Air Quality

(possible concerns)

Long drilling time: No, 30 to 40 days drilling time.
Unusually deep drilling (high horsepower rig): No, triple derrick drilling rig to drill a single lateral Bakken Formation horizontal well test to 20,463'MD/10,205'TVD.
Possible H2S gas production: H2S gas production, from Mississippian Formations.
In/near Class I air quality area: No Class I air quality area in the area of review.
Air quality permit for flaring/venting (if productive): Yes, DEQ air quality permit required under rule 75-2-211.

Mitigation:

- Air quality permit (AQB review)
- Gas plants/pipelines available for sour gas

Comments: No special concerns – using triple derrick drilling rig to drill a single lateral Bakken Formation horizontal well test to 20,463'MD/10,205'TVD. If there are existing pipeline for gas in the area, gas can be gathered or if no gathering system nearby, associated gas can be flared under Board Rule 36.22.1220.

Water Quality

(possible concerns)

Salt/oil based mud: Yes, oil based invert drilling fluids will be used on the mainhole. The horizontal lateral will be drilled with brine water. The surface hole will be drilled with freshwater and freshwater drilling fluids.
High water table: No, no high water table anticipated in the area of review.
Surface drainage leads to live water: Yes, nearest drainage is an unnamed ephemeral tributary drainage to Rocky Point Coulee which is an ephemeral tributary drainage to the Missouri River, about 1/16 of a mile to the east from this location. The Missouri River is about 5/8 of a mile to the northeast from this location.
Water well contamination: None, closest water wells are 1 mile and further from this location. Surface casing hole will be drilled with freshwater and freshwater drilling fluids. Surface casing will be run and cemented to surface from 2000'.
Porous/permeable soils: No, sandy clay soils.
Class I stream drainage: Class I stream drainage, the Missouri River.

Mitigation:

- Lined reserve pit
- Adequate surface casing
- Berms/dykes, re-routed drainage
- Closed mud system
- Off-site disposal of solids/liquids (in approved facility)

Comments: 2000' of surface casing cemented to surface adequate to protect freshwater zones and to cover the base of the Fox Hills Formation.

Soils/Vegetation/Land Use

(possible concerns)

Stream crossings: No, stream crossings anticipated.

High erosion potential: Yes high erosion potential from fill area, moderate cut, up to 13.6' and moderate fill, up to 20.8', required.

Loss of soil productivity: None, location to be restored after drilling well, if well is nonproductive. If productive unused portion of drillsite will be reclaimed.

Unusually large wellsite: No, a large wellsite 510'X425' location size required for multiple well locations: Double Bar M Federal 24-33-1H, Double Bar M Federal 24-33-2H, Double Bar M Federal 24-33-3H and Double Bar M Federal 24-33-4H

Damage to improvements: No surface use is grazing land.

Conflict with existing land use/values: Slight

Mitigation

Avoid improvements (topographic tolerance)

Exception location requested

Comments: Access to location will be over existing county road, #339 and existing lease road. A short access of 6,754' will be built off the existing lease road into this location. Oil based invert drilling fluids will be recycled. Completion fluids will be hauled to another drilling location or an authorized Class II Disposal. Drilling cuttings and mud solids will be fly ashed in the lined pit and buried with subsoil cover. No special concerns.

Health Hazards/Noise

(possible concerns)

Proximity to public facilities/residences: Nearest residence is about 1 1/8 of a mile to the west northwest from the location.

Possibility of H2S: H2S potential is slight from Mississippian Formations.

Size of rig/length of drilling time: Triple drilling rig/short 30 to 40 days drilling time.

Mitigation:

Proper BOP equipment

Topographic sound barriers

H2S contingency and/or evacuation plan

Special equipment/procedures requirements

Comments: Adequate surface casing and operational BOP should mitigate any problems. (BOP's 5,000 psig annular, pipe and blind rams) rule 36.22.1014. No concerns.

Wildlife/recreation

Proximity to sensitive wildlife areas (DFWP identified): None.
Proximity to recreation sites: None
Creation of new access to wildlife habitat: None
Conflict with game range/refuge management: None
Threatened or endangered Species: Species identified as threatened or endangered are the Pallid Sturgeon, Interior Least Tern, Whooping Crane and Piping Plover.
Candidate species are the Sprague's Pipit and the Greater Sage-Grouse. MTFWP Natural Heritage Tracker website lists three (3) species of concerns. They are Piping Plover, Whooping Crane and the Red-headed woodpecker.

Mitigation:

- Avoidance (topographic tolerance/exception)
- Other agency review (DFWP, federal agencies, DSL)
- Screening/fencing of pits, drillsite

Comments: The surface ownership is private. There may be species of concern that maybe impacted by this wellsite. We ask the operator to consult with the surface owner as to what he would like done, if a species of concern is discovered at this location. The Board of Oil & Gas has no jurisdiction over private surface lands.

(possible concerns)

Proximity to known sites None identified.

Mitigation

- avoidance (topographic tolerance, location exception)

Comments: On private surface lands. There may be possible historical/cultural/paleontological sites that maybe impacted by this wellsite. We ask the operator to consult with the surface owner as to his desires to preserve these sites or not, if they are found during construction of the wellsite. The Board of Oil & Gas has no jurisdiction over private surface lands.

(possible concerns)

Bakken Formation horizontal well test to 20,463'MD/10,205'TVD. No concerns.
