<u>Description of fiscal impact:</u> HB 346 clarifies that solar panel electric generation systems are class 13 property unless they are a non-commercial or a small power production facility as defined under 16 U.S.C. 796(17)(A). This is effectively current law. This bill has no fiscal impact to the state.

## FISCAL ANALYSIS

#### Assumptions:

# Department of Revenue

- 1. HB 346 clarifies that solar panel electric generation systems are class 13 property unless they are a non-commercial or small power production facility as defined under 16 U.S.C. 796(17)(A).
- 2. The department would already consider large solar power generation as class 13 property so there is no functional change in outcome due to this code clarification.
- 3. HB 346 also severs the Montana definition of a small power production facility from the federal definition by lowering the threshold nameplate megawatt capacity from 80 megawatts to 50 megawatts.
- 4. No solar generation facilities in Montana are affected by this lower threshold change in definition.
