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5	A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF
6	MONTANA REQUESTING A STUDY OF THE LEGALIZATION AND CONTROL OF MARIJUANA; AND
7	REQUIRING THAT THE FINAL RESULTS OF THE STUDY BE REPORTED TO THE 66TH LEGISLATURE.
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9	WHEREAS, jails and prisons are overcrowded with minor drug offenders, and public safety and law
10	enforcement personnel are stretched to capacity; and
11	WHEREAS, alcohol and tobacco sales are regulated and controlled to protect the public health and safety
12	of Montana residents; and
13	WHEREAS, a similar system of regulation for marijuana could protect Montanans, particularly youth, from the context of the c
14	a public health, safety, and substance abuse prevention perspective; and
15	WHEREAS, a study of the control of recreational marijuana would allow the Legislature to review the
16	state's criminal laws and evaluate the nature of crimes for which people are incarcerated; and
17	WHEREAS, Montana could join the number of states that are benefiting financially from taxation of
18	well-regulated, controlled recreational marijuana and avoid the costs associated with an unregulated, uncontrolled
19	black market distribution of marijuana and the negative social implications of that black market.
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21	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE
22	STATE OF MONTANA:
23	That the Legislative Council be requested to designate an appropriate interim committee, pursuant to
24	section 5-5-217, MCA, to examine the legalization, regulation, taxation, and public health and safety aspects of
25	recreational marijuana in Montana.
26	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the study:
27	(1) consider whether the existing liquor control system could be used as a model for control of
28	recreational marijuana use;
29	(2) evaluate how the state's current medical marijuana program would be affected by legalization of
30	recreational marijuana;

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(3) review the effects that legalization of recreational marijuana has had in other states, including but not limited to the effects on:

- (a) state and local government tax collections;
- 4 (b) state and local government spending on public health and safety programs, including law 5 enforcement agencies and drug treatment programs;
  - (c) existing medical marijuana programs; and
- 7 (d) youth drug use;

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- 8 (4) monitor changes in federal policy that could affect recreational marijuana laws in the states; and
- 9 (5) evaluate the potential benefits and drawbacks of legalizing marijuana for recreational use in Montana.
  - BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the study include representatives of the Department of Public Health and Human Services, the Department of Justice, the Department of Revenue, the Department of Agriculture, <a href="#FEDERAL AND">FEDERAL AND</a> local law enforcement agencies, <a href="#INDIAN TRIBES">INDIAN TRIBES</a>, the district court system, schools, and state or local groups that work on topics related to drug use and to legalization of marijuana.
  - BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all aspects of the study, including presentation and review requirements, be concluded prior to September 15, 2018.
  - BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the final results of the study, including any findings, conclusions, comments, or recommendations of the appropriate committee, be reported to the 66th Legislature.

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
