2	INTRODUCED BY T. BURNETT

4	A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF
5	MONTANA ASSESSING THE RISKS FROM ANY POTENTIAL REDUCTIONS OF FEDERAL FUNDS TO THE
6	STATE OF MONTANA AND ITS POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS AND URGING POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS
7	ACROSS THE STATE TO ADOPT AND IMPLEMENT COMPREHENSIVE FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT
8	MEASURES AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.

10	WHEREAS, the Montana Legislature declares that the nation's indebtedness poses a great, clear, and
11	present threat to America's future; and
12	WHEREAS, David Walker, former Comptroller General of the United States, warns that the "most serious
13	threat to the United States" is "our own fiscal irresponsibility"; and
14	WHEREAS, the national debt has now surpassed \$18 trillion, more than \$146,800 per U.S. household;
15	and
16	WHEREAS, the annual deficits have averaged over \$1 trillion for each of the last 6 years, and unfunded
17	obligations for social programs now exceed \$127 trillion, with no apparent Congressional resolution on the
18	horizon; and
19	WHEREAS, \$65 billion per month of the national debt and annual deficits are now offset through Federal
20	Reserve operations, such as quantitative easing; and
21	WHEREAS, more than 40 cents of every dollar the state of Montana spends comes from the federal
22	government; and
23	WHEREAS, in a recently released Federal Fiscal Outlook, the Government Accountability Office
24	declared: "A fundamental imbalance between revenue and spending over the long term leads to continuous
25	growth in debt as a share of gross domestic product (GDP), which is unsustainable"; and
26	WHEREAS, the lack of fiscal sustainability in the federal budget will undermine the fiscal sustainability
27	in our state budget; and
28	WHEREAS, in May 2012, the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, in its review of the
29	federal government's most recent annual financial statements, warned: "The U.S. is not exempt from the laws
30	of prudent finance. We must take steps to put our financial house in order. The credit rating agencies have

recently issued renewed warnings of U.S. credit downgrades unless substantive reforms are made. Our current
 fiscal policy results in mortgaging our nation's future without investing in it, leaving our children, grandchildren

3 and future generations to suffer the consequences. This is irresponsible, unethical and immoral"; and

WHEREAS, restoring fiscal soundness and sustainability is at the heart of restoring economic growth and
fostering a business climate where companies can grow and hire; and

6 WHEREAS, absent credible actions to address this fiscal condition, uncertainty will continue to dominate
7 business decisionmaking and economic recovery will languish.

9 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE
10 STATE OF MONTANA:

That the Legislature of the State of Montana supports a comprehensive initiative of risk management processes to assess the immediacy, severity, and probability of risks from any reductions of federal funds to the State of Montana and to determine how the state will marshal its resources to prioritize and provide the most essential government services.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Legislature strongly urges local, state, and national elected officials to take immediate and sustained action to eliminate deficit spending and secure economic self-reliance to the State of Montana and to the United States.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Legislature strongly urges the President of the United States and the United States Congress to pass a budget each year and adopt a credible and sustainable plan to balance the budget each year.

21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Legislature strongly urges Montana's cities, towns, and counties 22 to adopt and implement comprehensive financial risk management measures as soon as possible.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to the Attorney General of the United States, the President of the United States, the Majority Leader of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, the Montana Association of Counties, the Montana League of Cities and Towns, the Montana State Chamber of Commerce, the Montana Board of Regents, the Montana Board of Public Education, and the members of Montana's Congressional Delegation.
