library services continues to rise. The per capita, per square mile funding is the **only source of state aid** that local libraries can use to address the individual needs of their libraries, whatever they may be.

Following are some of the responses from Montana libraries that reflect their most pressing needs and how additional state aid funds would be applied in their community.

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The Joliet Public Library is situated in a small rural community and has seen an incredible increase in patrons and usage over the past 5 years. The additional funding that would result if HB203 were passed would be a welcome increase to our yearly budget and could be best used by this facility in the following ways:

- JPL would update & streamline its website to better allow our rural patrons to better access our collection via the internet to reserve, renew & place holds on library materials.
- Add additional staffing to assist with our ever-increasing after school student book clubs.
- Extend library hours during the summer months

Since we became an independent library district, this cost is now assumed by our General Fund so I can repurpose Per Capita/Per Square Mile monies for enhancement such as online tools. This year we used it for our HeritageQuest/Ancestry.com subscription and had enough left over to purchase World Book online. Since the beginning HeritageQuest was paid

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I use a great portion of that money for our summer reading program. We do not have very many kids (around 12-15) and I usually buy them all something special at the end of the program - one year book bags with our library name, one year caps - one year mugs so any increase would be welcome to bring the kids into the library. I have used it to purchase books for summer reading also.

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The Darby Community Public Library relies on governmental revenues, grants, private donations and contributions to continue our service to the community. This increase in state aid supplies a crucial need for our library as we struggle to continue community services at the present level. With a yearly operating budget of less than \$100,000 and a staff of two FTE, we persistently struggle to provide access, materials, information, and educational programs for a population of 4000 residents.

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Having that additional money would mean a lot for our small budget. Our critical needs right now are

- building maintenance and upgrades.
- improving staff salaries
- hoping to expand hours (which also means additional hours for current staff or new part-time staff positions).

The additional money would most likely assist with the building maintenance and upgrades that we have continually put off. Our FOL group has some money ready to use for a larger project, so we are investigating possibilities. We are working to get a quote from our service provider for an HVAC upgrade which is desperately needed. (When the building was expanded in 2005 a new HVAC system was put in, but just tied into the old system including the old boiler in the Carnegie part of the building. After the fact, it was realized that this was a horrible mistake. Heating and cooling are a constant problem for us.) Another thing we are looking into is whether it is possible to reallocate space in the library to better use what little we have (especially for storage and staff workspace which are both woefully inadequate). This would involve some renovation, but the extent of this potential project has not yet been determined.

On a smaller level (cost-wise), we would like to have more outreach services, especially to shut-ins and care facilities. Additional funding such as this might really make it do-able!

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I can tell you that any additional funding my library receives will most likely go toward an outreach program that I'm trying to get started here. It's called the North Valley Storyline, and it's very similar to Marilyn Trosper's (North Lake County Library in Polson) Story Shuttle. Following is a proposal that I sent to a local car dealership with a request for a donation of a vehicle. Feel free to use the information in the proposal any way you see fit.

#### **North Valley Storyline**

The *North Valley Storyline* is an early literacy outreach initiative by the North Valley Public Library. *Storyline* will bring library services right to the front doors of child care centers in Stevensville, Lone Rock and Florence. A library staff person will drive a van to each child care center on a weekly basis to read a story to the children and engage them in a fun and enriching educational activity. We will provide a tub containing books, puppets and toys for the child care provider to use while presenting their own storytimes between *Storyline* visits. Additionally, we will leave a bag of books for the children to borrow and enjoy. The process repeats once a

week, with the library staff person switching out storytime tubs and book bags during each visit. *Storyline* will also act somewhat like a bookmobile, picking up and delivering library materials to two convenient locations on the edges of our service area. This will increase use of library materials and save residents who live in outlying areas a trip into Stevensville. Further, the *Storyline* may be able to provide a pick-up and delivery service directly to homebound residents in our district.

Several child care providers in our service area have expressed interest in bringing the children they care for to the library for storytimes and special events. Unfortunately, due to the high cost of insurance, vehicles and car seats, they are not able to safely transport groups of children from their businesses to the library. Lack of transportation prohibits many children from important library experiences, which are especially impactful on toddlers and preschoolers. This age group is at significant risk of not being "reading ready" unless given enriching language and literacy learning tools. Research shows that children need wide exposure to high-quality books of various topics and perspectives in order to acquire literacy skills. Child care centers often do not have the ability to continually purchase new learning materials. The library can facilitate effective dissemination of high-quality books, toys and activities to toddlers and preschoolers in our community through the *Storyline* program.

Many of the people who reside within our library district live and work on the outer edges of the service area. This creates a disadvantage for patrons who cannot easily drop off and pick up library materials. The elderly, disabled, single parent households and those unable to drive in winter weather are impacted by late fees, inadequate access to materials and even a lack of knowledge of the library. A mobile library service such as *Storyline* will positively impact those in the community who have limited access to the bricks-and-mortar library.

North Valley Public Library strives to be an exemplar for early childhood education by acting as a resource as well as providing outreach to the community. The *Storyline* is a perfect combination of the two, physically going out into the community to provide children with early literacy resources and to foster the love of books and learning. The *Storyline* will increase partnerships with fellow early childhood educators. This alliance will bring increased awareness of the importance of literacy development as well as the resources available to parents and the community.

Providing a mobile service to the outlying service area will make our services more convenient and easier to use. And by bringing library services to those who are physically unable to come to us, the *Storyline* van will fulfill the obligation of a library to provide equal access of information to the entire community. Driving a van full of books around to the residents of our community will have tremendous positive impacts on everyone involved.

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Additional state aid funding for the Lewis & Clark Library would be applied directly to our branch libraries to support and help sustain outreach throughout Lewis & Clark County, serving a geographic area of just under 3,500 square miles. This includes our new mobile branch that brings library services and technology directly to our users in rural areas such as Canyon Creek, Canyon Ferry, and Wolf Creek, the Milford Hutterite Colony, where young adults, particularly young women, who have already completed their 8<sup>th</sup> grade education, continue to have access to books, educational materials and a link to life-long learning; to assisted living and nursing home facilities; to the county detention center. Access to computers and training for veterans to access the online My Healthy Vet Program, where they can enter VA prescription refill requests; view VA wellness reminders, and connect with their primary care provide via e-mail.
