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13	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
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15	NEW SECTION. Section 1. Short title. [Sections 1 through 4] may be cited as the "Cultural Integrity
16	Commitment Act".
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18	NEW SECTION. Section 2. Legislative findings purposes. (1) The legislature finds that:
19	(a) language in the form of spoken, written, or sign language is foundational to cultural integrity;
20	(b) Montana tribal languages are in a time of crisis through the loss of native speakers, writers, and
21	signers;
22	(c) achievement gaps persist for Indian students, including higher dropout rates;
23	(d) Article X, section 1, of the Montana constitution established the educational goals of:
24	(i) establishing an education system that develops the full educational potential of each person; and
25	(ii) preserving Indian cultural integrity.
26	(2) The purpose of [sections 1 through 4] is to promote innovative, culturally relevant, Indian language
27	immersion programs for Indian and non-Indian students with the goal of raising student achievement,
28	strengthening families, and preserving and perpetuating Indian language and culture throughout Indian country

8	(3) For a district operating an Indian language immersion program that improves the district's graduation

10	public instruction, the multiplier in subsection (2)(a)(i) must be increased to 3.
11	(4) The board of public education is encouraged to approve proposed variances to standards of
12	accreditation for Indian language immersion schools and programs when the board finds the proposal to be
13	educationally sound and in alignment with the purpose described in [section 2(2)].
14	(5) The cultural and intellectual property rights from materials developed for an Indian language
15	immersion program belong to the tribe to which the materials relate. Use of the cultural and intellectual property
16	outside of the Indian language immersion program may be negotiated with the tribe.

18	Section 5. Section 20-9-327, MCA, is amended to read:
19	"20-9-327. Quality educator payment. (1) (a) The state shall provide a quality educator payment to:
20	(i) public school districts, as defined in 20-6-101 and 20-6-701;
21	(ii) special education cooperatives, as described in 20-7-451;
22	(iii) the Montana school for the deaf and blind, as described in 20-8-101;
23	(iv) state youth correctional facilities, as defined in 41-5-103; and
24	(v) the Montana youth challenge program.
25	(b) A special education cooperative that has not met the requirements of 20-7-454 may not be funded
26	under the provisions of this section except by approval of the superintendent of public instruction.
27	(2) (a) The quality educator payment for special education cooperatives must be distributed directly to
28	those entities by the superintendent of public instruction.
29	(b) The quality educator payment for the Montana school for the deaf and blind must be distributed to
30	the Montana school for the deaf and blind.
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1	(c) The quality educator payment for Pine Hills and Riverside youth correctional facilities must be
2	distributed to those facilities by the department of corrections.
3	(d) The quality educator payment for the Montana youth challenge program must be distributed to that
4	program by the department of military affairs.
5	(3) The quality educator payment is calculated as provided in 20-9-306, using the number of full-time
6	equivalent educators, as reported to the superintendent of public instruction for accreditation purposes in the
7	previous school year, each of whom:
8	(a) holds a valid certificate under the provisions of 20-4-106 and is employed by an entity listed in
9	subsection (1) of this section in a position that requires an educator license in accordance with the administrative
10	rules adopted by the board of public education; or
11	(b) (i) is a licensed professional under 37-8-405, 37-8-415, 37-11-301, 37-15-301, 37-17-302, 37-22-301,
12	37-23-201, 37-24-301, or 37-25-302; and
13	(ii) is employed by an entity listed in subsection (1) to provide services to students; or
14	(c) (i) holds an American Indian language and culture specialist license; and
15	(ii) is employed by an entity listed in subsection (1) to provide services to students in an Indian language
16	immersion program pursuant to [sections 1 through 4]."
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18	<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 6. Codification instruction. [Sections 1 through 4] are intended to be codified
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
