10	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
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12	Section 1. Section 16-4-301, MCA, is amended to read:
13	"16-4-301. Special permits to sell all alcoholic beverages, beer, and table wine application
14	and issuance. (1) (a) The following organizations or institutions that conduct a special event may receive up to
15	12 special permits a year to sell beer and table wine to the patrons of the special event:
16	(i) An <u>an</u> organization or institution that has a tax-exempt designation under the provisions of
17	section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 501(c)(3), as amended,
18	(ii) an organization or institution that is organized and operated to raise funds for a needy-person
19	<u>in need;</u> or
20	(iii) an organization or institution that is an accredited Montana postsecondary school and that
21	conducts a special event may receive a special permit to sell beer and table wine to the patrons of that special
22	event. An organization may receive up to three special permits a year.
23	(b) A civic league or organization that has a tax-exempt designation under section 501(c)(4) of the
24	Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 501(c)(4), as amended, or an organization authorized by an accredited
25	Montana postsecondary school to engage in fundraising activities for intercollegiate athletics that has a tax-
26	exempt designation under the provisions of section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C.
27	501(c)(3), as amended, may receive up to 12 special permits a year to sell beer and table wine. For purposes



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1	of fundraising activities for intercollegiate athletics, only one organization for each Montana postsecondary					
2	school may be authorized to apply for and receive special permits under this section. All net earnings from the					
3	sale of beer and table wine must be contributed to the state of Montana or a political subdivision of the state or					
4	must be devoted to purposes required of entities under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, 26					
5	U.S.C. 501(c)(3), as amended.					
6	(c) An association or corporation engaged in professional sporting contests or junior hockey					
7	contests may receive one special permit to sell beer and table wine covering the entire season of play if:					
8	(i) the association or corporation is sanctioned by a sports organization that regulates the specific					
9	sport;					
10	(ii)	the season of play of the sport is specified in advance;				
11	(iii)	an admission fee to the contests is charged; and				
12	(iv)	the contest events are held in facilities that provide seating for at least 1,000	patrons.			
13	(d)	A chamber of commerce or business league that has a tax-exempt designation	on under section			
14	501(c)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 501(c)(6), as amended, may receive up to 12 special					
15	permits a year to sell beer and table wine. A chamber of commerce may not use one of its special permits for

23	( <u>e)(f)</u>	The beer and wine sold under this subsection (1) must be consumed at the ti	ime when and			
24	within the enc	losure where the special event, activity, or sporting contest is held.				
25	<del>(f)(g)</del>	An application for a special permit must be presented 3 days in advance, but	the department			
26	may, for good	cause, waive the 3-day requirement. The application must describe the location	n of the enclosure

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1 sporting contest, and the period during which it is contemplated that the special event, activity, or sporting 2 contest will be held. An application for a permit for professional sporting contests or junior hockey contests 3 under subsection (1)(c) must provide the inclusive dates of the season of play for the sporting contest. The 4 application must be accompanied by the amount of the permit fee and a written statement of approval of the 5 premises where the special event, activity, or sporting contest is to be held issued by the local law enforcement 6 agency that has jurisdiction over the premises. 7 (q)(h) A special permit issued under this subsection (1) for the purpose of selling and serving beer at 8 a special event, activity, or sporting contest conducted on the premises of a county fairground or public sports 9 arena authorizes the permitholder to sell and serve beer in the grandstand and bleacher area of the premises, 10 as well as from a booth, stand, or other fixed place on the premises. 11 <del>(h)</del>(i) For the purposes of this subsection (1), a post of a nationally chartered veterans' organization 12 or a lodge of a recognized national fraternal organization otherwise licensed under this code is an organization that may receive special permits for three special events a year, as described in subsection (1)(a), to sell beer 13 14 and table wine. All net proceeds must go to the post or lodge acquiring the special permit. 15 (2) (a) A post of a nationally chartered veterans' organization or a lodge of a recognized national 16 fraternal organization not otherwise licensed under this code may receive, without notice or hearing as provided 17 in 16-4-207, a special permit to sell beer and table wine or a special permit to sell all alcoholic beverages at the

post or lodge to members and their guests only, to be consumed within the hall or building of the post or lodge.

(b) The application of a nationally chartered veterans' organization or lodge of a recognized
national fraternal organization must describe the location of the hall or building where the special permit will be
used and the date it will be used.

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(c) The special permit may be issued for a 24-hour period only, ending at 2 a.m., and the department may not issue more than 12 special permits to any post or lodge during a calendar year."

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25 <u>COORDINATION SECTION.</u> Section 2. Coordination instruction. If both Senate Bill No. 59 and 26 [this act] are passed and approved and if both contain a section that amends 16-4-301, then the sections 27 amending 16-4-301 are void and 16-4-301 must be amended as follows:



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1	"16-4-301. Special permits to sell all alcoholic beverages, beer, and table wine application		
2	and issuance. (1) (a) The following organizations or institutions that conduct a special event may receive up to		
3	<u>12 special permits during a calendar year to sell beer and table wine to the patrons of the special event:</u>

11	(b) A civic league or organization that has a tax-exempt designation under section 501(c)(4) of the		
12	Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 501(c)(4), as amended, or an organization authorized by an accredited		
13	Montana postsecondary school to engage in fundraising activities for intercollegiate athletics that has a tax-		
14	exempt designation under the provisions of section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C.		
15	501(c)(3), as amended, may receive up to 12 special permits a year to sell beer and table wine. For purposes		
16	of fundraising activities for intercollegiate athletics, only one organization for each Montana postsecondary		
17	school may be authorized to apply for and receive special permits under this section. All net earnings from the		
18	sale of beer and table wine must be contributed to the state of Montana or a political subdivision of the state or		
19	must be devoted to purposes required of entities under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, 26		
20	U.S.C. 501(c)(3), as amended.		
21	(c) An association or corporation engaged in professional sporting contests or junior hockey		
22	contests may receive one special permit to sell beer and table wine covering the entire season of play if:		
23	(i) the association or corporation is sanctioned by a sports organization that regulates the specific		
24	sport;		
25	(ii) the season of play of the sport is specified in advance;		
26	(iii) an admission fee to the contests is charged; and		
27	(iv) the contest events are held in facilities that provide seating for at least 1,000 patrons.		



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1	(d) A chamber of commerce or business league that has a tax-exempt designation under section				
2	501(c)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C. 501(c)(6), as amended, may receive up to 12 special				
3	permits a year to sell beer and table wine. A chamber of commerce may not use one of its special permits for				
4	an event conducted by a business league, and a business league may not use one of its permits for an event				
5	conducted by a chamber of commerce. The chamber of commerce or business league receiving a special				
6	permit shall obtain liquor liability insurance for any event it conducts.				
7	(e) A winery licensed pursuant to 16-4-107 may receive up to 12 special permits during a calendar				
8	year to provide wine that was fermented and bottled at the winery's licensed premises. The special permit				
9	allows the winery to sell its products for off-premises consumption if the products are sold in their original				
10	packaging.				
11	(e)(f) The beer and wine sold under this subsection (1) must be consumed at the time when and				
12	within the enclosure where the special event, activity, or sporting contest is held.				
13	(f)(g) An application for a special permit must be presented 3-5 business days in advance, but the				
14	department may, for good cause, waive the <u>3-day 5-day</u> requirement. The application must describe the				
15	location of the enclosure where the special event, activity, or sporting contest is to be held, the nature of the				
16	special event, activity, or sporting contest, and the period during which it is contemplated that the special event,				
17	activity, or sporting contest will be held. An application for a permit for professional sporting contests or junior				
18	hockey contests under subsection (1)(c) must provide the inclusive dates of the season of play for the sporting				
19	contest. The application must be accompanied by the amount of the permit fee and a written statement of				
20	approval of the premises where the special event, activity, or sporting contest is to be held issued by the local				
21	law enforcement agency that has jurisdiction over the premises.				
22	(g)(h) A special permit issued under this subsection (1) for the purpose of selling and serving beer				
23	and table wine at a special event, activity, or sporting contest conducted on the premises of a county fairground				
24	or public sports arena authorizes the permitholder to sell and serve beer and table wine in the grandstand and				
25	bleacher area of the premises, as well as from a booth, stand, or other fixed place on the premises.				
26	(h)(i) For the purposes of this subsection (1), a post of a nationally chartered veterans' organization				
27	or a lodge of a recognized national fraternal organization otherwise licensed under this code is an organization				



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1	that may receive special permits for three special events a year <del>, as described in subsection (1)(a),</del> to sell beer						
2	and table wine. All net proceeds must go to the post or lodge acquiring the special permit.						
3	(2) (a) A post of a nationally chartered veterans' organization or a lodge of a recognized national						
4	fraternal organization not otherwise licensed under this code may receive, without notice or hearing as provide						
5	in 16-4-207, a special permit to sell beer and table wine or a special permit to sell all alcoholic beverages at the						
6	post or lodge to members and their guests only, to be consumed within the hall or building of the post or lodge.						
7	(b)	The application of a nationally chartered veterans' organization or lodge of a	recognized				
8	national fraternal organization must describe the location of the hall or building where the special permit will be						
9	used and the date it will be used.						
10	(c)	The special permit may be issued for a 24-hour period only, ending at 2 a.m.,	and the				
11	department ma	ay not issue more than 12 special permits to any post or lodge during a calenda	r year."
