

Alice M. Weiss joined the National Academy for State Health Policy (NASHP) in 2007. At NASHP, Weiss serves as co-director of Maximizing Enrollment: Transforming State Health Coverage, a national initiative that aims to help states increase enrollment and retention of eligible children in Medicaid and CHIP and establish and promote best practices for enrollment and retention systems. She also provides technical assistance expertise and leadership to other projects relating to eligibility and enrollment issues, health reform implementation, children's coverage, and Native American health coverage. While at NASHP, Weiss has authored numerous research papers, issue briefs, blogs, and has presented to the Institute of Medicine, the HHS Office of the National Coordinator HIT Policy Committee Enrollment Workgroup, legislative officials and other interested stakeholders.

Weiss came to NASHP from the U.S. Senate Finance Committee, where she was health counsel for U.S. Senator and Chairman Max Baucus' (D-MT) Finance Committee staff, with primary responsibility for Medicaid, CHIP, and private health insurance coverage issues. During her tenure, Weiss drafted the bipartisan CHIP Reauthorization Act (CHIPRA), Hurricane Katrina health relief legislation, and the Indian Health Care Improvement Act and was integrally involved in Medicaid reform debates. Weiss has also held senior health policy positions at the National Partnership for Women & Families and the U.S. Department of Labor's Pension and Welfare Benefits Administration. In her work as an advocate on private health insurance coverage, Weiss testified before Congress, was a featured analyst on C-SPAN and was selected to serve as one of a dozen national funded consumer representatives to work with the National Association of Insurance Commissioners. She holds a B.A. from Haverford College and a JD from Northeastern University Law School.
