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20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Section 1. Purpose -- legislative intent. (1) The purposes and desired outcomes 21 of [sections 1 and 2] are to:

22 (a) increase the capacity of schools to provide prevention, early intervention, and support to

23 students with mental health and substance abuse needs;

(b) provide school-based and community provider school-linked services to support Montana's
 children in their local communities;

(e) 3 (2) The legislature intends that the department: 4 (a) administer services under [sections 1 and 2] in a manner that minimizes to the greatest extent 5 possible the administrative burden on school districts; and 6 (b) expand the medicaid school-based fee schedule to include behavioral assessment or 7 screening, brief intervention, coaching, and treatment interventions. 8 9 NEW SECTION. Section 2. School-based services -- multitiered system of supports. (1) The 10 department shall adopt the multitiered system of supports framework to support a continuum of behavioral 11 health services and supports in schools. 12 The department, with the support and collaboration of the office of public instruction and (2) 13 subject to appropriation, shall inventory and catalog existing school-based behavioral health services or 14 programs utilized by school districts. This inventory must include for each service or program: 15 (a) the service or program name; 16 (b) the funding source or sources; 17 the targeted population; (c) 18 (d) the multitiered system of supports tier; 19 (e) a list of school districts offering the service or program; and 20 (f) whether the service or program is evidence-based being evaluated for effectiveness, the process of the evaluation, and the results. 21 22 (3) The department shall: 23 (a) identify a core set of recommended evidence based interventions for each multitiered system 24 of supports tier; 25 develop and implement a plan for providing training and technical assistance to school districts (b) and school-linked community providers on the core set of recommended evidence based interventions. 26 27 leveraging existing resources and programs to support a multitiered system of supports. 25	medical assistance only who are covered under a group related to a program providing cash assistance, as						
26	defined in 53-4-201. Basic medicaid benefits consist of all mandatory services listed in subsection (3) but may						
27	include those optional services listed in subsections (4)(a) through (4)(r)(s) that the department in its discretion						
28	specifies by ru	e. The department, in exercising its discretion, may consider the amount of funds appropriated

5 (7) The department may implement, as provided for in Title XIX of the Social Security Act, 42

6 U.S.C. 1396, et seq., as may be amended, a program under medicaid for payment of medicare premiums,

7 deductibles, and coinsurance for persons not otherwise eligible for medicaid.

8 (8) (a) The department may set rates for medical and other services provided to recipients of
9 medicaid and may enter into contracts for delivery of services to individual recipients or groups of recipients.

- 10 (b) The department shall strive to close gaps in services provided to individuals suffering from 11 mental illness and co-occurring disorders by doing the following:
- (i) simplifying administrative rules, payment methods, and contracting processes for providing
 services to individuals of different ages, diagnoses, and treatments. Any adjustments to payments must be
 cost-neutral for the biennium beginning July 1, 2017.
- (ii) publishing a report on an annual basis that describes the process that a mental health center or
 chemical dependency facility, as those terms are defined in 50-5-101, must utilize in order to receive payment
 from Montana medicaid for services provided to individuals of different ages, diagnoses, and treatments.
- (9) The services provided under this part may be only those that are medically necessary and that
 are the most efficient and cost-effective.
- (10) (a) The amount, scope, and duration of services provided under this part must be determined
 by the department in accordance with Title XIX of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. 1396, et seq., as may be
 amended.
- (b) The department shall, with reasonable promptness, provide access to all medically necessary
 services prescribed under the early and periodic screening, diagnosis, and treatment benefit, including access
 to prescription drugs and durable medical equipment for which the department has not negotiated a rebate.
- 26 (11) Services, procedures, and items of an experimental or cosmetic nature may not be provided.
- 27 (12) (a) Prior to enacting changes to provider rates, medicaid waivers, or the medicaid state plan,
