Re: HB 389 (Telemedicine) - HIPAA-compliant videoconferencing and statewide broadband access

Dear Representative Wagoner:

On behalf of the Montana Medical Association and our members, I am writing to offer you supplemental information concerning the availability of HIPAA-compliant videoconferencing platforms and broadband internet access in Montana, as those issues relate to House Bill 389.

At the recent hearing, Senate Public Health Chairman David Howard requested clarification about the availability of HIPAA-compliant videoconferencing platforms, including FaceTime and Skype. We consulted with the Montana Telehealth Alliance and learned that there are numerous HIPAA-compliant platforms already in use, including: Zoom, InTouch Health, Lifesize Video, Cisco Jabber-Desktop, and Vidyo, to name a few. Additionally, Teladoc, Inc. representative, Claudia Tucker, testified that her Texas-based corporation has a HIPAA-compliant videoconferencing platform it utilizes in providing telemedicine services. With regard to Skype and FaceTime, on the other hand, it is our understanding that those platforms can be configured in a way that meets HIPAA requirements, but legal review would be necessary to confirm compliance on a case-by-case basis. Regardless, there are many other platforms currently available and already in use that support HIPAA-compliant videoconferencing that would readily satisfy the audio-visual component of HB 389, including Teladoc, Inc.'s own platform.

As to internet access, the lobbyist for Teladoc, Inc. testified that 78% of Montana does not have broadband internet capable of supporting audio-visual communication. We disagree. According to information from VisionNet, Mid-Rivers Communications, and the Federal Communications Commission (see attached maps), most of Montana has broadband connectivity. HB 389's first-visit audio-visual requirement, therefore, will not as a practical matter limit or prohibit access to telemedicine services in rural Montana. Instead, it will preserve the quality of care being delivered to all Montana residents, and ensure that patient care and safety is not sacrificed in the name of convenience.

Indeed, one has to wonder why a company with HIPAA-compliant videoconferencing capabilities already integrated into its platform would insist so strongly that two-way audio-visual communication be removed from the bill. The apparent motivation is to preserve the ability to provide one-off care to patients over the telephone, without any face-to-face interaction, which is not good medicine, and puts Montanans at risk.

We continue to urge your support for HB 389, as drafted, and to oppose the Teladoc, Inc. amendment.

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
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
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




National Broadband Map How connected is my community?
