4	A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT DESIGNATING THE THIRD SATURDAY OF JUNE AS
5	JUNETEENTH NATIONAL FREEDOM DAY IN ORDER TO COMMEMORATE AFRICAN-AMERICAN
6	EMANCIPATION FROM SLAVERY."

8	WHEREAS, news of the end of slavery did not reach frontier areas of the United States, and in particular
9	the southwestern states, for more than 2 years after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation of January
10	1, 1863, and months after the conclusion of the Civil War; and
11	WHEREAS, on June 19, 1865, Union soldiers led by Major General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston
12	Texas, with news that the Civil War had ended and that the enslaved were free; and
13	WHEREAS, African Americans who had been slaves in the Southwest celebrated June 19, commonly
14	known as Juneteenth Independence Day, as the anniversary of their emancipation; and
15	WHEREAS, African Americans from the Southwest continue the tradition of Juneteenth Independence
16	Day as inspiration and encouragement for future generations; and
17	WHEREAS, for more than 150 years, Juneteenth Independence Day celebrations have been held to
18	honor African-American freedom while encouraging self-development and respect for all cultures; and
19	WHEREAS, although Juneteenth Independence Day is beginning to be recognized as a national and
20	even global event, the history behind the celebration should not be forgotten; and
21	WHEREAS, the faith and strength of character demonstrated by former slaves remains an example for
22	all people of the United States, regardless of background, religion, or race; and
23	WHEREAS, the character demonstrated by former slaves should inspire us in this country to give thanks
24	for the freedom won by so many people in all nations cherishing liberty and to strive for the goals of bringing
25	freedom and democracy to people of other countries no matter what their race or religion.

27	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
28	
29	NEW SECTION. Section 1. Juneteenth national freedom day. The third Saturday in June is
30	designated as Juneteenth national freedom day to commemorate African-American emancipation from slavery

to celebrate the freedom won by people in many countries, and to rededicate ourselves to the cause of liberty
for people who yet suffer from tyranny and oppression.

NEW SECTION. Section 2. Notification to tribal governments. The secretary of state shall send a copy of [this act] to each tribal government located on the seven Montana reservations and to the Little Shell Chippewa tribe.
