The department of environmental quality shall review capital projects authorized in either or both [sections 2 and 3] for potential inclusion in the state building energy conservation program (SBECP) under Title 90, chapter 4, part 6. When a review shows that a capital project will result in energy or utility savings and improvements, that project must be submitted to the energy conservation program for funding consideration by the SBECP. Funding provided under the energy conservation program guidelines must be used to offset or add to the authorized funding for the project, and the amount will be dependent on the annual utility savings resulting from the capital project. Agencies must be notified of potential funding after the review and are obligated to utilize the SBECP funding, if available.

NEW SECTION. Section 10. Legislative consent. The appropriations authorized in [sections 1 through 8] [SECTIONS 1 THROUGH 26] [SECTIONS 1 THROUGH 27] constitute legislative consent for the capital projects contained in [sections 1 through 8] [SECTIONS 1 THROUGH 26] [SECTIONS 1 THROUGH 27] within the meaning of 18-2-102.
