STATE-TRIBAL RELATIONS INTERIM COMMITTEE

2009 — 2010 WORK PLAN

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The eight-member State-Tribal Relations Committee is unlike the other interim committees that have administrative rule reviews, agency monitoring, program evaluation, or the requirement to review draft legislation of agencies that the committee monitors. Instead, the committee has the following duties, as listed in 5-5-229, MCA:

- act as a liaison with tribal governments;
- encourage state-tribal and local government-tribal cooperation;
- conduct interim studies as assigned; and
- report its activities, findings, or recommendations to the legislature and propose any legislation recommended by the committee

In the past, the committee has fulfilled the liaison and cooperation responsibilities by visiting two or three Indian reservations during the interim and meeting with various state agency officials to discuss issues brought to the attention of the committee by tribal leaders and committee members.

Travel Schedule

Starting with the 2001-2002 interim, the first interim for the newly constituted State-Tribal Relations Committee, the committee began visiting reservations.

2001-2002: Rocky Boy, Flathead (and Northern Cheyenne Reservation?) ¹

2003-2004: Fort Belknap and Northern Cheyenne Reservations

2005-2006: Fort Peck and the Blackfeet Reservations

2007-2008: Flathead, Little Shell, and Crow Reservations

Although the travel schedule for each new STR interim committee is completely up to the members, other considerations notwithstanding, the historical rotation would suggest visits this interim to two or three of the following reservations: Fort Belknap, Northern Cheyenne, and Rocky Boy. Members were requested to come to the organizational meeting with their preferences in mind.

Budgeting for the committee includes travel and per diem for two or three 2-day meetings expected for visits to the reservations in addition to three or four meetings in Helena. Travel is difficult much later than October or earlier than May, so visit dates are planned accordingly. Staff suggested dates for meeting this interim and members were requested to consider those dates and propose alternative times for ones that do not work well. The results agreed upon at the organizational meeting were as follows:

Assigned studies

In this interim, the committee has no studies assigned to it but may want reports (or presentations in order to be kept apprised) from other interim committees studying water issues, education, and health care or other issues of interest to committee members.

Target Issues

State-tribal relations intersect with almost every conceivable sector of governance. The issues that the STR discussed and agreed to prioritize in its work plan for this interim flowed from (1) members' concerns, (2) issues raised by keynote speakers at the STR's organizational meeting, and (3) opportunities following from legislation in the 2009 Session that either passed, failed, or was drafted but not introduced. The STR agreed upon the following topics (not necessarily presented in sequence here):
