<u>Description of fiscal impact:</u> HB 628 modifies 81-3-205, MCA, and would increase work for state livestock inspectors and investigators and shift revenues from Deputy Stock Inspectors to the Department of Livestock in the amount of \$120,084.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

Assumptions:

Department of Livestock (DOL)

- 1. The department predicts no additional costs initially; however, based on increased workload, the department may require additional FTEs in the future if unable to meet demands of producers.
- 2. Revenues are based on the estimated number of new grazing permits reviewed by the state inspectors less inspection fees that would have been received without the modifications to MCA.
 - a. It is assumed that producers that choose to utilize a per head inspection can do so.
 - b. Revenues are based on the fee schedule set for "Adjoining County Grazing Permit", found in ARM 32.2.404(4)(b) with an additional cost bracket added for permits issued for over 1,000 animals.
 - c. The permit price for movements of 1,000 animals or more is \$150.

- d. It is more cost effective in movements of 30 animals or less for the producer to utilize a per head inspection.
- e. Projections are based on permits only being utilized in movements of 31 animals or greater.
- 3. Deputy Stock Inspector compensation losses are based on the assumption that they are not allowed to issue permits and will conduct inspections at a rate of 90% for returns from pasture prior to the 6-month period elapsing.
