4	A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF
5	MONTANA URGING PROMPT CONGRESSIONAL AND PRESIDENTIAL APPROVAL FOR THE KEYSTONE
6	XL PIPELINE.

8	WHEREAS, the state of Montana, counties, and school districts will benefit substantially by an increase
9	in the property tax base when the Keystone XL Pipeline is approved and completed; and
10	WHEREAS, the Certificate of Compliance granted by the Department of Environmental Quality in 2012
11	for the Keystone XL Pipeline states that "the Project will generate long-term property tax revenues for the counties
12	traversed by the pipeline that will last for the life of the Project. The Project will generate approximately \$63 million
13	in annual property tax revenues in Montana"; and
14	WHEREAS, the on-ramp at Baker, Montana, will allow 100,000 barrels of Bakken oil to be transported
15	daily to Gulf Coast refineries; and
16	WHEREAS, the selected location of the pipeline through Montana and the conditions imposed by the
17	Certificate of Compliance granted by the Department of Environmental Quality minimize adverse impacts on the
18	environment, landowners, and affected communities; and
19	WHEREAS, significant infrastructure improvements, including powerlines and road and bridge
20	improvements, will be built and paid for by TransCanada; and
21	WHEREAS, Montana's Congressional delegation unanimously supports the approval of the pipeline; and
22	WHEREAS, Montana's Governor Steve Bullock supports approval of this pipeline.

24	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE
25	STATE OF MONTANA:
26	That the 64th Legislature urges prompt Congressional and Presidential approval for the Keystone XL
27	Pipeline.
28	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to the President of the United States
29	the Majority Leader of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, and
30	the members of Montana's Congressional Delegation.
