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13	Section 1. Section 20-1-101, MCA, is amended to read:
14	"20-1-101. Definitions. As used in this title, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise, the
15	following definitions apply:
16	(1) "Accreditation standards" means the body of administrative rules governing standards such as:
17	(a) school leadership;
18	(b) educational opportunity;
19	(c) academic requirements;
20	(d) program area standards;
21	(e) content and performance standards;
22	(f) school facilities and records;
23	(g) student assessment; and
24	(h) general provisions.
25	(2) "Aggregate hours" means the hours of pupil instruction for which a school course or program is
26	offered or for which a pupil is enrolled.
27	(3) "Agricultural experiment station" means the agricultural experiment station established at Montana
28	state university-Bozeman.

7	Montana cor	nstitution and 2-15-1507.
8	(7)	"Board of regents" means the board of regents of higher education created by Article X, section 9,
9	subsection (2	2), of the Montana constitution and 2-15-1505.
10	(8)	"Commissioner" means the commissioner of higher education created by Article X, section 9,
11	subsection (2	2), of the Montana constitution and 2-15-1506.
12	(9)	"County superintendent" means the county government official who is the school officer of the
13	county.	
14	(10)	"District superintendent" means a person who holds a valid class 3 Montana teacher certificate
15	with a superi	ntendent's endorsement that has been issued by the superintendent of public instruction under the
16	provisions of	this title and the policies adopted by the board of public education and who has been employed by
17	a district as a	a district superintendent.
18	(11)	(a) "Educational program" means a set of educational offerings designed to meet the program
19	area standar	ds contained in the accreditation standards.
20	(b)	The term does not include an educational program or programs used in 20-4-121 and 20-25-803.
21	(12)	"K-12 career and vocational/technical education" means organized educational activities that have
22	been approv	ed by the office of public instruction and that:
23	(a)	offer a sequence of courses that provide a pupil with the academic and technical knowledge and
24	skills that the	e pupil needs to prepare for further education and for careers in the current or emerging
25	employment	sectors; and
26	(b)	include competency-based applied learning that contributes to the academic knowledge, higher-
27	order reason	ing and problem-solving skills, work attitudes, general employability skills, technical skills, and
28	occupation-s	specific skills of the pupil.

1 (13) (a) "Minimum aggregate hours" means the minimum hours of pupil instruction that must be 2 conducted during the school fiscal year in accordance with 20-1-301 and includes passing time between 3 classes.

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(b) The term does not include lunch time and periods of unstructured recess.

5 (14) "Offsite instructional setting" means an instructional setting at a location, separate from a main 6 school site, where a school district provides for the delivery of instruction to a student who is enrolled in the 7 district.

8 (15) "Principal" means a person who holds a valid class 3 Montana teacher certificate with an 9 applicable principal's endorsement that has been issued by the superintendent of public instruction under the 10 provisions of this title and the policies adopted by the board of public education and who has been employed by 11 a district as a principal. 16 pursuant to 20-5-101 and who is enrolled in a school established and maintained under the laws of the state at

17 public expense. For purposes of calculating the average number belonging pursuant to 20-9-311, the definition

18 of pupil includes a person who has not yet reached 19 years of age by September 10 of the year and is enrolled

19 under 20-5-101(3) in a school established and maintained under the laws of the state at public expense. The

20 eligibility of pupils and calculations for average number belonging are governed by 20-9-311.

- 21 (17) "Pupil instruction" means the conduct of organized instruction of pupils enrolled in public schools 22 while under the supervision of a teacher.
- 23 (18) "Qualified and effective teacher or administrator" means an educator who is licensed and

24 endorsed in the areas in which the educator teaches, specializes, or serves in an administrative capacity as 25 established by the board of public education.

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(19) "Regents" means the board of regents of higher education.

27 (20) "Regular school election" or "trustee election" means the election for school board members held 28 on the day established in 20-20-105(1).

1	(21) "School election" means a regular school election or any election conducted by a district or
2	community college district for authorizing taxation, authorizing the issuance of bonds by an elementary, high

25	(27) "Superintendent of public instruction" means that state government official designated as a
26	member of the executive branch by the Montana constitution.
27	(28) "System" means the Montana university system.
28	(29) "Teacher" means a person, except a district superintendent, who holds a valid Montana teacher

8	sell, or offering for adoption textbooks to districts in the state.
9	(32) "Trustees" means the governing board of a district.
10	(33) "University" means the university of Montana-Missoula.
11	(34) "Vocational-technical education" means vocational-technical education of vocational-technical
12	students that is conducted by a unit of the Montana university system, a community college, or a tribally
13	controlled community college, as designated by the board of regents."

5	"20-5-101. Admittance of child to school. (1) The trustees shall assign and admit a child to a school
6	in the district when the child is:
7	(a) 5 years of age or older on or before September 10 of the year in which the child is to enroll but is
8	not yet 19 years of age;
9	(b) a resident of the district; and
10	(c) otherwise qualified under the provisions of this title to be admitted to the school.
11	(2) The trustees of a district may assign and admit any nonresident child to a school in the district
12	under the tuition provisions of this title.
13	(3) The trustees may at their discretion assign and admit to a school in the district:
14	(a)a child to a school in the district who is under 5 years of age or to be enrolled in a preschool or
15	kindergarten program established under 20-7-117 or in a special education program established under 20-7-
16	<u>411;</u>
17	(b) an adult who is 19 years of age or older if there are exceptional circumstances that merit waiving

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3	Section 4. Section 20-7-117, MCA, is amended to read:
4	"20-7-117. Kindergarten and preschool programs. (1) The trustees of an elementary district:
5	(a) may establish and operate a free preschool program for children 3 to 5 years of age pursuant to
6	<u>20-5-101(3)(a); and</u>
7	(b)shall establish or make available a kindergarten program capable of accommodating, at a
8	minimum, all the children in the district who will be 5 years old on or before September 10 of the school year for
9	which the program is to be conducted or who have been enrolled by special permission at the discretion of the
10	board of trustees pursuant to 20-5-101(3)(a).
11	(2) (a) The preschool program and the kindergarten program:, which the trustees may designate as
12	either a half-time or full-time program,
13	(i) must be an integral part of the elementary school and must be financed and governed accordingly,
14	provided that to be eligible for inclusion in the calculation of ANB pursuant to 20-9-311, a child must have
15	reached 5 years of age on or before September 10 of the school year covered by the calculation or have been

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28	Section 5. Section 20-9-311, MCA, is amended to read:



1	"20-9-311. Calculation of average number belonging (ANB) 3-year averaging. (1) Average
2	number belonging (ANB) must be computed for each budget unit as follows:
3	(a) compute an average enrollment by adding a count of regularly enrolled pupils who were enrolled
4	as of the first Monday in October of the prior school fiscal year to a count of regularly enrolled pupils on the first
5	Monday in February of the prior school fiscal year or the next school day if those dates do not fall on a school
6	day, and divide the sum by two; and
7	(b) multiply the average enrollment calculated in subsection (1)(a) by the sum of 180 and the
8	approved pupil-instruction-related days for the current school fiscal year and divide by 180.
9	(2) For the purpose of calculating ANB under subsection (1), up to 7 approved pupil-instruction-
10	related days may be included in the calculation.
11	(3) When a school district has approval to operate less than the minimum aggregate hours under 20-
12	9-806, the total ANB must be calculated in accordance with the provisions of 20-9-805.
13	(4) (a) Except as provided in subsection (4)(d), for the purpose of calculating ANB, enrollment in an
14	education program:
15	(i) from 180 to 359 aggregate hours of pupil instruction per school year is counted as one-quarter-time
16	enrollment;
17	(ii) from 360 to 539 aggregate hours of pupil instruction per school year is counted as half-time
18	enrollment;
19	(iii) from 540 to 719 aggregate hours of pupil instruction per school year is counted as three-quarter-
20	time enrollment; and
21	(iv) 720 or more aggregate hours of pupil instruction per school year is counted as full-time enrollment.
22	(b) Except as provided in subsection (4)(d), enrollment in a program intended to provide fewer than
23	180 aggregate hours of pupil instruction per school year may not be included for purposes of ANB.
24	(c) Enrollment in a self-paced program or course may be converted to an hourly equivalent based on
25	the hours necessary and appropriate to provide the course within a regular classroom schedule.
26	(d) A school district may include in its calculation of ANB a pupil who is enrolled in a program
27	providing fewer than the required aggregate hours of pupil instruction required under subsection (4)(a) or (4)(b)
28	if the pupil has demonstrated proficiency in the content ordinarily covered by the instruction as determined by

The ANB of a pupil under this subsection (4)(d) must be converted 2 to an hourly equivalent based on the hours of instruction ordinarily provided for the content over which the 3 student has demonstrated proficiency. 4 (e) A pupil in kindergarten through grade 12 who is concurrently enrolled in more than one public 5 school, program, or district may not be counted as more than one full-time pupil enrollment for ANB purposes. 6 (5) For a district that is transitioning from a half-time to a full-time preschool or kindergarten program, 7 the state superintendent shall count preschool or kindergarten enrollment in the previous year as full-time 8 enrollment for the purpose of calculating ANB for the elementary programs offering full-time preschool or 9 kindergarten in the current year. and the basic entitlements of the component districts must be calculated separately for a period of 3 years
following the consolidation or annexation. Each district shall retain a percentage of its basic entitlement for 3
additional years as follows:

20 (B) 50% of the basic entitlement for the fifth year; and

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(C) 25% of the basic entitlement for the sixth year.

(b) when a junior high school has been approved and accredited as a junior high school, all of the

(c) when a middle school has been approved and accredited, all pupils below the 7th grade must be
considered elementary school pupils for ANB purposes and the 7th and 8th grade pupils must be considered
high school pupils for ANB purposes; or

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(d) when a school has been designated as nonaccredited by the board of public education because of

LC 2782 1 center, and who is receiving individualized educational services supervised by the district, at district expense, at 2 a home or facility that does not offer an educational program; 3 (d) receiving special education and related services, other than day treatment, under a placement by 4 the trustees at a private nonsectarian school or private program if the pupil's services are provided at the 5 district's expense under an approved individual education plan supervised by the district; 6 (e) participating in the running start program at district expense under 20-9-706; 7 (f) receiving educational services, provided by the district, using appropriately licensed district staff at 8 a private residential program or private residential facility licensed by the department of public health and 9 human services: 10 (g) enrolled in an educational program or course provided at district expense using electronic or 11 offsite delivery methods, including but not limited to tutoring, distance learning programs, online programs, and 12 technology delivered learning programs, while attending a school of the district or any other nonsectarian offsite 13 instructional setting with the approval of the trustees of the district. 20 (12) A district shall, for ANB purposes, calculate the enrollment of an eligible Montana youth challenge 21 program participant as half-time enrollment.

22 (13) (a) For an elementary or high school district that has been in existence for 3 years or more, the 23 district's maximum general fund budget and BASE budget for the ensuing school fiscal year must be calculated

24 using the current year ANB for all budget units or the 3-year average ANB for all budget units, whichever

25 generates the greatest maximum general fund budget.

26 (b) For a K-12 district that has been in existence for 3 years or more, the district's maximum general

27 fund budget and BASE budget for the ensuing school fiscal year must be calculated separately for the

28 elementary and high school programs pursuant to subsection (13)(a) and then combined.



1	(14) The term "3-year ANB" means an average ANB over the most recent 3-year period, calculated by:
2	(a) adding the ANB for the budget unit for the ensuing school fiscal year to the ANB for each of the
3	previous 2 school fiscal years; and
4	(b) dividing the sum calculated under subsection (14)(a) by three."
