

Description of fiscal impact: This bill has no fiscal impact to the state.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

Assumptions:

- This act revises laws regarding electronic monitoring as a condition of pretrial release when an offense involves felony partner or family member assault
- Section 1 amends 46-9-108, MCA, to impose electronic monitoring as a condition of release when the offense is any felony assault or strangulation of a partner or family member, felony stalking or a felony violation of an order of protection. The District Courts do not pay for electronic monitoring. The Judicial Branch assumes the costs will be borne by the parties or local governments responsible for the cost of pretrial detention, and therefore does not have a fiscal impact on the branch.
