Residency

Established in 1995, the Montana Family Medicine Residency trains and places Family Physicians in rural and underserved Montana communities. The residency offers the required three years of primary care specialty training to eight residents per year after medical school necessary for the graduate to become a Board Certified Family Physician. MFMR provides a home location for State funded WWAMI and WICHE students to complete their training. Since inception, 83 physicians have graduated, and more than 70% of them are practicing in rural and underserved areas.

Funding:

- 70% from the two Billings hospitals, from federal graduate medical education (GME) pass through funding in addition to hospital contributions.
- 19% from RiverStone Health.
- 8% from the State of Montana – funding was reduced in 2002 and has been frozen at that level.
- 3% from minor federal grants as well as projects associated with the University of Washington.


Residency Contributions:

- 60 MFMR graduates are practicing Family Medicine in Montana (72%)
- All graduates have passed the Board Certification examination.
- Residency staff provides primary care to over 18,000 underserved and mostly uninsured patients through RiverStone Health Community Health Center Clinic.
- Faculty and residents provide supervision and teaching to medical students in the WWAMI program and other medical schools, Rocky Mountain College PA students, Montana State University Nurse Practitioner students, University of Montana Pharmacy students and other healthcare students during their clinical rotations.
- Over 125 hours of accredited continuing medical education conferences and courses are offered annually by the residency to the medical community.
- Faculty contribute to national healthcare efforts in family medicine residency, health center policy, and evidence-based medicine.

Well Respected and Nationally Sought:

- This year, more than 780 applicants for 8 placements, including 11 medical students from Montana, who are participating in the WWAMI or WICHE programs.
- In partnership with RiverStone Health Community Health Center Clinic, was one of 11 national initial teaching health center grant awardees.
