10	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

12	Section 1. Section 16-6-305, MCA, is amended to read:
13	"16-6-305. Age limit for sale or provision of alcoholic beverages liability of provider. (1) (a)
14	Except in the case of an alcoholic beverage provided in a nonintoxicating quantity to a person under 21 years
15	of age by the person's parent or guardian, physician or dentist for medicinal purposes, a licensed pharmacist
16	upon the prescription of a physician, or an ordained minister or priest in connection with a religious observance,
17	a person may not sell or otherwise provide an alcoholic beverage to a person under 21 years of age.
18	(b) A parent, guardian, or other person may not knowingly sell or otherwise provide an alcoholic
19	beverage in an intoxicating quantity to a person under 21 years of age.
20	(c) For the purposes of this section, "intoxicating quantity" means a quantity of an alcoholic beverage
21	that is sufficient to produce:
22	(i) a blood, breath, or urine alcohol concentration in excess of 0.05; or
23	(ii) substantial or visible mental or physical impairment.
24	(2) A person is guilty of a misdemeanor who:
25	(a) invites a person under the age of 21 years into a public place where an alcoholic beverage is sold
26	and treats, gives, or purchases an alcoholic beverage for the person;
27	(b) permits the person in a public place where an alcoholic beverage is sold to treat, give, or purchase
28	alcoholic beverages for the person; or
29	(c) holds out the person to be 21 years of age or older to the owner of the establishment or to the owner's

- 1 (d) is the owner or lessee of or otherwise has control over property and knowingly or purposely allows 2 a person, knowing or having reasonable cause to believe the person is under 21 years of age, to consume an 3 alcoholic beverage on the property. 4 (3) It is unlawful for any person to fraudulently misrepresent the person's age to any dispenser of 5 alcoholic beverages or to falsely procure any identification card or to alter any of the statements contained in any 6 identification card, including a tribal identification card. 7 (4) A person 21 years of age or older who violates the provisions of subsection (1)(b) is, in addition to 8 applicable criminal penalties, subject to civil liability for damages resulting from a tortious act committed by the 9 person to whom the intoxicating substance was sold or provided if the act is judicially determined to be the result 10 of the intoxicated condition created by the violation.
