5	A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT EXEMPTING CERTAIN ACTIVITIES RELATED TO STATE-OWNED
6	TRAFFIC SIGNS, TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES, AND STREET LIGHTING FROM THE REQUIREMENTS OF
7	THE STATE BUILDING CODE; AND AMENDING SECTION 50-60-102, MCA."
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9	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
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11	Section 1. Section 50-60-102, MCA, is amended to read:
12	"50-60-102. Applicability local government energy conservation standards. (1) Except as
13	provided in subsection (5), the state building code, as defined in 50-60-203(3), does not apply to:
14	(a) residential buildings containing less than five dwelling units or their attached-to structures, any farm
15	or ranch building of any size, and any private garage or private storage structure of any size used only for the
16	owner's own use, located within a county, city, or town, unless the local legislative body by ordinance or resolution
17	makes the state building code applicable to these structures;
18	(b) mines and buildings on mine property regulated under Title 82, chapter 4, and subject to inspection
19	under the Federal Mine Safety and Health Act;
20	(c) petroleum refineries and pulp and paper mills, except a structure classified under chapter 7, section
21	701, group B, division 2, and chapter 9, section 901, group H, outside of process units, of the 1991 edition of the
22	Uniform Building Code; or
23	(d) industrial process piping, vessels, and equipment and process-related structures located outside of
24	another structure occupied on a regular basis by employees or the public; or
25	(e) the installation, removal, alteration, or repair of traffic control signals, street lighting, traffic control
26	signs, and other traffic control devices owned or operated by the state.
27	(2) Except as provided in subsection (5), the state may not enforce the state building code under
28	50-60-205 for the buildings, equipment, and activities referred to in subsection (1). A county, city, or town that has
29	made the state building code applicable to the buildings referred to in subsection (1) may enforce within the area
30	of its jurisdiction the state building code as adopted by the county, city, or town.
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(3) When good and sufficient cause exists, a written request for limitation of the state building code may
 be filed with the department for filing as a permanent record.

3 (4) The department may limit the application of any rule or portion of the state building code to include
4 or exclude:

5 (a) specified classes or types of buildings according to use or other distinctions as may make 6 differentiation or separate classification or regulation necessary, proper, or desirable; <u>or</u>

7 (b) specified areas of the state based on size, population density, special conditions prevailing in the 8 area, or other factors that make differentiation or separate classification or regulation necessary, proper, or 9 desirable.

(5) (a) Subject to subsection (6), for purposes of promoting the energy efficiency of home design and
 operation, the provisions of the state building code relating to energy conservation adopted pursuant to
 50-60-203(1) apply to residential buildings, except:

13 (i) farm and ranch buildings; and

(ii) any private garage or private storage structure attached to a residential building and used only for the
 owner's own use.

(b) Subject to subsection (6), the provisions of the state building code relating to energy conservation
 in residential buildings are enforceable:

(i) by the department only for those residential buildings containing five or more dwelling units orotherwise subject to the state building code; and

(ii) through the builder self-certification program provided for in 50-60-802 for those residential buildings
containing less than five dwelling units and not otherwise subject to the state building code.

(6) (a) A county, city, or town with a building code enforcement program may, as part of its building code
 or by town ordinance or resolution, adopt voluntary energy conservation standards for new construction for the
 purpose of providing incentives to encourage voluntary energy conservation. The incentive-based standards
 adopted may exceed any applicable energy conservation standards contained in the state building code.

(b) New construction is not required to meet local standards that exceed state energy conservation
 standards unless the building contractor elects to receive a local incentive."

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
