1	HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9
2	INTRODUCED BY K. KELKER
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4	A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF
5	MONTANA REQUESTING AN INTERIM STUDY OF SERVICES FOR INDIVIDUALS EXPERIENCING
6	HOMELESSNESS AND UNTREATED SUBSTANCE USE AND MENTAL HEALTH DISORDERS; AND
7	REQUIRING THAT THE FINAL RESULTS OF THE STUDY BE REPORTED TO THE 67TH LEGISLATURE.
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9	WHEREAS, a comprehensive study by the Montana Department of Justice concluded in 2017 that 90%
10	of Montanans with a substance use disorder are not receiving treatment; and
11	WHEREAS, the Department of Justice study noted that a lack of treatment providers has made it difficult
12	for Montanans with substance use disorders to access treatment; and
13	WHEREAS, substance use disorders and mental illness are often co-occurring illnesses, with a 2014
14	survey by the federal Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration showing that 39% of
15	Americans with a substance use disorder also had a co-occurring mental illness; and
16	WHEREAS, mental health services are limited in many areas of Montana; and
17	WHEREAS, people with untreated substance use and mental health disorders often experience
18	homelessness and increased interactions with law enforcement; and
19	WHEREAS, individuals who have been involved with the criminal justice system may, without access to
20	appropriate treatment, re-offend and return to the criminal justice system; and
21	WHEREAS, some Montana cities are grappling with problems caused in public spaces by individuals with
22	untreated substance use and mental health disorders.
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24	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE
25	STATE OF MONTANA:
26	That the Legislative Council be requested to designate an appropriate interim committee, pursuant to
27	section 5-5-217, MCA, to examine Montana's existing system of services for the treatment of substance use and
28	mental health disorders and determine whether additional or different services or approaches are needed to
29	reduce untreated addiction as an alternative to detention and criminal sanctions.
30	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the study review:

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(1) the availability of substance use and mental health disorder treatment services in Montana, including services available to people who are on probation or parole as well as those who live in rural areas or on Indian reservations;

- (2) methods for expanding access to treatment for underserved populations;
- (3) methods for expanding access to treatment through approaches tailored to meet the needs of both rural and urban areas;
 - (4) the cost of providing substance use and mental health disorder treatment in Montana;
- (5) the direct and indirect costs that local governments, service providers, and the business community incur for individuals with untreated substance use and mental health disorders, including but not limited to the costs of:
 - (a) providing health care and other services to the individuals; and
- 12 (b) ensuring public safety; and

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- (6) programs in Montana or other states that have successfully focused on treatment as a way to prevent homelessness and criminal justice involvement by individuals in need of services.
- 15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the study determine:
 - (1) if gaps exist in services and, if so, why the gaps exist and what additional services are needed;
 - (2) whether different approaches to the current system of services and delivering those services could reduce homelessness caused by lack of treatment; and
 - (3) whether, based on available information, it appears that different approaches have historically reduced the costs related to homelessness and untreated substance use and mental health disorders.
 - BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the study focus on recommendations related to:
- 22 (1) improving coordination and communication among health care providers, mental health providers, 23 human services providers, and law enforcement and criminal justice entities;
 - (2) strengthening of partnerships at the local levels and between centers of treatment expertise and communities;
 - (3) discontinuance of ineffective practices;
 - (4) methods for collecting and sharing data across agencies that serve the same person or family; and
- (5) additional methods for substance use prevention and education efforts aimed at children and youth,
 particularly at those who may be at higher risk of experimenting with or becoming addicted to alcohol or illegal
 drugs.



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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the study include representatives of the Department of Public Health	
and Human Services, Department of Corrections, Department of Justice, tribal governments, local governments,	
service providers, and advocates or organizations representing people who are experiencing homelessness,	
people who have untreated substance use and mental health disorders, and people who are reentering the	
community after incarceration.	
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all aspects of the study, including presentation and review	
requirements, be concluded prior to September 15, 2020.	
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the final results of the study, including any findings, conclusions,	

comments, or recommendations of the appropriate committee, be reported to the 67th Legislature.
