

# SJR 14 - STUDY PLAN OPTIONS

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## Origin of SJR 14

Senate Joint Resolution No. 14 was requested by the Senate Local Government Committee after the committee tabled Senate Bill No. 140, which was sponsored by Sen. Art Wittich (R-Bozeman). The bill proposed to combine school and primary elections. The committee tabled SB 140 on a motion by Sen. Alan Olson (R-Roundup) who stated that the concept of combining school and primary elections was a perennial issue that would continue to be brought before the legislature.

Sen. Olson also noted that the logistics of implementing such a bill, such as coordinating all the deadlines set in statute, were too complex to be tackled during the session and that it would be best to have an interim study so that all the technical concerns raised about implementing SB 140 could be adequately addressed. The committee tabled SB 140 and voted to request a committee bill that became SJR 14. The resolution states that the appropriate interim committee should "study local government and school district election procedures and identify opportunities to combine elections".<sup>1</sup>

## Key policy concerns

The key policy concerns raised in prior discussions on bills to combine primary and school elections are:

- how to improve voter turnout;
- how to ensure the integrity of elections; and
- how to manage the complexity of administering multiple elections.<sup>2</sup>

## Study plan options

### Issue areas

The SJR 14 study tasks may be broken into the following issue areas:

- #1: Dates and deadlines
- #2: Ballots and boundaries
- #3: Jurisdictional issues
- #4: Other procedural issues
- #5: Voter challenges

### Time allocation options

The three options for how much time the committee and staff could allocate time to the study may be compared to what "car size" the committee wants to drive:

- an "economy car" study;
- a "mid-size car" study; or
- a Cadillac study.

An "*economy car*" allocation of time to the SJR 14 study would be the minimum amount of time necessary to cover the tasks outlined in SJR 14. This option would allow more time to be spent on other issues, such as pension plan oversight or the HJR 1 study of the Office of Commissioner of Political Practices.

A "*mid-size car*" allocation of time is what would constitute the 25% of time allocation in staff's study plan proposal presented to SAVA at its June 11, 2013, meeting.<sup>3</sup> This option would allow the HJR 1 study to be the priority focus of the committee's work, but it would make the SJR 14 study of higher priority than the committee's pension plan oversight duties.

A "*Cadillac*" allocation of time would mean that the SJR 14 study would be a top priority, either on par with or of higher priority than the HJR 1 study. Selection of this option means that the committee is interested in developing recommendations, which may include a bill draft, on how school and primary elections could be combined. To accomplish this, the committee would need to add two meetings to its work plan schedule either as full meetings or subcommittee meetings in order to draft a committee bill to combine school and primary elections.

## Study progression

The time allocation options identified above also relate to how far the committee wants to progress on the various study tasks. This correlation of time (i.e., car size) to the depth of the committee's examination may be outlined as follows:

- economy car = information to identify issues
- mid-size car = information to identify issues  
+ analysis of issues and options
- Cadillac = information to identify issues  
+ analysis of issues and options  
+ final recommendations, such as a bill draft

This study progression is detailed in the study options chart below.

## Committee decision point

The committee as a whole must decide whether to select the economy car, the mid-sized car, or the Cadillac study option. If the committee later wants to upgrade the "car size" of the study, the study plan may be revised, but only by a majority vote of the full committee.
