10	WHEREAS, Montana's rural schools in general, and schools in Indian Country in particular, struggle to		
11	recruit and retain teachers; and		
12	WHEREAS, "Grow Your Own" programs show great promise in addressing teacher shortages in rural		
13	areas; and		
14	WHEREAS, having Indian teachers to teach Indian children will help close the achievement gap and		
15	help fulfill Montana's commitment in its educational goals for the preservation of Indian cultural integrity; and		
16	WHEREAS, strengthening the teacher pipeline for Montana's rural reservation schools will require		
17	collaborative efforts between K-12 schools and institutions of higher education.

19	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:		
20			
21	NEW SECTION. Sect	on 1. Grow your own grant program admini	stration. (1) There is a grow
22	your own grant program administered by the commissioner of higher education. The purpose of the grant		
23	program is to develop teacher pipelines aimed at serving rural and reservation school districts.		
24	(2) (a) The grow you	r own grant program must involve:	
25	(i) the opportunity for	students to take dual credit courses in education v	vhile in high school;
26	(ii) the opportunity for	students to engage in work-based learning opportu	unities in the field of education;
27	and		
28	(iii) collaboration betw	een school districts and institutions of higher educa	ation in developing a career
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1 pathway for education. 2 (b) The grant program must allow and encourage small and proximate districts to collaborate in 3 developing their grow your own grant programs. 4 (c) A school district is eligible for the program if the district has one or more schools impacted by a 5 quality educator shortage. 6 (d) A school district that is eligible for a grant under this section may be awarded a grant for up to 2 7 years to develop a grow your own grant program. 8 (3) Contingent on appropriation by the legislature, the commissioner shall create and administer: 9 (a) a grant program for eligible school districts to develop a grow your own grant program that 10 encourages students to pursue a career in teaching; 11 (b) a grant program for tribal colleges, community colleges, and 2-year campuses to: 12 (i) pursue accreditation for teacher preparation programs in the specific licensure or endorsement 13 areas that are most impacted by quality educator shortages; or 14 (ii) develop collaborative programs with 4-year institutions with accredited teacher preparation 15 programs in the specific licensure or endorsement areas that are most impacted by guality educator shortages. 16 with an emphasis on collaborative programs that can be conducted in a manner that does not require residency 17 at the 4-year institution; and 18 (c) a grow your own grant scholarship program that provides a last-dollar grant of up to \$5,000 a year, 19 not to exceed the cost of attendance, and not to exceed \$10,000 total for any student, to students who: 20 (i) have participated in a grow your own grant program, as described in subsection (3)(a), while in 21 high school and have earned at least 6 postsecondary credits toward an education degree or are living in a 22 community with a school impacted by a quality educator shortage; 23 (ii) are currently enrolled in a teacher preparation program in a licensure or endorsement area 24 identified as most impacted by quality educator shortages; and 25 (iii) commit to teaching in a school impacted by a quality educator shortage. 26 (4) The commissioner shall convert a grant under subsection (3)(c) to a loan if the recipient of the 27 grant:

(i) is not licensed in a licensure or endorsement area identified as most impacted by quality educator



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1	shortages within 5 years of receiving a grant; or		
2	(ii) does not teach for 3 or more years in a school impacted by a quality educator shortage and in a		
3	licensure or endorsement area identified as most impacted by quality educator shortages within 10 years of		
4	receiving a grant.		
5	(5) The legislature intends that grants made to school districts and postsecondary institutions		
6	pursuant to subsections (3)(a) and (3)(b) are one-time startup grants that include:		
7	(a) a matching component provided by the school district or postsecondary institution; and		
8	(b) a plan by the school district or postsecondary institution to sustain programs beyond the term of		
9	the grant.		
10	(6) In accordance with 5-11-210, the commissioner shall report annually to the education interim		
11	committee on the status and impacts of the grant programs described in this section.		
12	(7) For purposes of this section, "quality educator shortage" means a shortage identified by the board		
13	of public education pursuant to 20-4-503.		
14			
15	NEW SECTION. Section 2. Appropriation. (1) There is appropriated \$500,000 from the general fund		
16	to the commissioner of higher education for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, for the purposes of [section		
17	1].		
18	(2) The legislature intends that the appropriation in this section be considered a part of the ongoing		
19	base for the next legislative session.		
20	(3) The commissioner of higher education may not spend more than \$50,000 of the appropriation in		
21	subsection (1) on the creation and administration of the programs described in [section 1].		
22			
23	NEW SECTION. Section 3. Notification to tribal governments. The secretary of state shall send a		
24	copy of [this act] to each federally recognized tribal government in Montana.		
25			
26	NEW SECTION. Section 4. Codification instruction. [Section 1] is intended to be codified as an		
27	integral part of Title 20, chapter 4, and the provisions of Title 20, chapter 4, apply to [section 1].		
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1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 5. Effective date. [This act] is effective July 1, 2021.
