Description of fiscal impact: HB 647 has no fiscal impact to the state. Although the legislation may increase staff time at the Secretary of State's office to review and process minor party petitions, it also reduces the number of signatures required in 75 House Districts and does not require any modifications to the statewide voter registration system.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

Assumptions:

Office of the Secretary of State

- The bill would change the signature requirements for parties to petition to get on the ballot but would not require any configuration changes to the statewide voter registration system.
- The legislation may increase staff time to review and process minor party petitions as the proposed changes increase the total number of signatures, but it also reduces the number of signatures required in 75 House Districts.
- The Office of the Secretary of State will assume responsibility for this bill within the agency by utilizing existing personnel and resources.
