**<u>Description of fiscal impact:</u>** The bill language creates no fiscal impact to the state Department of Corrections (DOC).

## FISCAL ANALYSIS

## Assumptions:

- 1. HB 399 would restrict the ability of a sentencing court to impose a sentence of life without the possibility of release in cases of youthful offenders criminally convicted as adults.
- 2. The bill establishes parole criteria for a youth offender for the Board of Pardons and Parole.
- 3. The new bill language provides that the prisoner may have an attorney present but does not make this a mandatory requirement so there is no monetary obligation for DOC to pay for an attorney.
- 4. The proposed language in HB 399 does not alter the procedures or day-to-day functions of the Department of Corrections (DOC).
- 5. The proposed language does not have any impact on the Board of Pardons and Parole (BOPP) functions.
- 6. In addition, the bill applies only prospectively, so it would only apply to cases moving forward.
