He said that Justin Kraske, chief legal counsel; Will Rosquist, administrator, Regulatory Division; and Mandi Hinman, administrator, Centralized Services Division, were present and available to answer questions.

Rep. Regier called the meeting to order at 10:25 a.m. The secretary called the roll.

OTHER BUSINESS

Ms. Nowakowski said that the ETIC has spent half of its budget prior to the meeting today and that it is unclear whether there will be money left for a June meeting during the next interim.

- 00:00:00 Ms. Nowakowski said that under its work plan the ETIC had tentatively discussed moving the meeting in July to eastern Montana and asked if the committee was still interested in doing so. She said that some of the statutory duties assigned for July include a USB report and an overview from the Department of Revenue, a renewable energy credit report, a possible hydropower report from the Department of Natural Resources and Conservation (DNRC), and draft legislative proposals from the Public Service Commission. She said at the March meeting it was suggested that Carl Borgquist attend in order to discuss the Gordon Butte Project and that Orion Renewable discuss a wind development proposal in the Colstrip area. She asked the ETIC if it wanted to add any other agenda items.
