23	political subdivision of another state, except to the extent that the interest is exempt from taxation by Montana

26	852(b)(5), that are attributable to the interest referred to in subsection (1)(a)(i);

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1 (d) depreciation or amortization taken on a title plant as defined in 33-25-105; 2 (e) the recovery during the tax year of an amount deducted in any prior tax year to the extent that the 3 amount recovered reduced the taxpayer's Montana income tax in the year deducted; 4 (f) if the state taxable distribution of an estate or trust is greater than the federal taxable distribution of 5 the same estate or trust, the difference between the state taxable distribution and the federal taxable distribution 6 of the same estate or trust for the same tax period; and 7 (g) except for exempt-interest dividends described in subsection (2)(a)(ii), for tax years commencing after 8 December 31, 2002, the amount of any dividend to the extent that the dividend is not included in federal adjusted 9 gross income. 10 (2) Notwithstanding the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code, adjusted gross income does not 11 include the following, which are exempt from taxation under this chapter: 12 (a) (i) all interest income from obligations of the United States government, the state of Montana, or a 13 county, municipality, district, or other political subdivision of the state and any other interest income that is exempt 14 from taxation by Montana under federal law; 15 (ii) exempt-interest dividends as defined in section 852(b)(5) of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 16 852(b)(5), that are attributable to the interest referred to in subsection (2)(a)(i); 17 (b) interest income earned by a taxpayer who is 65 years of age or older in a tax year up to and including 18 \$800 for a taxpayer filing a separate return and \$1,600 for each joint return; 19 (c) (i) except as provided in subsection (2)(c)(ii), the first \$3,600 of all pension and annuity income 20 received as defined in 15-30-2101: 21 (ii) for pension and annuity income described under subsection (2)(c)(i), as follows: 22 (A) each taxpayer filing singly, head of household, or married filing separately shall reduce the total amount of the exclusion provided in subsection (2)(c)(i) by \$2 for every \$1 of federal adjusted gross income in 23 24 excess of \$30,000 as shown on the taxpayer's return; 25 (B) in the case of married taxpayers filing jointly, if both taxpayers are receiving pension or annuity 26 income or if only one taxpayer is receiving pension or annuity income, the exclusion claimed as provided in 27 subsection (2)(c)(i) must be reduced by \$2 for every \$1 of federal adjusted gross income in excess of \$30,000 28 as shown on their joint return; 29 (d) all Montana income tax refunds or tax refund credits; 30 (e) gain required to be recognized by a liquidating corporation under 15-31-113(1)(a)(ii);

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(f) all tips or gratuities that are covered by section 3402(k) or service charges that are covered by section
 3401 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, 26 U.S.C. 3402(k) or 3401, as amended and applicable on January
 1, 1983, received by a person for services rendered to patrons of premises licensed to provide food, beverage,
 or lodging;

(g) all benefits received under the workers' compensation laws;

(h) all health insurance premiums paid by an employer for an employee if attributed as income to the
employee under federal law, including premiums paid by the employer for an employee pursuant to 33-22-166;
(i) all money received because of a settlement agreement or judgment in a lawsuit brought against a
manufacturer or distributor of "agent orange" for damages resulting from exposure to "agent orange";

(j) principal and income in a medical care savings account established in accordance with 15-61-201
or withdrawn from an account for eligible medical expenses, as defined in 15-61-102, of the taxpayer or a
dependent of the taxpayer or for the long-term care of the taxpayer or a dependent of the taxpayer;

(k) principal and income in a first-time home buyer savings account established in accordance with
15-63-201 or withdrawn from an account for eligible costs, as provided in 15-63-202(7), for the first-time purchase
of a single-family residence;

(I) contributions or earnings withdrawn from a family education savings account or from a qualified tuition
 program established and maintained by another state as provided by section 529(b)(1)(A)(ii) of the Internal
 Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 529(b)(1)(A)(ii), for qualified higher education expenses, as defined in 15-62-103, of
 a designated beneficiary;

(m) the recovery during the tax year of any amount deducted in any prior tax year to the extent that the
 recovered amount did not reduce the taxpayer's Montana income tax in the year deducted;

(n) if the federal taxable distribution of an estate or trust is greater than the state taxable distribution of
 the same estate or trust, the difference between the federal taxable distribution and the state taxable distribution
 of the same estate or trust for the same tax period;

(o) deposits, not exceeding the amount set forth in 15-30-3003, deposited in a Montana farm and ranch
risk management account, as provided in 15-30-3001 through 15-30-3005, in any tax year for which a deduction
is not provided for federal income tax purposes;

(p) income of a dependent child that is included in the taxpayer's federal adjusted gross income pursuant
to the Internal Revenue Code. The child is required to file a Montana personal income tax return if the child and
taxpayer meet the filing requirements in 15-30-2602.

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(q) principal and income deposited in a health care expense trust account, as defined in 2-18-1303, or
 withdrawn from the account for payment of qualified health care expenses as defined in 2-18-1303; and

3 (r) that part of the refundable credit provided in 33-22-2006 that reduces Montana tax below zero; and
 4 (s)(r) the amount of the gain recognized from the sale or exchange of a mobile home park as provided
 5 in 15-31-163.

(3) A shareholder of a DISC that is exempt from the corporate income tax under 15-31-102(1)(I) shall
include in the shareholder's adjusted gross income the earnings and profits of the DISC in the same manner as
provided by section 995 of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 995, for all periods for which the DISC election
is effective.

10 (4) A taxpayer who, in determining federal adjusted gross income, has reduced the taxpayer's business 11 deductions by an amount for wages and salaries for which a federal tax credit was elected under sections 38 and 12 51(a) of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 38 and 51(a), is allowed to deduct the amount of the wages and 13 salaries paid regardless of the credit taken. The deduction must be made in the year that the wages and salaries 14 were used to compute the credit. In the case of a partnership or small business corporation, the deduction must 15 be made to determine the amount of income or loss of the partnership or small business corporation.

16 (5) Married taxpayers filing a joint federal return who are required to include part of their social security 17 benefits or part of their tier 1 railroad retirement benefits in federal adjusted gross income may split the federal 18 base used in calculation of federal taxable social security benefits or federal taxable tier 1 railroad retirement 19 benefits when they file separate Montana income tax returns. The federal base must be split equally on the 20 Montana return.

(6) Married taxpayers filing a joint federal return who are allowed a capital loss deduction under section
1211 of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 1211, and who file separate Montana income tax returns may
claim the same amount of the capital loss deduction that is allowed on the federal return. If the allowable capital
loss is clearly attributable to one spouse, the loss must be shown on that spouse's return; otherwise, the loss
must be split equally on each return.

(7) In the case of passive and rental income losses, married taxpayers filing a joint federal return and
who file separate Montana income tax returns are not required to recompute allowable passive losses according
to the federal passive activity rules for married taxpayers filing separately under section 469 of the Internal
Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 469. If the allowable passive loss is clearly attributable to one spouse, the loss must
be shown on that spouse's return; otherwise, the loss must be split equally on each return.

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- (8) Married taxpayers filing a joint federal return in which one or both of the taxpayers are allowed a
   deduction for an individual retirement contribution under section 219 of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C.
   219, and who file separate Montana income tax returns may claim the same amount of the deduction that is
   allowed on the federal return. The deduction must be attributed to the spouse who made the contribution.
- 5 (9) (a) Married taxpayers filing a joint federal return who are allowed a deduction for interest paid for a 6 qualified education loan under section 221 of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 221, and who file separate 7 Montana income tax returns may claim the same amount of the deduction that is allowed on the federal return. 8 The deduction may be split equally on each return or in proportion to each taxpayer's share of federal adjusted 9 gross income.
- (b) Married taxpayers filing a joint federal return who are allowed a deduction for qualified tuition and
  related expenses under section 222 of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 222, and who file separate Montana
  income tax returns may claim the same amount of the deduction that is allowed on the federal return. The
  deduction may be split equally on each return or in proportion to each taxpayer's share of federal adjusted gross
  income.
- 15 (10) A taxpayer receiving retirement disability benefits who has not attained 65 years of age by the end 16 of the tax year and who has retired as permanently and totally disabled may exclude from adjusted gross income 17 up to \$100 a week received as wages or payments in lieu of wages for a period during which the employee is 18 absent from work due to the disability. If the adjusted gross income before this exclusion exceeds \$15,000, the 19 excess reduces the exclusion by an equal amount. This limitation affects the amount of exclusion, but not the 20 taxpayer's eligibility for the exclusion. If eligible, married individuals shall apply the exclusion separately, but the 21 limitation for income exceeding \$15,000 is determined with respect to the spouses on their combined adjusted 22 gross income. For the purpose of this subsection, "permanently and totally disabled" means unable to engage 23 in any substantial gainful activity by reason of any medically determined physical or mental impairment lasting 24 or expected to last at least 12 months.
- (11) (a) An individual who contributes to one or more accounts established under the Montana family education savings program or to a qualified tuition program established and maintained by another state as provided by section 529(b)(1)(A)(ii) of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 529(b)(1)(A)(ii), may reduce adjusted gross income by the lesser of \$3,000 or the amount of the contribution. In the case of married taxpayers, each spouse is entitled to a reduction, not in excess of \$3,000, for the spouses' contributions to the accounts. Spouses may jointly elect to treat half of the total contributions made by the spouses as being made by each spouse. The

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reduction in adjusted gross income under this subsection applies only with respect to contributions to an account of which the account owner is the taxpayer, the taxpayer's spouse, or the taxpayer's child or stepchild if the taxpayer's child or stepchild is a Montana resident. The provisions of subsection (1)(e) do not apply with respect to withdrawals of contributions that reduced adjusted gross income.

5 (b) Contributions made pursuant to this subsection (11) are subject to the recapture tax provided in 6 15-62-208.

7 (12) (a) A taxpayer may exclude the amount of the loan payment received pursuant to subsection
8 (12)(a)(iv), not to exceed \$5,000, from the taxpayer's adjusted gross income if the taxpayer:

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(i) is a health care professional licensed in Montana as provided in Title 37;

(ii) is serving a significant portion of a designated geographic area, special population, or facility
 population in a federally designated health professional shortage area, a medically underserved area or
 population, or a federal nursing shortage county as determined by the secretary of health and human services
 or by the governor;

14 (iii) has had a student loan incurred as a result of health-related education; and

(iv) has received a loan payment during the tax year made on the taxpayer's behalf by a loan repayment
 program described in subsection (12)(b) as an incentive to practice in Montana.

(b) For the purposes of subsection (12)(a), a loan repayment program includes a federal, state, or
qualified private program. A qualified private loan repayment program includes a licensed health care facility, as
defined in 50-5-101, that makes student loan payments on behalf of the person who is employed by the facility
as a licensed health care professional.

21 (13) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (1), adjusted gross income does not include 40% of 22 capital gains on the sale or exchange of capital assets before December 31, 1986, as capital gains are 23 determined under subchapter P. of Chapter 1 of the Internal Revenue Code as it read on December 31, 1986. 24 (14) By November 1 of each year, the department shall multiply the amount of pension and annuity 25 income contained in subsection (2)(c)(i) and the federal adjusted gross income amounts in subsection (2)(c)(ii) 26 by the inflation factor for that tax year, but using the year 2009 consumer price index, and rounding the results 27 to the nearest \$10. The resulting amounts are effective for that tax year and must be used as the basis for the 28 exemption determined under subsection (2)(c). (Subsection (2)(f) terminates on occurrence of contingency--sec. 29 3, Ch. 634, L. 1983; subsection (2)(o) terminates on occurrence of contingency--sec. 9, Ch. 262, L. 2001.)"

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1 Section 2. Section 15-30-2618, MCA, is amended to read: 2 "15-30-2618. Confidentiality of tax records. (1) Except as provided in 5-12-303, 15-1-106, 17-7-111, 3 and subsections (8) and (9) of this section, in accordance with a proper judicial order, or as otherwise provided 4 by law, it is unlawful to divulge or make known in any manner: 5 (a) the amount of income or any particulars set forth or disclosed in any individual report or individual 6 return required under this chapter or any other information secured in the administration of this chapter; or 7 (b) any federal return or federal return information disclosed on any return or report required by rule of 8 the department or under this chapter. 9 (2) (a) The officers charged with the custody of the reports and returns may not be required to produce 10 them or evidence of anything contained in them in an action or proceeding in a court, except in an action or 11 proceeding: 12 (i) to which the department is a party under the provisions of this chapter or any other taxing act; or 13 (ii) on behalf of a party to any action or proceedings under the provisions of this chapter or other taxes 14 when the reports or facts shown by the reports are directly involved in the action or proceedings. 15 (b) The court may require the production of and may admit in evidence only as much of the reports or 16 of the facts shown by the reports as are pertinent to the action or proceedings. 17 (3) This section does not prohibit: 18 (a) the delivery to a taxpayer or the taxpayer's authorized representative of a certified copy of any return 19 or report filed in connection with the taxpayer's tax; 20 (b) the publication of statistics classified to prevent the identification of particular reports or returns and 21 the items of particular reports or returns; or 22 (c) the inspection by the attorney general or other legal representative of the state of the report or return 23 of any taxpayer who brings an action to set aside or review the tax based on the report or return or against whom 24 an action or proceeding has been instituted in accordance with the provisions of 15-30-2630. 25 (4) The department may deliver to a taxpayer's spouse the taxpayer's return or information related to 26 the return for a tax year if the spouse and the taxpayer filed the return with the filing status of married filing 27 separately on the same return. The information being provided to the spouse or reported on the return, including 28 subsequent adjustments or amendments to the return, must be treated in the same manner as if the spouse and 29 the taxpayer filed the return using a joint filing status for that tax year. 30 (5) Reports and returns must be preserved for at least 3 years and may be preserved until the Legislative - 7 -Authorized Print Version - LC 1458 Services Division

(6) Any offense against subsections (1) through (5) is punishable by a fine not exceeding \$500. If the
offender is an officer or employee of the state, the offender must be dismissed from office or employment and
may not hold any public office or public employment in this state for a period of 1 year after dismissal or, in the
case of a former officer or employee, for 1 year after conviction.

6 (7) This section may not be construed to prohibit the department from providing taxpayer return 7 information and information from employers' payroll withholding reports to:

8 (a) the department of labor and industry to be used for the purpose of investigation and prevention of
9 noncompliance, tax evasion, fraud, and abuse under the unemployment insurance laws; or

 covered by a tax credit, as determined under Title 33, chapter 22, part 20, for eligible small employers against

"15-31-511. Confidentiality of tax records. (1) Except as provided in this section, in accordance with
a proper judicial order, or as otherwise provided by law, it is unlawful to divulge or make known in any manner:
(a) the amount of income or any particulars set forth or disclosed in any return or report required under
this chapter or any other information relating to taxation secured in the administration of this chapter; or
(b) any federal return or information in or disclosed on a federal return or report required by law or rule

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1 of the department under this chapter.

2 (2) (a) An officer or employee charged with custody of returns and reports required by this chapter may
3 not be ordered to produce any of them or evidence of anything contained in them in any administrative
4 proceeding or action or proceeding in any court, except:

5 (i) in an action or proceeding in which the department is a party under the provisions of this chapter; or

6 (ii) in any other tax proceeding or on behalf of a party to an action or proceeding under the provisions of 7 this chapter when the returns or reports or facts shown in them are directly pertinent to the action or proceeding.

8 (b) If the production of a return, report, or information contained in them is ordered, the court shall limit 9 production of and the admission of returns, reports, or facts shown in them to the matters directly pertinent to the 10 action or proceeding.

11 (3) This section does not prohibit:

(a) the delivery of a certified copy of any return or report filed in connection with a return to the taxpayer
 who filed the return or report or to the taxpayer's authorized representative;

(b) the publication of statistics prepared in a manner that prevents the identification of particular returns,
 reports, or items from returns or reports;

(c) the inspection of returns and reports by the attorney general or other legal representative of the state
 in the course of an administrative proceeding or litigation under this chapter;

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(d) access to information under subsection (4);

(e) the director of revenue from permitting a representative of the commissioner of internal revenue of the United States or a representative of a proper officer of any state imposing a tax on the income of a taxpayer to inspect the returns or reports of a corporation. The department may also furnish those persons abstracts of income, returns, and reports; information concerning any item in a return or report; and any item disclosed by an investigation of the income or return of a corporation. The director of revenue may not furnish that information to a person representing the United States or another state unless the United States or the other state grants substantially similar privileges to an officer of this state charged with the administration of this chapter.

(f) the disclosure of information to the commissioner of insurance's office that is necessary for the
administration of the <u>insure Montana</u> small business <del>health insurance tax credit</del> <u>premium incentive program</u>
provided for in Title 33, chapter 22, part 20.

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(4) On written request to the director or a designee of the director, the department shall:

30 (a) allow the inspection of returns and reports by the legislative auditor, but the information furnished to

(5) Each year, an eligible small employer shall timely reregister with the commissioner in order to determine the participant's continued eligibility. The commissioner shall accept applications for continued registration: (a) for purchasing pool participants at any time within 12 months of the initial registration approval or within the time period for renewal of the coverage under this part, whichever is longer; (b) for tax credit participants on December 1 of each year. The commissioner shall stop accepting renewal applications for tax credit participants 60 calendar days later. (6)(9) The commissioner shall transmit to the department of revenue, at least annually, a list of eligible small employers that are taxpayers entitled to the tax credit deduct the premium incentive payment as provided in 15-31-130 and shall specify the taxpayer's name and tax identification number, the tax year to which the credit applies, and the amount of the credit premium incentive provided, and whether the credit is to be applied against taxes due on the taxpayer's return or paid as premium incentive payments or premium assistance payments. shall be imprisoned in a state prison for a term of not less than 1 year or more than 10 years and may be fined

requirement that restitution be made under terms set by the court. If the terms are not met, the required prison
term may be ordered.
